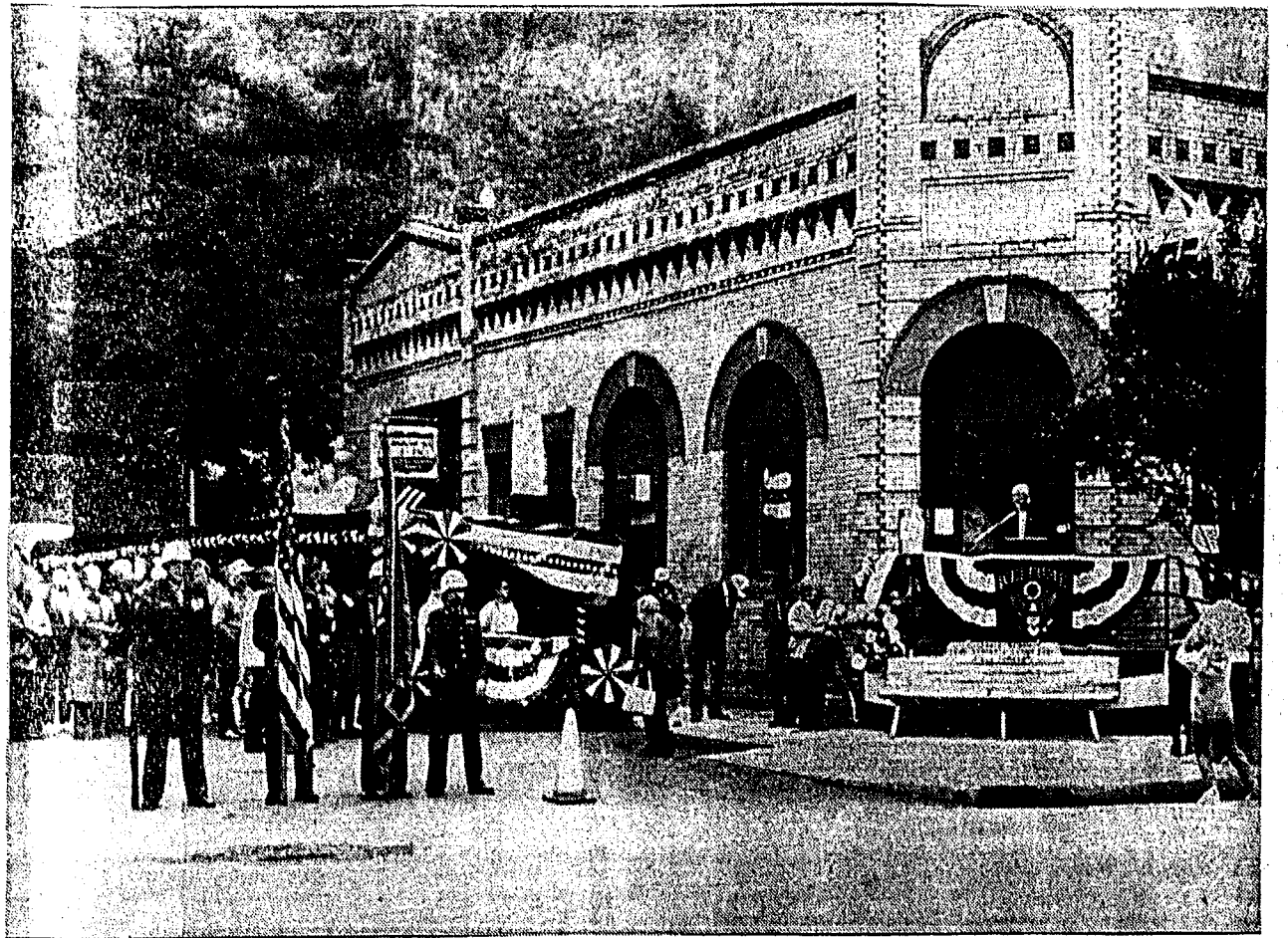

Australian Consul General was Guest at J/K Development Assoc. Luncheon

Over sixty members and guests of the Juliaetta-Kendrick Community Development Assoc., enjoyed the wit and charm of David Charles, Consul General of Australia, who was a special guest at a luncheon held at the Kendrick Senior Center Thursday, October 11.

Mr. Charles was in the area to attend a trade conference at Lewis-Clark State College and he accepted the invitation of the local group to attend the opening of Kendrick's Centennial weekend.

Charles was accompanied to the luncheon by Bill Kerr, a business analyst from LCSC.

Following an excellent buffet prepared by The Town and Country

Diner, Association president Harry Burmeister welcomed the members and guests to the luncheon and then turned the meeting over to Frank Jacobson who served as master of ceremonies.

After his introduction by Jacobson, Charles explained to the audience that a consul general is much the same as an ambassador. They represent their nation in matters of international trade and other business. Charles serves the northern area of "California" and the Pacific northwest.

"Seizing the Opportunity" was the theme of the Consul General's remarks as he told the group that for both Australia and America things are changing dramatically in Asia and the South Pacific rim regions. Economic growth in both the Pacific and Asia, Charles said, is greater than that of Europe's.

"We can't go over there and dictate terms anymore," he said. "We have to learn their way of thinking," he stated, if we are going to trade and maintain successful relations. The Asia-Pacific regions are booming, Charles said, and added that we must be ready to change to meet the new world.

Turning to Australia, Charles reminded the audience that his nation is about the same size as the United States and is also rich in natural resources such as oil, gold and other minerals. Australia could be an oil exporting nation, and might well be in the future, he said, because of its rich reserves. While Australia is a big producer of wheat and grain, it can't rely on commodities alone, he said, adding that for the past 10 years Australia has been concentrating and industry and manufacturing to develop the potential to deal successfully with future challenges.

Tigers Topple Troy 52-6 in Homecoming Game for Seventh Straight Win of Season

Recovering nicely from a shocking first quarter touchdown scored against them, the Kendrick Tigers went on to batter the visiting Troy Trojans last Friday night on the KHS field 52-6 in the KHS Homecoming game. It was the 7th straight win of the season for the Tiger who now have only one regular season game remaining.

Troy, much improved from the earlier season contest between the two schools, was upset-minded for this battle. Kendrick won the toss of the coin and elected to receive. The Tigers took the opening kickoff but couldn't make yardage and started from the 18. Reece Hewett picked up 6 yards on the opening play from scrimmage then was sacked on the second down for a loss. Kendrick fumbled the ball on the third down, but did recover it and punted on the fourth down from inside their own 20. Troy fielded the punt on its own 45 yard line and picked up five yards on the first play—then the Trojans stunned the crowd and the Tigers on the second play as Joel Kerley broke through the Tiger line at mid-field and went fifty yards down the sidelines to score

a touchdown. Troy couldn't convert the touchdown but the KHS team found itself on the short end of the score, 0-6, for the first time this season. Less than 2 minutes were gone in the first quarter when the Trojans racked up the score.

Troy's big moment was over and the Tigers struck back quickly. Jason Witt took the kick and brought it back to the Tiger 40. On the next play Reece Hewett dropped back to pass, found his receivers were all covered, and then tucked the ball away and went 57 yards for a touchdown. Cade Konen ran over for the extra two points and Kendrick was out in front 8-6. They never looked back.

Kendrick crossed over the Troy goal line again with 4:34 left in the first quarter from two yards out only to have the play nullified by a clipping penalty. KHS finally yielded possession on downs but just minutes later Konen gathered in a Troy punt and went 46 yards to score. Hewett kept the ball himself on the conversion attempt and added two more points on a run. The score was 16-6 as the second quarter began.

Kendrick scored 3 touchdowns in the scored quarter for 22 points with a blocked punt setting up the first of that period's tallies. After blocking the Trojan punt, KHS had the ball on the Troy 11. Two plays later Jarrod Silflow banged across from 6 yards out and ran over the two-point conversion to make it 24-6. With 3:36 left in the first half, Hewett found Konen in the open and passed to him. Konen gathered in the ball and went 54 yards to score. Cade made the extra points good with a run.

Less than a minute later Hewett dropped back again, hit Shane Taylor with a short pass and Shane galloped down the side for 54 yards and another Tiger touchdown. Troy did stop the Tiger conversion run attempt and the Tigers took a 38-6 lead into the dressing room at halftime.

Following some halftime Homecoming activities (see separate story), Kendrick came out strong again and put an end to the one-sided contest via the 45-point differential rule.

Kendrick kicked off to Troy to start the second half and forced the Trojans to punt out of a bad situation. Kendrick took the ball down to the 14 on a reverse pass and Jason Witt went the final 14 yards to score. Hewett passed to Konen for the extra points and Kendrick led 46-6.

A few minutes later Shane Taylor got the ball on a reverse play that picked up 21 yards and the final points of the game that ended 52-6.

Only Friday's game with the Highland Huskies stands between the Tigers and the WhitePine League title.

KHS Students Part of Idaho Falls INEL Event

Thirty students from Kendrick, Troy, Deary and Pottlatch High School were among 370 scholars honored in Idaho Falls October 12 when the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory celebrated the kickoff of the first INEL Scholastic Tournament. The day's activities included an evening banquet with a keynote address by Nobel Prize-winning physicist and science-education advocate Dr. Leon Lederman, director emeritus of Fermi National Accelerator Laboratory near Chicago.

Attending from Kendrick High School were Brandon Bowen, Rachel Sunderland, Leah Fry, Melinda Cook, Robert Bacon and Justin Cope, along with team coach Colette Cozort.

Sponsored by the Department of Energy and the INEL's contractors, the tournament offers student teams from high schools around the state the chance to match their academic skills against those of other schools in a quiz-program format. According to Debu Majumdar, Manager of University Relations for the Department of Energy Idaho Operations office, "the INEL Scholastic Tournament helps to fulfill the Department of Energy's commitment to support educational programs."

Area schools will initiate local competitions beginning in November, in preparation for regional competitions scheduled for early April. Teams will be required to answer questions primarily about science and math, but also including English, history, government, and current events. Regional winners progress to the State Championship contest scheduled for April 19 and 20, 1991 in Boise. The State Championship will be broadcast statewide on public television.

A total of 114 Idaho high schools from throughout the state will be competing in the tournament. The teams will be organized into two divisions based on school enrollment, and a champion will be named for each division.

In addition to the banquet, the October 12 kickoff activities also included practice tournaments and presentations by INEL scientists and engineers.

Tournament Director Mel Richardson, a veteran Idaho Falls broadcaster, has conducted similar programs for southeast Idaho schools. He noted that the competition is a way for the INEL to recognize outstanding scholars and to encourage them in their math and science endeavors.

"Peer recognition is vitally important in keeping our top students directed toward careers in math and science," Richardson said.

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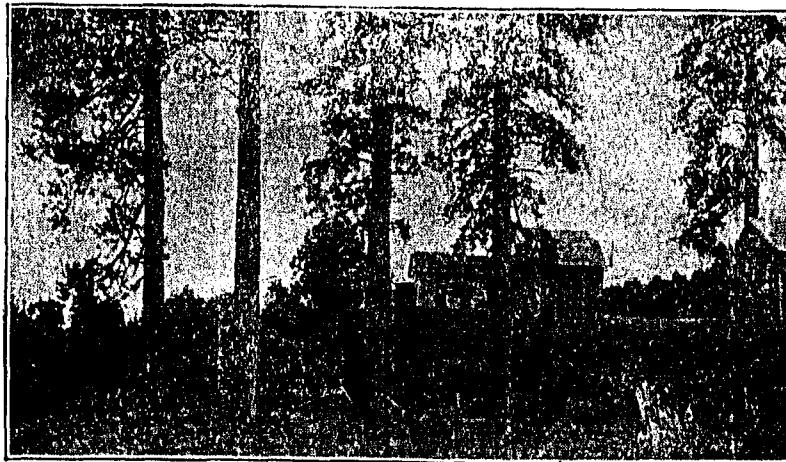



Arthur (Pete) Sellers Claimed by Cancer

Arthur C. (Pete) Sellers, 57, of Juliaetta, a retired draftsman, died of cancer Wednesday, Oct. 10, 1990, at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center at Lewiston.

**Economic Planning
Committee to Complete
Work this Month**

The ad hoc planning committee of the Juliaetta-Kendrick Community Development Association, now in the final stages of its work, has recently identified three activities that could immediately contribute to improving the economy of the area. The first is to compile and publish an up-to-date inventory of all business, cottage industries, and other small businesses operating out of homes.

The committee also sees a need to assess consumer attitudes and practices so far as local residents shopping in the Juliaetta-Kendrick area. The committee is recommending that professional help be sought to help design a questionnaire to measure these attitudes and practices, to interpret the results, and to plan for ways to encourage people to shop more at home. The committee looks to LCSC's Institute for Community Development to help in such an assessment.

The committee wants to see promotional projects developed for Juliaetta and Kendrick retail and service businesses in an effort to prevent or at least lessen the economic leakage that occurs as local consumers go elsewhere to shop for goods

and services. These three goals are seen as first-year activities to be pursued once the Juliaetta-Kendrick area is certified as a Gem Community by the Idaho State Department of Commerce. Long range goals for business development and expansion include: compiling an inventory of buildings and sites suitable for business use and initiating a program of local business visitations to determine their plans and needs.

The committee also recommends that local business people utilize the services of LCSC's Small Business Development Center. Bill Kerr, a business analyst from the center, is available in a counseling role to help local businesses—and at no cost. If interested in meeting with him, either in Kendrick or in Juliaetta, contact him at 799-2465.

The committee is currently completing its consideration of economic diversification options, including attracting new businesses to the area. Most promising and at the same time challenging are the prospects of attracting tourists, the self-employed, and retirees. The latter goal, that of attracting targeted retirees, has become a project in itself, and the planning committee will be recommending to the Community Development Association that it support efforts to conduct a community assessment of the possibilities of at-

tracting retirees help design a marketing plan, and help to implement such a plan. Frank Jacobson is currently seeking help from those groups who took part in the first community assessment a year ago, including the following: the Community Development Association, the VFW, Potlatch Ridge, the Lions Club, Kendrick Booster Club, the Juliaetta Nazarene Church, Senior Citizens, the Kendrick Grange, the EMT's, and high school students and staff. Jacobson would like to see additional representation from all of the communities making up the greater Juliaetta-Kendrick area. Please call him at 289-3302 to indicate your interest and support.

The ad hoc planning committee, under Jacobson's guidance, plans this month to complete its part in the application process required for the Juliaetta-Kendrick area to be certified as a Gem Community. The committee, which has been meeting twice monthly since May, will have devoted over 200 man hours to devising a proposed plan of action to improve the local economy. The balance of the elements required in the application will be completed by the Community Improvement Association.
