Lawyer Frank Barton Retires August 15

Frank V. Barton, who has maintained a law office in Kendrick for over 35 years, retired from both here and his Lewiston practice effective August 15.

Mr. Barton said anyone wishing any personal or business documents or files should call 743-4471 in Lewiston to make arrangements to pick up such documents as duplicate wills, contracts, etc.

Frank established his practice in the early 1950's after his return from service in the Korean War. A veteran of World War II, Frank had completed law school at the University of Idaho and he recalls that the day before he was to take his state bar examination, he received a notification from the Army calling him back to active duty.

"My wife got the letter before I saw it," Frank recalls, "and bless her heart, she never showed it to me until after I had taken the law exams." Frank passed the law examination, then had to go back into service.

On his release from the military, he set up practice in Lewiston and then opened an office in Kendrick, and from that time until last Wednesday, Frank was a familiar figure each Wednesday in Kendrick where his good humor, friendly manner and professional abilities made him a welcome visitor to the community. He was also the Kendrick city attorney for many years.

Barton also remembers his first office in Kendrick. "Really it was Geo. F. Brocke, Sr.'s office at the warehouse," Frank said. "When I showed up on Wednesday, George would just get up and let me use his desk and office." That arrangement continued until Dr. Christensen moved out of the little office between the old post office and the theater to go across the street next to the Red Cross Pharmacy. From that time on, Frank was in Kendrick nearly every Wednesday.

"It's been a pleasure and I'll miss all the friends and clients I've had over the years," Frank said.

Economic Development Committee To Propose Eventual Consolidation Of Juliaetta and Kendrick City Services

The ad hoc planning committee of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Economic Development Association last week completed a preliminary draft of a proposed infrastructure improvement plan for the area. Leading the list of seven long-term projects is that of developing a strategy to consolidate certain of the public services provided in both towns, including water, sewer, fire protection, and emergency medical and health care.

An infrastructure improvement plan is required of those cities seeking certification as Gem Communities under the Idaho Department of Commerce. An application for certification must also include a one year plan of action. Leading the list of five issues to be addressed the first year following certification is a proposal to encourage the city councils of Juliaetta and Kendrick to enforce ordinances relative to the aesthetic appearance of their towns. The one year plan also calls for providing house numbers and street signs where needed in both Juliaetta and Kendrick and road signs where needed in the surrounding countryside.

Three of the long-term projects relate to recreation issues: First, to develop a biking-and-hiking path connecting Juliaetta and Kendrick. Second to proceed with plans for a nine hole golf course east of Kendrick and to encourage city government in both towns to express their public support and contribute towards its construction. And third, to develop a strategy to provide an

RV park in the area, including taking preliminary steps of providing RV parking in both towns and an RV dump (sewage disposal) in the area.

Transportation issues are identified in both the long term and the one year plan. Long range, the planning committee wants to see the Camas Prairie Railroad actively encouraged to acquire the line from Moscow to Arrow and to restore rallservice to the area. As part of the one year plan the committee recommends that the Idaho State Transportation Board be invited to visit the Juliaetta-Kendrick area during its 1991 tour to discuss highway needs in the community.

A pressing need for additional family housing in the area is another issue included in the long term plan. The committee is proposing the establishment of a Juliaetta-Kendrick community real estate development committee to determine ways to provide more family housing in the area, renovate and upgrade existing family housing, and provide housing for the elderly. Such a committee could also act as a clearing house for those interested in buying and/or selling residential property.

High on the list of priorities established by community groups during the assessment process last spring, improvement of curbs, sidewalks, and drainage in both towns is an issue identified for long term consideration, with the caution that it be done without burdensome cost to the individual property owner.

Two additional issues to be dealt with during the first year include establishing a voluntary community arts commission to plan for cultural events in the Juliaetta-Kendrick area and developing a strategy to promote the school district and the vital role it plays in the economic health of the area.

At present the ad hoc committee is considering plans for business retention and expansion. Following that, it will explore the possibilities of economic diversification in the area, including attracting retirees and tourists. The committee hopes to finish up its part of the application package by the end of October. The Economic Development Association is responsible for completing the other components of the application, including an organization and financing plan, a community profile, and an inventory of building and land.

Assuming successful application and certification as a Gem Community, a matching grant of up to \$10,000 from the state of Idaho could help put some muscle behind some of the committee's thinking.

Annual Notification: Inspection and Review Of Student Records

Kendrick Jt. School District 283 Certain rights pertaining to the inspection and review of student records and challenging the content of such records are afforded to parents of children under 18 years of age, persons 18 years of age or older and married students attending Public Schools in Joint School District No. 283. The District has established procedures allowing the above individuals access to school records.

Joint District No. 283 has established and maintains records in the following areas: academic, attendance, testing, and health. These records are housed in the following locations: The central files, special education classrooms, and ancillary personnel offices. Individual student files reference the location of any additional records pertaining to that student. All records are stored in secure facilities.

All student records are maintained for a period of five years after the student exits the school system, after which they are destroyed except for permanent attendance and enrollment information which the district is entitled to maintain indefinitely. Specific parents and eligible students will be notified if student records are to be destroyed while the student is in attendance (i.e., Individual Education Programs five years old or older Total Service Plans, Individual Implementation Programs, Test Protocols, etc.).

Personally identifiable school records and files of students will be released to only certain school and other educational agency officials unless written consent to further release is obtained. Furnishing, in any form, any personally identifiable information contained in personal school records to any persons, other than the above, will be permitted only by written consent, specifying the record(s) to be released, the reason therefore, to whom the copies are provided, or permitted when required by judicial order or lawful subpoena.

Any person, agency, or organization legally entitled to student records and desiring access to such records must sign a written form to be kept in the student's file for inspection by the parent or eligible student. Copies of student record are available at the school of attendance at a cost of 50 cents per page (unless the cost effectively prohibits the parent or eligible student from obtaining a copy of the record). Joint District No. 283 is required by Federal and state regulations to make student records available to parents or eligible students who request to see them within 45 days of date of request.

State and Federal regulations afford parents and eligible students certain rights pertaining to student educational records. Parents and eligible students may request a copy of educational records and obtain copies at their own expense. Parents or eligible students may request an explanation and interpretation of records. If any educational record includes information on more than one student, the parents or eligible student of those children shall have the right to inspect and review only the information relating to their child, or themselves, or to be informed of that specific information. Parents or eligible students may request amendment of records if they believe that information is inaccurate, misleading, or violates the privacy or other rights of the student. Parents or eligible students must be informed of District procedures for the release of confidential information to non-educational agencies.
