Letter to the Editor—

Latah County Dist. Library Proposed Cuts for J-K Services

The Latah County District Library Board members say they are concerned with fairness and equality in our county library branches. So in their 1990-91 budget, the hours are increased in branches that are newer, have smaller circulation counts and fewer programs while the hours are decreased in branches that are older, have larger circulation counts and more active programs.

You see, district board members are striving to give equal hours to all branch libraries: In other words, if one branch has 2 books to check out and another has 200, each branch librarian, no matter what the workload, has the same amount of time to do the work!

In order to be fair (get this logic), their goal is for all branches eventually to have equal hours regardless of how established or how new they are, regardless of how many people they serve, regardless of what the circulation is, and regardless of what or how many programs are implemented.

To say the least, I have a hard time dealing with this "unfair" definition of equality. Let me show you why.

For a good example, let's look at the Juliaetta Community Library, one of the busiest branches and one I am most familiar with in the Moscow-Latah Library System where a cut of 4 hours per week has been proposed.

After talking with the Juliaetta librarians, I found the proposal cuts into the following activities. They are popular, successful programs which translate certain messages to patrons if they are to be dropped:

1) The After-School Club. "Sorry, kids. No need to rush down to the library anymore on Wednesdays for a pleasant midweek break. After all, we don't want you hooked on going to the library and liking it."

2) The Junior-High Book Talks. "Sorry, teen-boppers. But you don't like to read anyway so why even try to tease you into reading anything."

3) The Johnson Manor Book Exchange. "Sorry, folks. Even if you can't get out, you won't get books delivered to your lounge anymore."

4) The Senior-Citizen Movie Program. "Sorry, people. Find your own movies for the noon luncheons."

Then, when I questioned these proposed cuts at the Public Hearing on August 14th, Troy district member Zoe Cooley used the wormy reply: "Well, there's Nez Perce County people using the Juliaetta Library anyway and that's unfair to Latah County."

But our good Nez Perce County neighbors use Latah County roads, Latah County schools, and other Latah County services. You mean we draw county lines at the Juliaetta Library?

Dear me, I use the Nez Perce County Library and I've never heard them complain about my being a Latah County resident using their services. In fact, just last month while in the Denver area, I used library services there without a single sneer of "out-of-state resident" or a cry of "This is unfair to our Jefferson County patrons to serve this person from Idaho." The Colorado library loved having me check out their books and videos just as my next-door neighbor Nez Perce County does.

You see, when it comes to libraries, we're all good neighbors who enjoy good service and who delightfully serve each other's needs with pleasure.

But when this good library service is cut in the names of "fairness and equality" (or even "compromise") I question the thinking and motives behind such definitions. Fairness and equality breed good will—not ill feelings, frustrations, and burnouts.

The Latah County District Library Board members, particularly those from Troy and Deary, best evaluate their selfish thinking and political motives, re-define their terms, then re-consider their cuts for the 1990-91 library year before they approve its budget in September.

They seem to feel no written response from patrons means positive support for their decisions. So why not jot a note off to the board to let them know how you feel? It doesn't have to be fancy or formal. Just state your message, request a reply, sign your name, and send it to:

Alice Kuykendall Passes August 30

Alice D. Kuykendall, a life-long Kendrick area resident and homemaker, died Thursday, August 30, at the Moscow Care Center where she had been a resident for a short time, of causes related to age. She was 85.

She was born Dec. 21, 1904, to William and Otilla Freytag at Kendrick and lived on the family farm near Leland, Idaho. She attended Kendrick High School.

She and Wayne S. Kuykendall were married Aug. 31, 1925, at San Diego, Calif. He died May 29, 1963. She moved to Kendrick in 1942 where she lived, except for a brief time when she lived at Wallace, Idaho and Seattle.

She enjoyed gardening, crocheting and embroidery.

Survivors include three sons, Elroy W. Kuykendall of Orofino, Richard A. Kuykendall of Coeur d'Alene, and William Kuykendall of Reardan, Wash.; a daughter, Cleo V. Maloney of Seattle; a sister, Mae Helton of Lewiston; 14 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

Ten brothers and sisters died previously.

Funeral services were held at 10 a. m. Tuesday, Sept. 4 at Malcolm's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston. Burial was at Normal Hill Cemetery.

The family suggests memorials may be sent to the Kendrick-Julietta Ambulance Service or the Kendrick Senior Citizens Center.

Forrest Winch, 74, Died August 24

Memorial service for Forrest Winch, 74, a longtime St. Maries, Idaho resident was held Tuesday, August 28, at Yates-Hidge Funeral Home, St. Maries.

Mr. Winch, who died Aug. 24, was born and raised in Payette. After college in Fullerton, California, he served with the Flying Tigers of the U. S. Army Air Corps in China during World War II. During the war he was also personal bodyguard for Chiang Kai-Shek's daughter. After his discharge, he returned to St. Maries.

In St. Maries, he managed the Blister Post camps for the U. S. Forest Service and continued firefighting as a career. Before retirement he worked three years for the Job Corps as a purchasing agent.

Survivors include his wife, Bernadine, whose is the daughter of the late Emil and Silvia Peters of Leland, stepsons Vince Peters, St. Maries, and David Hudson of Clarkston, Wash., and three step-grandchildren.

Tigers Maul Deary 54-6 In Opener

The Kendrick Tigers rolled up a 24-0 lead in less than six minutes of the first quarter, then went on to win the opening game of the 1990 football season 54-6 over the visiting Deary Mustangs Friday evening. Kendrick just had too much of everything for the game but out-classed young Mustangs.

It took the Tigers less than two minutes to score Friday night as they received the ball on the opening kick off. Reece Hewett passed to Cade Konen who brought the ball to the Deary 27. A pass to Jarrod Silflow put the ball on the Deary 8. Hewett was sacked on the next play but he bounced back to pass to Shane Taylor in the end zone for the touchdown. Konen ran the conversion and the Tigers lead 8-0 with 10:36 still on the clock.

Deary fumbled around trying to pick up the return kick and the ball ended up on their own 4 yard line. Kendrick's defense held the Mustangs to downs and the Mustangs had to punt. Kendrick took over on the Deary 40 and on the first play Hewett dropped back to the 48, passed to Konen who took it on the 20 and ran down the side line for another Tiger tally. Silflow ran left over the conversion and with 9:11 left in the quarter it was 16-0 Kendrick.

Brady Lohman recovered a Mustang fumble to set up the next KHS touchdown as he came up with the ball on the Deary 44. A pass from Hewett to Konen put the Tigers on the 10 yard line, but the play was called back because of a holding penalty. The Tigers scored a few minutes later as the Hewett to Konen combination worked once more with Konen going in from the 32. Shane Taylor ran in for the points after touchdown.

Deary was still full of fight and drove to the Kendrick 26 yard line, picking up three first downs. From the 26 the Mustangs passed down to the Tiger three just as the first quarter ended 24-0.

In the opening seconds of the second quarter Deary sent its senior running back Matt Frederick right up the middle for six yards and the only Deary score of the game. The try for extra points was stopped by the Tiger line.

Kendrick wasted no time in answering Deary's touchdown with 3 more of their own in the second quarter. A Hewett to Konen pass play covering 46 yards scored for the Tigers and Silflow ran the extra points for a 32-6. After recovering a Deary fumble at mid-field a few minutes later, the same Reece to Cade pass play worked with Cade taking the ball at the twenty and going into the end zone. Konen ran the extra points over and it was 40-6.

KHS scored again before the half was finished with Konen going 45 yards for the Tiger score and Jason Witt ran the conversion across to give Kendrick a 48-6 halftime lead. Coach Ken Swanger took a lot of the pressure off in the third period and used his bench strength freely. The third quarter was a defensive battle for the two teams and no points were scored.

Finally in the fourth quarter the Tigers ended the game four minutes early as Reece Hewett kept the ball on an option play and went 35 yards to score again and make it 54-6. When one team leads another by 45 points or more, the game is automatically terminated.

Hewett completed 9 of 16 passes for 225 yards and four touchdowns. Konen had four receptions for 133 yards and rushed for 138 yards on five carries. He scored on runs of 45 and 35 yards.

Friday the Tigers pack up and go to Clark Fork for the second game of the season.

Plans for Centennial Progressing Well

Plans for Kendrick's Centennial celebration on Saturday, October 13 are starting to take a definite form as the centennial committee met again last Thursday evening to discuss the 100th-year observance and what will happen that day.

Fifteen members of the committee were at the Centennial Center and the first topic of discussion concerned the food booths. Donna Heinen and Barbara Clayton reported that seven organizations have indicated they will have food booths. They are:

Southwick Community Church—Russian foods;
Sweet Adelines—Homemade Cider and Pie;
Cameron Church—Sauerkraut and sausage;
J/K E. M. T.s—Genesee Sausage Busy Bee Club—Chili and French Bread;
Young Women of Idaho—Fry Bread;
Kendrick Grange—Pie House.

After a discussion it was decided to limit the number of food booth to not more than 12 and that these booths should be operated by local organizations rather than individuals. Organizations operating the booths will set their own prices and keep the money realized from the sales. However, the committee may have to charge a fee of \$10 per booth to help pay for the construction of the booths and also for electricity used.

Donna Heinen also reported that Phil's Food City has made arrangement for the appearance of Raphael, one of the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles to be in Kendrick October 13 and that he will also circulate around the park for pictures. This will be a great opportunity for kids to get their pictures taken with Raphael.

Marge Wilken reported that plans are well underway for the quilt show to be held at the Grange hall. She also reminded the group that a flower show will be held in the space between the cafe and the Kendrick County Store.

Also discussed was having a mini-fair display featuring locally produced crops, canned good and other items from the valley. Somewhere to set up this display is needed and will be studied and talked of later.

Printing a map locating some of the more historical buildings and homes in Kendrick is also going to be made so that out-of-town visitors might be informed.

Finding places for all the activities and events that day is getting to be a problem. Some events are going to be moved out to the high school grounds, probably the children races and some of the games, as well as a women's softball tournament. The school is agreeable to providing a shuttle bus that day for transporting people so that traffic problems will be eased.

Lee Halseth president of the VFW Auxiliary unit, reported that plans are going well for the Centennial Ball that evening. Commemorative wine glasses will be on sale for those who would like a true souvenir of the centennial. They will be suitably inscribed for the occasion.

The ball will be from 8 to 1:00 at the VFW Hall and admittance is by advance ticket sale only. The band, "This Is It" will provide the music.

A complete schedule of events should be available in a week or so.

The community band should start its rehearsals soon, and the community choir will have its first meeting this Friday night at the high school said Joanne Gertje.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK, COUNTY OF LATAH, IDAHO, AS FOLLOWS:
