Kendrick Grange Takes First Place in State For Community Service Project

Kendrick Grange Master, Frank Jacobson, came home from the Idaho State Grange Convention in Nampa last week with some exciting news: Kendrick Grange's community service project took first place in state competition and has been sent on for judging in National Grange competition.

Jacobson credited the involvement of other community groups, with having given his Grange an edge in the competition. He also cites the news coverage provided by the Kendrick Gazette as being a big help in documenting the achievement of the whole community, which provided the J-K Ambulance Service and the EMT's with an up-to-date file of vital information on every family in the area.

Kendrick Grange will, at its next meeting Nov. 6, decide what its community service project will be for the next year. Possibilities include volunteering to become an arm of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Improvement Association or, more specifically, to provide support to the Forest Service project of attracting retirees to the Clearwater Valley. Another possibility is that of promoting recycling in the area.

Virginia Jacobson, Kendrick's outgoing Lecturer, received recognition from both the State and National Grange for her contributions and was named one of the three top Grange Lecturers in northern Idaho.

At its last meeting on October 16 the Grange learned that the local Future Farmers of America chapter at Kendrick High School is involved in a very full schedule of learning events that help young people sharpen their farming and livestock skills in a variety of ways. Introduced by their teacher Jim Nelson, Keith Taylor and Wyatt Hazeltine (President and VP of the FFA) spoke with enthusiasm about a wide variety of activities the club enjoys. Also Student Body President, young Taylor filled Grangers in on some changes at Kendrick High, especially the growth of interest in government,

public speaking, drama and music. The young men also handled questions from the floor with complete ease and confidence.

Looking back at a very successful Centennial Celebration, the Grange directed its secretary to write a letter of appreciation to Jim McKenzie for the use of his team and wagon in the parade. Those lucky enough to ride with Jim expressed admiration for his skill in handling the team, which was just a tad too eager before the parade really got underway. The Grange also asked its Master to express its appreciation to George Brocke, Jr., for his leadership and all his hard work following up on a multitude of details. Without George, the Grange feels, the celebration could not have been the great success it was.

The Grange also directed its Secretary to write Governor Andrus expressing appreciation for his positive stand on the need to earmark monies to improve Idaho's highways and bridges.

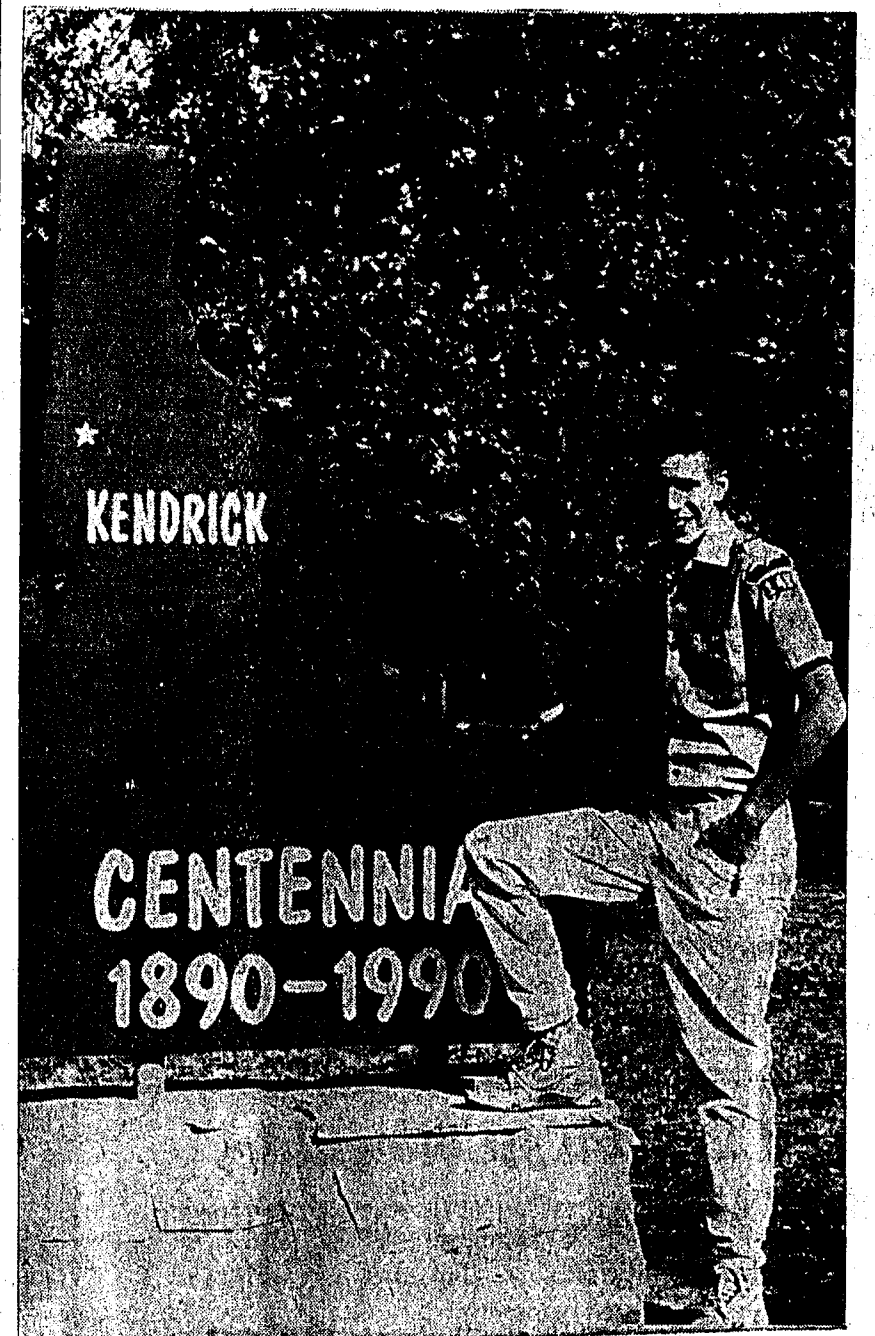

Wallace Park, in west Kendrick, now has an impressive new sign. Six foot tall, including its attractive concrete and rock base, the sign is the shape of the state of Idaho, showing the location of Kendrick with the wording at the bottom, "Centennial 1890-1990."

The sign is the Eagle Scout service project of Cameron Smith of Kendrick who is a member of Boy Scout Troop 148 of Lewiston. It will also be Cameron's enduring legacy to the community.

The service project, just one of the requirements to become an Eagle Scout can be a project for the community, church or school. Cameron chose a project for his community. The Scout plans and develops the project. He may involve scouts or

others in the completion of the project. Many hours are involved in these projects in which the Scout gains experience in cooperation and leadership.

Tigers Maul Highland 45-0 for Whitepine Championship; In District Playoff Friday

Kendrick High School's football machine, known informally as the KHS Tigers, kicked into high gear Saturday afternoon and rolled over the outgunned Highland Huskies 45-0 at Craigmont.

The victory, the eighth straight for the undefeated Tigers, gave them undisputed claim to the Whitepine League championship and made them the No. 1 seed for the Idaho Class B eight-man playoffs this Friday at the University of Idaho Kibbie Dome. The Tigers will meet Plummer-Worley, the No. 2 seed from the North Star conference, at approximately 8:15 p. m.

There was never a doubt about the outcome of the Saturday game after the first few minutes of play as Kendrick rolled up a 24-0 first half lead then polished off the hapless Huskies in less than four minutes of the third quarter with a 22 point outburst.

It was an aerial show put on by Tiger quarterback Reece Hewett, who protected by his strong offensive line, picked apart the Highland secondary, passing for 375 yards and five touchdowns before the 45-point "mercy" rule halted the contest.

In the first quarter, Hewett went to right to work with one of his favorite targets, Cade Konen and on the fifth play from scrimmage hit Cade with a 22-yard touchdown pass. Reece ran over the extra points himself and it was 8-0.

The next time Kendrick had possession of the ball it took Hewett just one play to find Konen again, this time unleashing an 88-yard scoring play. Hewett made it 16-0 when he again ran the conversion.

In the second quarter Hewett went to the outside of the line and connected with Shane Taylor on a 32-yard pass for another touchdown. This time it was Konen who ran over the extra two points.

Desperate Highland came out in the second half and attempted an on-side kick that backfired. The Tigers recovered the ball and one play later Hewett again went to Taylor on a pass play covering 65 yards and

worth six more points. Kendrick did not convert the extra points.

Kendrick showed Highland how an on-side kick play is supposed to work and recovered the ensuing kickoff on the KHS 45. Rolling on downfield after that, five plays later Jarrod Silflow packed the ball over from 1 yard out for another score and Jason Witt scampered over for the extra points.

The first time the Huskie had possession of the ball in second half they fumbled in the backfield and Hewett chased the loose ball backward toward the Husky goal, finally catching up to it on the Highland 7 yard line. From there the Tigers sent Konen across for the touchdown that made the score 45-0 and ended the contest after Witt again ran for the two points.

Commission Approves Deer, Elk, Antelope Plans

Meeting in Lewiston October 19, the Idaho Fish and Game Commission approved 1991-1995 management plans for elk, antelope, mule and white-tailed deer.

The commission will measure public acceptance before fixing a quota for elk tag sales, but will not allow more than 100,000 to be sold each year during the planning cycle. In 1989, 93,000 tags were sold, and it is not expected that demand will greatly exceed this prior to 1995. The commission will monitor the 1991 season impact on sales prior to considering a procedure for fixing possible quotas.

A backcountry elk tag will be required beginning in 1991, for hunters in certain units with limited access. The restriction of not hunting in other, more accessible units after opening for the backcountry tag will apply to all purchasers, regardless of their choice of modern or primitive weapons. The commission declined to write a blanket restriction on technological advances in primitive weapons, although they expressed the intent to maintain the primitive nature of muzzleloader and archery equipment. Individual issues, such as electronic sights, will be dealt with as it becomes necessary, rather than in a statement on the policy plan.

An early antelope archery season from August 15 through September 15 will expand early opportunity for archers during the years 1991-1995.

October 5 was set as the general opening date in southern Idaho, deer seasons, while the traditional Panhandle season will run from November 1 through December 1 in Units 1-6. There will be no adjustment for opening dates which fall on Sundays due to the calendar date-specific openers.

The proposed issue of separate white-tailed and mule deer tags was turned down.

In other business, the commission limited the issue of nonresident bound-hunter permits to 55, a move designed to preserve this opportunity for residents. The majority of those involved in use of hounds are mountain lion and bear hunters. Applications for refund of license

and tag or permit fees due to military call-up for duty in Saudi Arabia was approved for those received to date. The possibility of refund was expanded to cover reassignment due to the mid-east crisis which restricts a military person from using a permit. This will include persons who have received controlled-hunt permits but were transferred or restricted to military functions which make it impossible to utilize the permits.

The commission also issued a request for proposals to nonprofit organizations interested in auctioning a bighorn sheep tag with a minimum bid of \$30,000. The commission was opposed to a reduction of the minimum, which was put in place by legislative action.

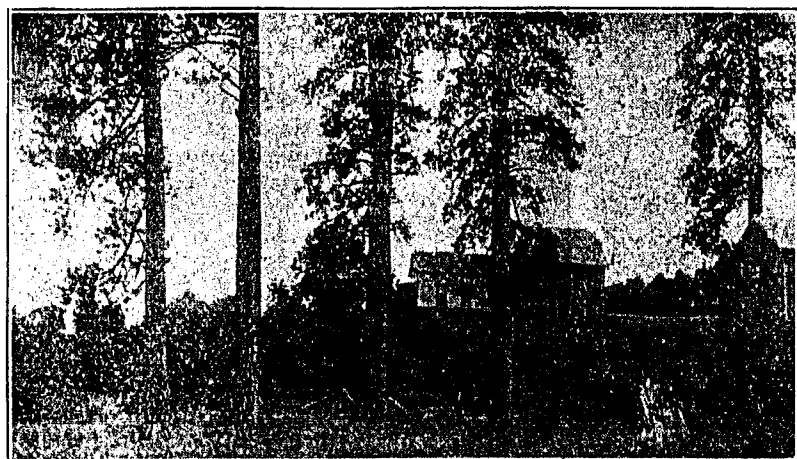

KHS'S Knowledge Bowl Team Learned from Trip To Idaho Falls National Engineering Laboratory

The KHS Knowledge Bowl's trip to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory was a great learning experience we will never forget. Justin Cope, Melinda Cook, Leah Fry, Rachel Sunderland, Brandon Bowen and Robert Bacon left on Thursday morning with students from three other schools. When we arrived, we were taken to the homes of very gracious host families. They had beautiful homes with lots of fun things to entertain us.

On Friday, a deluxe INEL commuter bus and an enthusiastic tour guide took us through EBR-1 (experimental breeder reactor), the first nuclear reactor ever in service. It converts nuclear fuel to electricity. We could push the "Scram" button in the control room and practice using robot arms to pick up simulated "hot" objects.

In the afternoon we saw displays and listened to a series of scientific lecture presentations. The robot that took and delivered polaroid pictures was the biggest hit. The INEL security force was represented. Their team came in second only to the Navy Seals in national competition. One worked with super-computers. These can multiply two 12-digit numbers 2 million times in one second. Another physicist uses lasers to check for defects in spaceships, bridges and other structures. A vet was one of the most dynamic speakers. He compared science to vegetables. Just as a healthy person needs vital nutrients from broccoli and carrots, we need to cultivate our liking of science for our nation to be strong. As machines take over human jobs, the people who will be employed will need high tech skills to deal with the machines.

Dr. Leon Lederman, a 1988 Nobel Prize winner in physics, was the speaker at the banquet. He stressed the need for young people to be excited and knowledgeable about science. He said that scientists must be able to work with people. Strong interests in communicating and the arts are critical for scientists to spark and share the spirit of human creativity.

We left Idaho Falls at 6:00 a. m. on Saturday morning. It was snowing as we crossed the Great Divide. Our trip was well worth the ride.

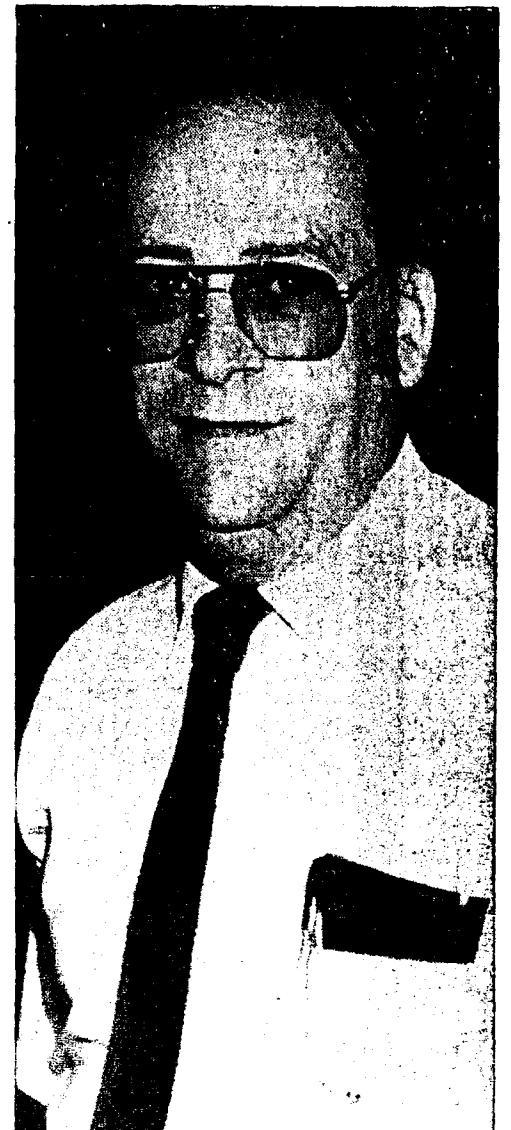

F&G Commission Responds to Steelhead Problems; Cuts Limits

The Idaho Fish and Game Commission, meeting in Lewiston Oct. 19, cut the hatchery steelhead bag and possession limits for the remainder of the 1990 season. The reductions, which are effective immediately, are in response to low numbers of steelhead returning to Idaho waters.

Clearwater River anglers will be able to keep two hatchery steelhead per day, have three in possession, and keep six during the season. Previously set limits were two, four and ten. The "B-run" steelhead making up the Clearwater run are delayed due to low, warm water, but are expected to reach quantities necessary to meet the needs of the hatchery program. The runs will be analyzed throughout the fall, and limits changed or reinstated for the 1991 season.

In the Snake and Salmon rivers, limits of one hatchery steelhead per day, one in possession and two for the season will replace the existing limits which allowed a season take of six hatchery fish and had varying possession limits. The steelhead runs in these rivers are in very poor shape, according to fisheries chief Steve Huffaker, due to poor out-migration survival of smolts, low survival in the ocean, and losses while returning up the Columbia and Snake rivers this fall.

Idaho Fish and Game in contacting wildlife agencies in Oregon and Washington, asking them to follow suit in boundary waters, including the Lower Granite pool.

To help ease the disappointment for Idaho steelheaders, the commission lifted certain restrictions on catch-and-release fishing. Anglers who catch and keep the daily bag limit, and have indicated this on their steelhead report card, may continue to catch and release steelhead. Those who have already caught the new season limit, or those catching the season limit later this fall, may still catch and release steelhead.

The commission stressed that anglers would not be cited for catch-and-release steelhead fishing under these possession limit changes. The one-time-only lifting of catch and release restrictions after reaching the season limit will not apply after December 31, 1990.

Fish & Game Backs Referendum to Replace Lost Tax Revenues

Calling it "a matter of fairness," Idaho Fish and Game Commissioner Keith Carlson registered his support for a referendum on the November ballot that would require the Department of Fish and Game to pay a fee in lieu of property taxes on all lands acquired to provide habitat for wildlife. In addition to benefiting county governments, which currently lose tax revenues when the department purchases private property, House Joint Resolution 14 would also help hunters and fishermen, according to Carlson.

"From the sportsman's view, it will enable the department to buy additional needed habitat in the future, because it eliminates the main argument against such purchases," he said.

In the past, some Fish and Game land acquisitions have met with opposition from county and state officials, who cited the fiscal impacts of removing lands from the tax rolls. In a recent department land trade for 12,000 acres of prime big game habitat in Shoshone County, county commissioners expressed their concerns at the loss of \$4,500 in tax revenue earmarked for the Avery School District.

"This (referendum) would alleviate that problem when land bought for the benefit of sportsmen impacts a community through loss of taxes," Carlson said.

The cost to the department of paying fees in lieu of taxes on the 116,000 acres of habitat its owns at a maximum of \$300,000. The measure protects sportsmen from inordinate increases in the property tax assessments with a clause that forbids the tax districts from reclassifying department property to increase the tax rate.

The additional funds required to pay the tax compensation fees would be drawn from hunting license revenues or Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration funds. Another option would be to redirect fine monies paid by persons who break fish and game laws. Only unimproved lands would be affected by HJR 14. Fish hatcheries, department offices and other administrative facilities would not be subject to the fees.

Wildlife agencies in adjacent sta-

tes including Washington, Wyoming and Utah are required to make in-lieu payments on their lands. A department survey of those and other states with similar laws revealed strong support for the compensation fee concept.
