## New Paperback Books in at Juliaetta Library

The Juliaetta Community Library has received more paperback books that will appeal to a wide variety of reading interests. "Out of the Storm" by Grace Livingston Hill has the hero save the heroine as the ship sinks, only to have her do the same for him later. "Stranger Within the Gates", also by Hill, has romance, misadventures, and a happy ending. In "The Big Kiss" by DeNoux, Detective La Stanza is on the trail of a serial killer. Philip is an ordinary young man who dislikes violence, but gets mixed up with "The Bridemaid" (by Rendell) who is fascinated with death.

"Run Before the Wind" by Stuart Woods is full of high adventure and suspense as a young American is involved in yacht racing and IRA attempts upon his friends.

"An Abyss of Light" by O'Neal is science fiction with Galactic Magistrates forcing world after world to join their union and being defied by the Gamant people. "Surrender None, the Legacy of Gird" by Moon is the story of a peasant who leads his people in a revolt against oppression and is a good read. "The Diamond Throne" by Eddings begins a new series in which Sparhawk, Knight and Queen's Champion, has to find a cure to break the magic spell encasing his Queen and save the kingdom. "Magic's Price" by Lackey tells the tale of Vanyel, the Herald-Mage, and his efforts to save his country from the forces led by a master of dark magic.

"Lohd of the Plains" by Silver is based upon the true story of the 1895 Northwest Rebellion of the starving Ottawa Indians and metis. "Oregon Bride" by Bittner tells the adventures of Marybeth, who starts out as a young widow with a baby traveling westward with her in-laws. "Addicted" is a book in which young people talk about drugs in their own words.

## Harold E. Horn, 77, Area Resident Passes

Harold E. Horn, a longtime Troy, Idaho farmer, died Monday, July 30 at the Latah Care Center in Moscow of congestive heart failure. He was 77.

Horn took over the Kilde family farm near Troy in 1962 after retiring as a heavy equipment operator. He operated the farm until 1983 and then sold the land in 1989. He continued to live in the Kilde family homestead with his wife, Dorothy Kilde Horn.

He worked as a bulldozer and road grader operator for 25 years, working and living throughout the Northwest while on different projects. He worked on Fairchild Air Force Base, the Spokane Valley Freeway and the relocation of the railroad for the Umatilla Dam.

Horn was born December 16, 1912, at Fairview, Okla., the son of Jesse and Nettie M. Hubler Horn. He attended school at Oklahoma and moved to Colorado during the dust bowl days of the 1930s.

He joined the Civilian Conservation Corps and met his future wife while stationed near Troy, Idaho. He married Dorothy Kilde at Moscow Sept. 5, 1936. She survives at the family home.

Horn was a man of many interests and hobbies, including animals, reloading shells, snowmobiling and working in his shop.

He was a member of the Kendrick Golden Sunset Seniors and the National Rifle Association.

Survivors, in addition to his wife, include two daughters, Karen Goyin of Spokane and Marilyn Witke of Fernley, Nev.; one son, Gary Ray Horn of Albany, Oregon; nine grandchildren, two great-grandchildren; a sister, Pauline Goddard of Idaho City; and two brothers, Lloyd Horn of Lenore and Ralph Horn of Parma.

Funeral services were held Friday at Short's Funeral Chapel. Burial was at the Moscow Cemetery.

The family suggests any memorials be contributions to the Troy Ambulance of the Kendrick Senior Center in Kendrick.

## Weather Sizzles, Harvest Rolls

Harvesting of the 1990 small grain crop in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area moved into high gear this week under a sizzling summer sky that pushed the thermometer past the 100 degree mark on several days.

After the wind and rain storm of Monday, July 30, the skies cleared and the hot sun quickly dried the fields, allowing farmers to start cutting again by Wednesday. Since that time the weather has been hot and dry—perfect harvest weather.

Saturday and Sunday were probably the hottest days of the year to date with unofficial reading of 105 degrees reported on Kendrick's Main Street.

Dean Brocke said Tuesday afternoon that the early variety of peas such as the small sieve Alaskas had been mostly cut and delivered to Brocke and Sons and farmers were in the regular Alaska, Austrian peas and yellow peas. Brocke said growing conditions earlier in the season had cut both the quality and the quantity of this year's pea crop. "Too many extremes," Dean said. "Too much rain, too much heat, too dry," he added just made for a bad year.

The erratic weather early this season that hurt the legumes, didn't affect the wheat and barley quite as badly, said the managers of Kendrick Rochdale and Lewiston Grain Growers. Mary Belle Larson, one of the Rochdale managers said she estimated that the wheat and barley Rochdale was expecting this season is roughly half in. Mrs. Larson said the test weight of the wheat has been running about 59 to 60 and although some of the barley is looking pinched, the overall harvest appears to be about average.

"Average to good," was the way Tom Jeffries, manager at the Lewiston Grain warehouses in Kendrick and Juliaetta, saw the harvest so far this season. Tom said the harvest is "really rolling" now but said it would probably be next week before the peak is reached. Jeffries said some of the barley is a little thin, but most looks good. He added that the warehouse at Peck has been taking in about 35 to 40 loads a day this week, and even the facilities at Cavendish are getting busy taking in the grain.

Despite the hot, dry weather there have been remarkably few fires. Lee Heimgartner lost a loaded grain truck Monday afternoon and about a half acre of standing grain, but some great work by friends and neighbors cut the loss and prevented what could have been a disastrous fire.

## Anti-Hunter Harassment

### State and Federal

Representative Ron Marlinee of Montana introduced a bill in the 1989 Congress which, if it passes, would make it illegal to interfere with hunters or anglers on federal land. Bill 3768, titled the National Forest Hunter Safety and Protection Act of 1989, establishes penalties for any group or person who "impedes a lawful hunt."

Penalties can run as high as \$5,000 for each violation, with a separate category calling for a minimum of \$1,000 and maximum of \$10,000 if force or violence is used. The bill also provides for recovery of attorney's fees and punitive damages by hunters who are harassed by protesters on impeding a hunt.

Idaho is one of 38 states which have anti-harassment laws to protect hunters engaged in lawful sporting activities. The Idaho bill, passed in 1987 and signed into law by Governor Cecil D. Andrus, makes it a misdemeanor to interfere with "lawful taking of wildlife or lawful predator control," damage blinds, harass or bait animals with intent of interfering with hunting.

The Idaho law allows hunters who can prove damage by violators of the law to recover three times the damage in civil action in addition to attorney fees. It also allows for injunctions to stop protests or interference with lawful hunting.

Maryland authorities used that state's anti-harassment law in September 1989 to stop a planned interference with hunters at the McKee-Beshers Wildlife Management area. Activists identifying themselves as members of the "Fund for Animals" demonstrated, followed hunters into the woods, surrounded hunters in the woods and talked, or in some cases ridiculed the hunter. Seven of the 35 to 40 protesters were arrested.
