With Governor Cecil D. Andrus as a special guest, Baker-Lind Post 3913, Veterans of Foreign Wars and its Auxiliary Unit brought Kendrick's October 13 Centennial Celebration to a most successful conclusion with a Centennial Ball at the V. F. W. Hall that evening.

The officers of Post 3913 wish to offer sincere appreciation to all the members, both of the Post and the Auxiliary, who worked and planned to make this event a success.

For the benefit of those who were unable to attend the Ball that evening, Auxiliary President Lee Halseth furnished this brief description of the event.

The ladies wore beautiful dresses and hats of the era, and the gentlemen wore suits and top hats. The hostesses for the evening wore long

dresses with pinafore aprons and the hosts wore dark slacks, white shirts with red bow ties. Red garters were worn on their right arm and white hats trimmed the patriotic colors of red and blue.

At six o'clock the ladies auxiliary of Veterans of Foreign Wars, Post 3913, accompanied their husbands for a group picture taken by Milt Patterson, and at seven o'clock the doors to the hall were open for the community on invitation.

At eight o'clock, Gov. Cecil D. Andrus arrived and was escorted by long-time friends Erle and Vivian Daniels, George and Helen Brocke, and Dana Magnuson. Charles Lyons served as Master of Ceremonies for the evening.

Flags were presented by former Navy servicemen Stan Hill and Keith Ford. A silent prayer was offered for our military personnel overseas.

Dana Magnuson, a member of the Latah County Commission, introduced Governor Andrus who spoke on the future of Idaho.

Vivian Daniels presented the Governor with two wine glasses, noting the occasion of the Centennial, as gifts from the post and the Auxiliary.

The orchestra, "This Is It" played "Here Is Idaho" and other selections from the 1890's.

Decorative colors in the hall were the patriotic red, white and blue and flowers, green plants and old Victorian dolls.

The table was spread with food and the centerpieces were horses and buggies and horses and sled, all in small replica. Vintage lamps were used for both lighting and decor.

Ada Westendahl and Quentin Carlson sold Centennial wine glasses as souvenirs and local photographer Milt Patterson took pictures of couples who wore costumes that evening.

Yellow ribbons were flying on the bannisters outside the hall. Also introduced that evening as special guests were Mr. and Mrs. Al Kendrick of Toppinsh, the grandson of James P. Kendrick, the N. P. engineer for whom the town was named.

Approximately 300 attended the Ball during the evening and all had a fine time. Baker-Lind Post 3913 extends an invitation to everyone to attend the annual New Year's Eve Ball in December.

Tigers Roar Past Lakeside 54-8 in Playoff Contest; Meet Mullan Saturday at Moscow

It may have been a playoff game but the Kendrick Tigers treated the Lakeside Knights from Plummer-Worley in the same manner they have been treating all opponents this season. The Tigers of Coach Ken Swanger ripped the Knights 54-8 Saturday evening in the Kibbie Dome at Moscow in a one-sided blitz that ended early in the final quarter when the 45-point rule was invoked for the ninth time this season for the KHS team.

Kendrick's win set up a contest between the Tigers and Mullan, also a Tiger team. Mullan rolled to a

42-6 win over Troy in the first game last Saturday. Mullan and Kendrick square off about 3:00 p. m. this Saturday at the Kibbie Dome in the next playoff round.

The Tigers dominated the air and controlled the ground Saturday night. Three of Kendrick's touchdowns came from passes (one an interception), and four on the ground as Reece Hewett completed 8 of 14 attempts for 236 yards. Hewett also added his contribution to the ground game rushing 12 times for 100 yards and a touchdown (57 yards).

Shane Taylor sparked in the one-sided match, scoring the first and the last Tiger touchdowns. His first was a 75 yard gallop after taking a Hewett pass in the first quarter. Cade Konen, another bright star on the Kendrick offense, ran over the extra two points. Later in the same quarter, Konen broke loose and ran 58 yards for the second Tiger touchdown and Jarod Silflow ran the extra points.

Plummer struck back in the second quarter with Chad Denny grabbing a pass from Knight quarterback Bob Matt and scoring on a play covering 30 yards. Matt who to leave the game later with an injury, passed to Greg McFadden for the extra two points.

That was all for the Knights as the Tigers answered back with three touchdowns of their own in the second period. Konen blasted over from 3 yards out but the extra points run failed. Then Hewett kept the ball himself and went 57 yards and Jason Witt went across for the conversion. Again it was Konen getting another six points this time on a 45-yard pass from Hewett and Hewett then found Taylor in the end zone for the extra points.

The pace slowed in the third quarter but the Tigers rolled up eight points anyway with Jarod Silflow scoring from 10 yards and Konen running the extra two points.

With slightly more than four minutes gone in the fourth period Taylor picked off a Plummer pass on his own 5 yard line and returned it all the way—95 long yards—for the touchdown. After Cade Konen banged across for the extra points the Tigers were ahead by more than 45 points and the game was over.

Permit Sales Ended October 31

The last regular day to purchase permit/stamp for archery and muzzle loader hunting was October 31, according to the Idaho Department of Fish and Game. The permits, priced at \$6 each for residents or nonresidents, are required when participating in hunts established for primitive weapons users and restricted to archery only or muzzleloaders only.

Late purchases may be made by hunters who have a valid controlled hunt permit, through the last date of the hunt; those who hold a "sportsman's package" license; military personnel from Idaho returning home after the cutoff date; and

those who acquire six month's residency or become 12 years of age after the cutoff date.

Art collectors may purchase the stamps with limited-edition art prints, but the stamps are not valid for hunting. Additionally, anyone may purchase the stamps after December 31.

Any holder of a valid hunting license and big game tag may use a muzzleloader or archery equipment in a general season hunt without purchase of a permit.
