Tigers Batter Trojans 50-0

Kendrick's tough Tiger football team rolled up its third win of the season last Thursday night at Troy, battering the Trojans 50-0 in a league game. This was the third win without a loss for Coach Ken Swanger's Tigers, who have yet to finish a 45-minute game. The contest Thursday, like both other wins, was halted in the third quarter when the 45-point differential rule was invoked.

Cade Konen and quarterback Reece Hewett did all the scoring against Troy. Cade scored two touchdowns on runs, one on a pass and another on a 55 yard punt return late in the third quarter that ended the game.

In addition to throwing Konen one of his touchdown passes, Hewett scored on three touchdowns.

Konen put Kendrick on the scoreboard in the first quarter with a 15 yard run. It was 6-0 after the run for the extra points failed. Hewett also scored in the first period, this one on a four-yard run with Jarrod Silflow adding the 2-point conversion.

The Tigers put it on ice in the second quarter as Konen scored on a 40 yard pass from Hewett and Reece ran the conversion over; Hewett went 62 yards for the next KHS touchdown with Silflow again running the conversion; Konen scored from 5 yards out and the kick try for the extra points failed; Hewett scored again from 11 yards out and Jason Witt ran over the extra points, and it was a 44-0 game at the half.

Using his bench strength freely, Coach Swanger's Tigers and Troy battled scorelessly in the third period until Konen picked up a Troy punt with about a minute left in the quarter and went 55 yards for the final tally.

Hewett had another great night in the passing department, completing 9-of-14 for 196 yards.

Ardythe L. Heimgartner, 58, Claimed by Cancer

Ardythe L. Heimgartner, a Julietta homemaker, died of cancer Wednesday, September 12, 1990 at her home on Stoneypoint. She was 58.

She was born February 17, 1932, to Clarence and Luella Engberg Lindor of Bellingham, Wash. She lived at Bellingham until the mid-1940s, when she moved to Coeur d'Alene and then to Julietta in 1947.

She graduated from Kendrick High School. She married Roy C. Heimgartner July 20, 1951, at Colfax.

Mrs. Heimgartner enjoyed caring for her lawn and gardens, arranging flowers, working with stained glass, quilting, needlepoint, embroidery, knitting and watching her grandchildren participate in sports.

She was a member of the Hill and Valley Garden Club, Idaho Women for Agriculture, American Agri-Women, Stoney Point Friendship Club, the Julietta Community Church and was a life member of the Idaho State Federation of Garden Clubs.

Survivors include her husband, Roy, of Julietta; two sons, Lee of Julietta and Dale of Naknek, Alaska; a sister, Ione-Peters of Julietta; two brothers, Harold Lindor of Newport, Oregon, and Elmer Lindor of Ione, Washington; and four grandchildren, Leah, Lynn, Chad and Jeremy.

Funeral services were held Saturday, Sept. 15, at 2 p. m. at Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston with the Rev. Lonnie Williams officiating. Organist was Mrs. Marjorie Stevens. Singers were Doug and Amy Lohman and musical selections were "How Great Thou Art", and "The Old Rugged Cross".
