Kendrick School District Announces Policy For Free and Reduced Price Meals

Kendrick Joint School District No. 283 announced its policy for free and reduced price meals for children unable to pay the full price for meals served under the National School Lunch Program. Each school and the office of the Superintendent has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The following household size and income criteria will be used in determining eligibility. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free and reduced price meals.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available from the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

For school officials to determine eligibility, households receiving food stamps or AFDC must list the child's name, their food stamp or AFDC case number and the signature and name of an adult household member. Households not receiving food stamps or AFDC must list: Names of all household members, the name and Social Security number of the primary wage earner of the household member who signs the application, and the entire household income with the amount and source of the income received by each household member. The signature of the adult household member who signs the application certifies that the information provided is correct.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. Under the provisions of the free

and reduced price policy, Eldon Taylor, Superintendent, will review the applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to Doug Harris, Board Chairman, Kendrick, Idaho (289-4622), for a hearing on the decision.

Households that list a food stamp or AFDC case number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Other households approved for benefits are required to report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household must contact the school. Such changes may make the children or the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown below.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for school meal benefits. If a household wished to apply for foster children living with them, the household should contact the school for more information.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for the purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age, or handicap. If any member of a household believes he/she has been discriminated against, he/she should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250.

Kendrick School District 283 announced that school will begin on Wednesday, August 29. Any parents or guardians with a student who is new to the district is asked to please contact the school so records may be sent for, the superintendent's office said this week.

Registration for high school students will be Tuesday, August 28 as follows:

Juniors and seniors: 9:00 a. m. to 10 a. m.
Freshmen and sophomores: 10:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon

The 8th graders will register the day school begins.

The 7th graders will have an orientation meeting at the high school on Monday, Aug. 27, at 7:30 p. m.

All students will obtain lockers when they register. The school is not responsible for lost or stolen articles.

Fire on American Ridge Thursday Caused Lots of Excitement

Fire that began in stubble on the Andy Cox farm on American Ridge Thursday, August 9, burned about 200 acres of stubble, 60 to 80 acres of standing grain, and caused a flurry of excitement among county and state law enforcement agencies before it was controlled by volunteers, and personnel from the Dept. of Lands fire fighting crews.

Dave Neal, a grandson of Andy Cox, who farms the land, said Monday that the fire started during the noon hour, about 12:30, in a stubble field. The cause of the fire was probably exhaust sparks or dirt falling from a hot engine of a grain truck. The fire started in the stubble and burned an estimated 20 acres, five of these standing grain. The harvest crew and volunteers about had the fire under control when the Dept. of Land crew arrived. The workers mopped up, they thought, and had the situation under control. Some of the workers took a break and went to lunch and the fire crews departed.

What no one expected was the

wind that started to blow across the fields—Neal said he was on his dozer looking the situation over when the wind started up. The wind quickly fanned some of the smoldering hot spots, and Neal said the first thing he saw of the rekindled fire was in grain about 100 yards from the burned stubble. "Before I could get dozer turned around," he said, "I saw two more fires break out." Dave was a little offended by the reports in some of the daily newspapers the next day that made it sound like everyone had taken off for lunch after the first fire was knocked down. "There was always someone watching," he said.

The wind, estimated at about 40 miles an hour, added to the fire fighters problems. The fire crews returned and were aided by dozens of neighboring farmers and volunteers. The Dept. of Lands called in an airplane from Buck Erickson's Craigmont Flying Service, which is under contract with the Dept. of Lands and retardant was dropped on the fire lines. A helicopter from

Jim Pope's Valley Aviation in Clarkston also dropped retardant.

About this time the State Patrol and the Latah County Sheriff's office began to get concerned about the fire getting about of control and spreading down to Kendrick and Juliaetta. A "command post" was set up in the office of Magnuson Insurance, (Dana Magnuson is a county commissioner and required to become involved in situations such as this), local E. M. T's were alerted, traffic was blocked from using the main Kendrick to Troy highway, and plans were even, it is understood, discussed to evacuate the two towns if the danger seemed too great.

But, the fire fighters finally got the situation under control about 7:00 o'clock that evening, and harvest was back under way the next day.

Andy, Tom and Dave all joined in expressing their thanks to friends, neighbors, volunteers and the fire crews for all the help that day. It was really appreciated.

Wearing of Centennial T-Shirts and Caps On Friday Is Suggested

Centennial shirts and caps may be purchased at the Red Cross Pharmacy and Phil's Food City in Kendrick and at the Chicken Coop in Juliaetta.

The Community Development Association also heard a report that the Centennial History book is now in the hands of the publishing firm in Moscow and the committee is still planning on having the book available for distribution Oct. 13. There will be 1,500 books printed. The book finally ended up being 268 pages.

Frank Jacobson was at the meeting to report that the ad hoc committee of which he is chairman is still working on an assessment of both short and long range goals for infrastructure improvement in the Kendrick/Juliaetta area. At an upcoming meeting on Aug. 16, the committee will look at a statement of goals and other topics relative to community improvement.

Wally Butler told the group of plans to have an impromptu golf tourney October 14, out at the site of what it is hoped will be a golf course up Cedar Creek. While the tournament will be a "home-made" affair, it will serve to get the public acquainted with the plans for the project.

The Association also agreed that it should participate and help in any way possible to assist the local medical clinic to secure an X-ray unit and facilities in the Kendrick Clinic. It is understood that a unit might be obtained through St. Joseph Regional Medical Center.
