## Opal B. Forest, 79, Passes Sept. 6

Big Bear Ridge farmer Opal Bernice Forest, 79, died of cancer Thursday evening, Sept. 6, at the Moscow Care Center. She had lived at the center since July.

She was born at Princeton, Idaho, March 9, 1911, to David Mitchell and Mary Rusco Fraser. She was the last surviving of their six children.

The family moved to Clarkston when she was 3 years old. They later moved to Kendrick, where she received most of her schooling.

On Nov. 18, 1931, she married Adolph Forest. The couple began farming on Big Bear Ridge that year, and she lived there until entering the nursing home.

Adolph died in 1976.

She loved horses and had a reputation as a fine horsewoman. She and her husband prided themselves on being kind and caring to all their animals. They raised cattle, pigs and chickens, and had dogs who became their family.

In a desire to be self-sufficient, they also raised large gardens and grew timber for fuel.

The couple had no children of their own but were close to their many nieces and nephews, many of whom came to stay with them each summer.

She is survived by several nieces and nephews.

The funeral was held Monday at Bethany Lutheran Memorial Cemetery on Big Bear Ridge. The family suggests memorials may be made to the Deary Volunteer Fire Department or the Deary Ambulance Fund.

Cause of the fire is unknown.

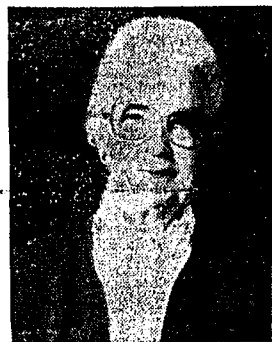

A "Mini Country Fair" featuring locally-grown produce, canned goods baked items and even cake decorating will be another feature of the Kendrick Centennial Day on Saturday, October 13. Under the chairmanship of Elaine Galloway and Debbie Ackerman, the fair will be held in the building that once was the Kendrick Variety Store, (between Cuippeppers Clothing and Harris Accounting.)

Items will be judged by a panel of local senior citizens and ribbons will be awarded with a top prize in each division. Categories include fresh fruits, fresh vegetables, sun flowers, honey, eggs, soap, canned fruits or vegetables, pickles, jams, jellies, baked goods: yeast or quick breads, pies, decorated or undecorated cakes, cookies and candies.

There will be a junior and senior division in each category and children of all ages are encouraged to participate.

It is requested that all entries be brought to the old variety store building between the hours of 3:00 to 7:00 p. m., Friday, October 12. Judging will be done after 7:00 on Friday evening.

As an added attraction there will be an amateur photography division. Pictures will be accepted matted, unmatted, or framed. Categories will be wild life, still life, scenery, flowers and a special division for "old photos." All pictures will be displayed on the walls so frames will be appreciated, if available. ## J-K Community Development Assoc. Begins Move To Attract Retirees

Representing the Juliaetta-Kendrick Community Development Association, Frank Jacobson last week attended a four-day workshop in Lewiston focusing on how to attract retirees to the Clearwater Valley.

Operating under a grant from the Forest Service and with professional guidance from LCSC's Institute for Community Development, the communities of Kamiah, Orofino, Juliaetta-Kendrick, and Lewiston will together over the next few months identify those features of Clearwater Valley life that will attract certain targeted groups of retirees and thus help offset a potential loss of jobs and income in the forest industry.

Jacobson, who has been chosen by LCSC to act as a "community encourager," will within the next few days begin calling together a task force to help assess the Juliaetta/Kendrick community and begin designing a marketing plan to attract retirees who are seeking the treasured life style associated with our area.

Because the task force must be representative of the community as a whole, organizations and special interest groups in Juliaetta and Kendrick are encouraged to begin now identifying those persons who might be willing to represent their point of view. ## Tigers Blitz Clark Fork 58-12 for Second Football Win



Tiger fullback Jarrod Silflow picks up yardage against one of the Clark Fork Wampus Cats Saturday afternoon. Kendrick rolled to a 58-12 victory over the Cats in a non-league football game. It was the second win of the season for Coach Ken Swanger's Tigers, who have yet to play a complete game. Both wins for the KHS squad have been cut short in the fourth quarter after Kendrick built up more than a 45 point lead and the "mercy" rule was invoked.

Kendrick wasted no time Saturday showing the Wampus Cats what team had the power. The Tigers scored touchdowns the first five times they had possession of the ball. Reece Hewett, the Tiger quarter back, put Kendrick on the board first with a 5 yard run. Cade Konen ran across the conversion. Hewett passed to Shane Taylor in a play covering 48 yards for the next touchdown and

then ran over the conversion himself. Konen took a ten yard pass from Hewett for the third Tiger score and Jason Witt ran the extra points over for the Tigers who ended the first quarter with a 24-0 lead.

In the second quarter Konen went 22 yards for the Tigers who finally missed a conversion attempt with a failed pass. Again it was Konen who scored the next KHS tally, this time on a pass from Hewett good for six more points. The extra point try on a run didn't work but it was the Tigers out in front 36-0 at the half.

All the Tigers got to play Saturday afternoon and Shane Taylor scored for Kendrick in the third quarter on a 35 yard play with a pass from Hewett. The Hewett to Taylor combination worked again for the extra point.

Clark Fork came up with its own touchdown next with Katz going 8

yards on a run. The Tigers answered that touchdown with Hewett keeping the ball and galloping 72 yards for the next Tiger tally. The Cats scored against Kendrick again in the third quarter on a three yard run which they couldn't convert.

Barely into the final quarter of the game, Hewett again kept the ball and went 60 yards for a touchdown that made the score 58-12. That was over a 45-point lead for Kendrick and invoked the differential rule to end the game.

A recent poll indicated that Latah County voters felt that it was more important for the legislature to address education, the environment, or drug abuse before the issue of a woman's right to reproductive freedom. I agree, but in the Latah County Senate race, the only issue that clearly distinguishes the candidates is the question of freedom of choice. As an independent on the ballot, I feel that education is a critical government activity and must be well-funded because the investment made in education is well returned by the successes of an educated citizenry. My opponents will agree.

Our foolish destruction of the planet's environment cannot go on and government must act in an economically reasonable way to preserve our environment. My opponents will agree.

Society's present effort to control drug and alcohol abuse is not working well and government, as well as private groups, must act more effectively on this issue. My opponents will agree.

Only on the question of whether the individual woman or the government should make reproductive decisions do the Senate Candidates for Latah County disagree.
