## Water Restrictions Still in Effect

Despite the relief from the dry weather and the heat the rain of the past ten days has brought, the Kendrick City Council reminded residents that watering restriction imposed earlier in the summer are still in effect. The only change the council made was to allow earlier hours for outside watering.

Instead of outside watering being limited to the hours of 7 to 9, p. m. now residents may water from 5 to 7 p. m. on allotted days. The days remain unchanged: Those people living North of Main Street and West of School House Hill may water on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Resident South of Main Street and East of School House Hill may water Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, 5 to 7 p. m. No Sunday watering.

The city is now using the water that was in the swimming pool to water the park lawn. Steve Howerton has connected a pump to the pool water and is drawing it out to put on the park grass. This serves a double purpose: the pool must be emptied now that the season is over and the water is utilized to keep the park green.

Councilman Darrel Brocke told the Gazette Tuesday evening that the city is very appreciative of the support and cooperation citizens have given in helping conserve water this summer. Cutting back on usage has saved about 200,000 gallons each day, Brocke said.

## Tigers Open Football Season Here Friday Against Mustangs

Coach Ken Swanger will put his 1990 version of the Kendrick High School Tiger football team out on the field in its first game this Friday night, August 31 against the visiting Deary Mustangs. Game time is 7:00 p. m.

Swanger took this same squad into state competition last year—and he has them all back again for this season—more mature and experienced. "With the nucleus and experience we have," Ken said, "I think we'll do real well this year."

At least for the opening game this Friday, Swanger will have Reece Hewett as quarterback, Shane Taylor, tight end; Kade Konen, wide receiver; Ryan Blewett, wide receiver; Jarod Silflow, full back, Eric Heier, center, Keith Taylor, guard and Ron Morgan, guard.

Swanger said Bob Wegner, Shawn Tanata and Brady Lohman are also expected to see a lot of action with the offensive team.

When the Tigers are on defense, Reece Hewett and Keith Taylor will serve as line backers with Ron Morgan becoming a defensive end, Eric Heier and Wyatt Hazeltine, tackles; and Shane Taylor, Ryan Blewett, Kade Konen, Jarod Silflow, Shawn Tanata and Bob Wegner being used as defensive backs. Seb Eckroth is also slated for defensive line duty.

Thirty-three players have turned out for the team this year. Seventeen of these are lettermen.

The Tigers will not be too big this year—Swanger estimated the average weight between 170 and 175 pounds. "Fairly quick" especially the wide receivers was how he described his team's speed.

Kendrick finished the season with a 5-4 overall record last year and were 3-1 in league play. The Tigers made the state play-offs but lost in the first round to the Plummer Pirate 38-32.

Swanger predicts Highland will be one of the league's tough opponents this year.

After the opening game here Friday night, the Tigers will hit the road Saturday, Sept. 8 to go up to Clark Fork.
