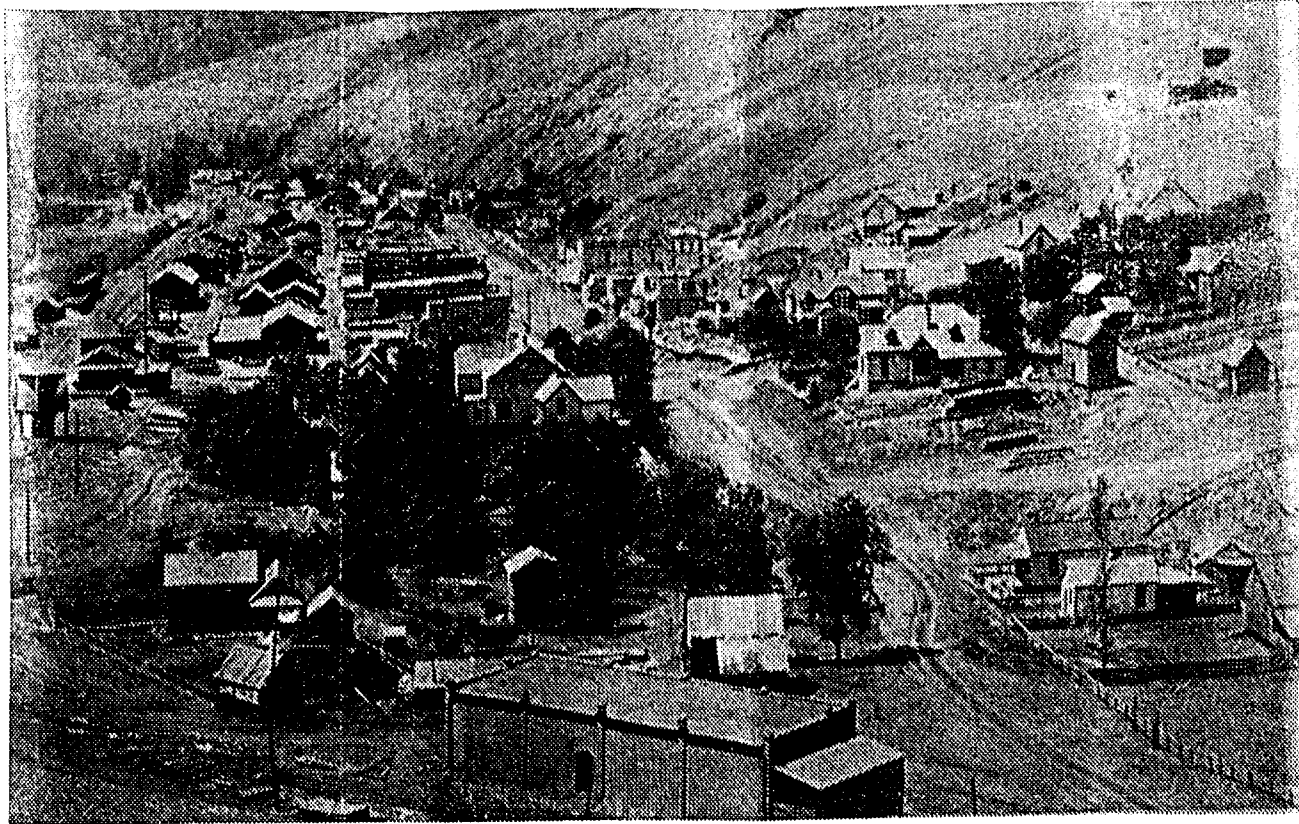

This was Kendrick in 1909—



THE COMMUNITY OF KENDRICK was incorporated as a city in 1890. In this old photograph, taken in 1909, Kendrick sprawls quietly along the banks of the Potlatch River. In its nineteen years, the city had survived two major fires and a disastrous flood and was still serving the needs of a two hundred square mile trading area.

Eighty-one years after this picture was taken (looking east to west), the community prepares to celebrate its Centennial Anniversary on Saturday, October 13. Almost two years of planning and work will culminate with a full day of entertainment and activities.

The funeral for Mildred Konen Blanfield, a Deary and Bear Ridge homemaker, will be held at 2 p. m. Thursday at Vassar-Rawls Funeral Home at Lewiston. The Rev. John Morse will officiate.

Burial will be at Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens.

Mrs. Blanfield, 82, died of causes related to age Saturday, Sept. 29, 1990, at Latah Care Center at Moscow.

She was born Nov. 8, 1907, at Tacoma, Wash., to Joseph P. and Katherine Konen.

Her family moved to the Lewiston area when she was a young child and she was raised in the Tammany and Leon, Idaho (between Genesee and Uniontown), areas.

She married Allen M. (Bing) Blanfield Aug. 22, 1927, at Genesee.

He worked in the construction industry and they lived in several locations in the Northwest until they settled in the Lewiston area, where he began work for the Idaho Department of Highways.

When he retired in 1967 they moved to a ranch at Big Bear Ridge, located in the Kendrick-Deary area.

Her husband died in March of 1973, and she moved to Deary in 1980 to be near her daughter.

She was a member of the Big Bear Ridge Happy Home Club and enjoyed gardening and crossword puzzles.

Survivors include a daughter, Joyce Ann Dean of Deary; a brother, Melvin Konen of Lewiston; three grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

The family suggests any memorials be made to the Deary E. M. T. Defibrillator Fund, in care of Roberta Day, Deary, Idaho 83823.

Tigers Rip Bulldogs 55-8 For Win No. 5

Kendrick's powerhouse Tiger football team rolled up 22 points in the first quarter and never looked back. Coach Ken Swanger and his KHS team defeated an out-gunned Bulldog squad 55-8 Friday night on the Kendrick gridiron in the first league game of the season for Kendrick. The Tigers, unbeaten in five starts, are ranked number 2 team in the state in the AP poll.

It took the Tigers just under 3 minutes to score against the Bulldogs. Kendrick had lost the coin toss and kicked off to Genesee, but on the third play from scrimmage, Cade Konen intercepted a Bulldog pass on the fifty yard line and ran the ball back to score. Konen also ran the conversion over and it was an 8-0 game with 9:29 left in the first period.

It didn't take Tiger quarterback Reece Hewett very long to unleash his passing attack and he dropped a pass into Bob Wegner who took it on the Kendrick 30 and scampered 70 yards down the sidelines to score. The Tigers got called for a back-field in motion penalty on the conversion try and it cost them 2 points.

Still in the first quarter, Genesee gave up the ball on downs and the Tigers took over on their own 45. A Hewett to Konen pass brought the ball to the Bulldog 18. The GHS line stiffened there and the Bulldogs gave up yardage grudgingly. Kendrick faced a 4th and 1 situation on the Genesee 7. The Tigers made it down to the 4 yard line, then lost 5 yards when they took too long in the huddle. Now back on the 9, Hewett kept the ball himself on the next play and scored. Jason Witt added 2 more points when he ran the conversion over. Kendrick was ahead 22-0 as the first quarter ended.

Cade Konen had an nice 80 punt return called back early in the second quarter that would have meant 6 more points for Kendrick and when the ball was finally placed down again, the Tigers were back on their own 17. It didn't really mean that much because on the next play Hewett flipped the ball to Shane Taylor who took it on the 18 and went 82 yards to score. Bob Wegner then proceeded to hit the extra point with a perfect boot and Kendrick was ahead 29-0.

Hewett was sacked by the Bulldogs with 6:50 left in the second period and with their backs to the goal line Kendrick punted away for the first time in the game. It didn't turn out too badly for the Tigers as they recovered their own punt on the 50 yard line. Two plays later Hewett found Konen with another TD bomb and it was 35-0 after the kick went wide.

Chad Heimgartner set up the next Tiger touchdown with his pass interception. Shawn Tanata now quarterbacking for KHS, moved the ball to the Genesee 1 yard where Jason Witt ran it over just before half-time which ended with Kendrick coasting along with a 41-0 lead.

Still game and trying hard, the Bulldogs came out in the third period and took a bite out of the Tigers on a 85 yard pass play from Dean Shirley to Terry Feigenbutz and the Bulldogs added two more with a successful conversion.

Reece Hewett had intercepted a Bulldog pass and went 30 yards to score only to have a penalty call nullify the play. Konen came back with a 42-yard run that did count for a touchdown and then ran over the extra points.

And, finally, with just a little over nine minutes left in the fourth period, Hewett threw to Ryan Blewett who gathered it in and went 25 yards for the touchdown that ended the game via the 45-point rule. The Tigers have now played and won five times and have yet to go a full 48 minutes.

Other afternoon attractions include three short, 1-act plays at the high school during the afternoon. Exact times to be announced later.

Big Game Plan Options Considered

Idaho Fish and Game commissioners met in a working session with Idaho Department of Fish and Game staff on September 21 to discuss options for management of deer and elk from 1991 to 1995. The options reflect a variety of responses to comments received at public meetings across the state. Final action on the deer, elk and antelope five-year management plans will take place at the October 18-19 commission meeting in Lewiston.

At that time, commission will consider the proposals made in the draft plans as printed, as well as options

which include a modification of "calendar date" season opens to avoid Sundays. If approved this would establish a process to change a season normally opening on Sept. 1, for example, to August 31, if the September date was a Sunday.

The commission will consider later opening of deer hunts in southern Idaho in recognition of landowners' and livestock grazers' problems with entry of hunters before cattle are removed from the range.

The sentiment of the commission was that it is not likely to approve the establishment of a white-tailed deer tag, which was strongly opposed in Region 1. Hunters in this Panhandle region where both whitetails and mule deer are present have become accustomed to purchasing a general deer tag and having the option of harvesting the first legal deer they see. Under the white-tailed-mule deer option, a hunter could harvest only the one deer presently allowed, but would be restricted to either a white-tail or mule deer, depending on which tag had been purchased.

The commission is "inclined to impose a cap on the numbers of elk hunters" allowed, although it has not yet investigated any method for establishing that number. Commissioner Dick Meiers (District 3) voiced the concerns of the group that, "we are approaching the limit of pressure that our elk herds can absorb without diminishing the qual-

ity of the herds and the hunt."

The draft plan for elk provided for offering special hunts during the rut on a controlled-hunt basis after a predetermined ratio of bulls to cows in the herd is met. The commission expressed concern about the possibility of special hunts until recovery of bull:cow ratios occurs and there is evidence of public acceptance of the hunts. Much of the public comment received at meetings was in opposition to special hunts.

The commission confirmed, in response to public comments, that there will be no consideration of "choose your weapon" regulations in the five-year plan.

At the start of Operation Desert Shield, USS Eisenhower and its battle group was directed to the Red Sea where they conducted maritime interception operations and coordinated with air, ground, and Naval components of the multinational force in the region.

In the Mediterranean, the USS Eisenhower and its battle group continued their support of Operation Desert Shield. The return of the battle group demonstrates the flexibility of our Navy and its ability to provide and sustain the Naval presence required by operational commanders.

A 1988 graduate of Kendrick High School, he joined the Navy in May of 1988.

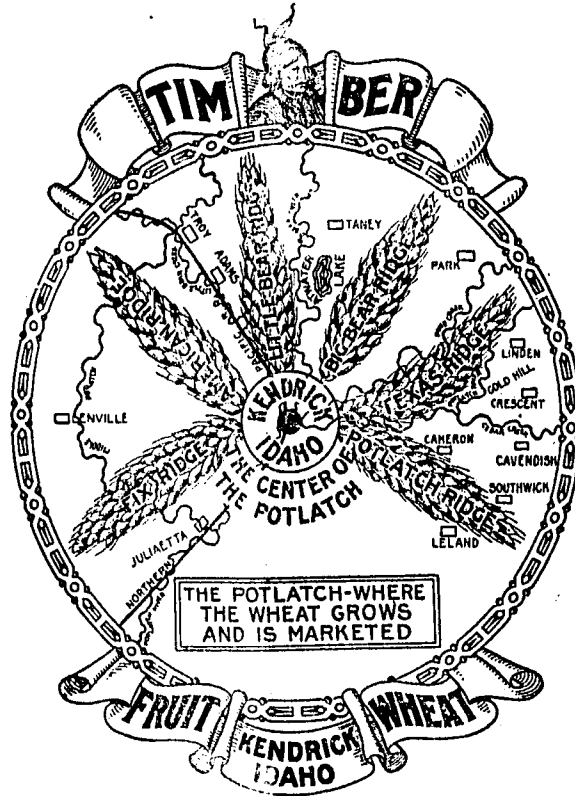
