Development Assoc. Hears of Centennial

The Thursday noon luncheon session of the Kendrick/Juliaetta Community Development Association was attended by a better-than-average number of members and friends who heard a variety of reports, and paid honor to the work of George F. Brocke on the recent Centennial celebration.

Following an excellent meal served by The Town and Country Diner, vice president Dirk Hammond called the meeting to order. After the reading and approval of the minutes of the previous meeting, Hammond introduced guests Bob Coleman, Jr., Marc Hagenah, and John Hedler all of Coleman Oil Co., Lee and Gerald Halseth, representing Baker-Lind Post 3913, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and Lora Schmidt, of Home Spun Dreams, a new Kendrick business. Also present were Mr. and Mrs. Horst Reil, who were active in the Centennial Celebration.

George Brocke gave a brief report on the Centennial and also on the Centennial History books which are now here and are available for purchase. The book fund is now at about \$4,600.00 and is nearing the "break even" mark.

Jim Hoogland said the regular accounts of the Development Assoc. are:

Checking \$2,415.40
Savings \$1,098.71

The Centennial Medallion Fund, which is kept separately, has a cash on hand and accounts receivable balance of \$8,964.17.

There were 1200 coins purchased at the outset of the project. There were 152 coins sold. There are 163 coins on hand at the bank, but 115 of these 163 are owned to merchants who made the original investment, so actually there are 48 coins that completely free for immediate resale.

The Medallion Committee's total income from coin sales is now at \$20,592. The cost of manufacturing the coins was \$13,465. A sales tax of \$552.00 was paid to the State. Total profit to date is now \$6,575.00. It might be well to again explain that all profit is to go to community development projects in Kendrick and Juliaetta.

Hoogland also told the group that sales at the Centennial booth on Oct. 13 totaled \$1,442.70. Of this total \$471 was from book sales and \$510 from the sale of the medallions or coins. The remaining money came from sales of T-Shirts, buttons, mugs, etc. And, there was \$135 income from booth rental that day.

Hoogland and the Centennial Committee offered sincere gratitude to everyone who has been selling the coins, books, and centennial items. "Everyone did a really great job," Hoogland said. "And, it was certainly appreciated."

Vice-president Hammond expressed his thanks, on behalf of the J/K Development Association to Abrams Hardware, Fleming Truck & Equip. Co., Coleman Oil, Potlatch Telephone Co., CableVision of Moscow, WWP, and Gem State Lumber Co. for the financial and material help that made the Centennial a success.

Dirk Hammond next presented an engraved plaque to Geo. Brocke in recognition of Mr. Brocke's efforts as Centennial Committee chairman. The plaque, in the outline of the state, had a medallion inset at the location of Kendrick and Juliaetta and lower on the award was an engraved plate expressing the appreciation of the community for Brocke's time and effort in presenting this community effort. A standing ovation from the audience was further testimony of the group's appreciation of the man and the award.

The other business the group heard of proposed plans to stage a Triathlon in the area in the Spring. This is an athletic event involving boating, running and cycling. No solid plans are made at this point.

The Association will also sponsor a Christmas, home decorating contest again this season. Sally Browning, Barbra Clayton and Donna Heinen are the committee and details will be presented later.

Grange Offers to be Work Arm of Community Development Assoc.

Kendrick Grange at its meeting on November 6 chose as its community service project for the coming year to offer its help to the Kendrick/Juliaetta Community Development Association in its program of promoting growth. Indicating its willingness to help in any way practical, the Grange stands ready to support a variety of development activities, including providing assistance to the Clearwater River Valley, a Forest Service project supported by the local Development Association.

The Grange's association with the local community development effort began a year ago as a kind of by-product of its community service project to assist the J-K Ambulance crew. At that time the Grange was one of the local service groups that participated in the community assessment process.

Master Frank Jacobson reported on the 82nd Convention of the Idaho State Grange, held in Nampa on October 24-27. Jacobson was enthusiastic about the fact that this year's Grange legislative session focused on issues of concern not only to Grangers but to the public at large. Sometimes preoccupied with its own internal operations, the State Grange this year took positions on broader issues such as the need to enforce the U. S. Constitution's inferred mandate for separation of church and state in the public schools. Jacobson reported that State Master Don Johnson's address was likewise directed towards issues that deserve Grange support and action, including those involving roads and bridges and the support of agriculture programs in the public schools of Idaho.

Delores Heimgartner reported on the successful efforts of FFA alumni to have up to 5 credits of high school vo-ag courses count towards satisfaction of entry requirement for the University of Idaho.

Reconsidering its policy regarding the use of the Grange Hall kitchen for money-making projects, the Grange will once again allow other organizations to use its kitchen for fund-raising activities provided that the organizations themselves pay the Idaho State sales tax due.

Grange will host Moscow Grange here for a 6:00 o'clock supper on November 20. Local Grangers should bring salads or vegetable dishes. The entrée and dessert will be furnished by the Grange and the November hostesses. Members of Deary Grange will very likely be coming, too. Plans for consolidation of Kendrick and Deary Granges are on hold awaiting approval from the State Master.

Tigers Trounce Mullan 62-34; Play For State Title Friday

Kendrick's powerhouse Tiger football team moved another step closer to the Class A-4 eight-man state championship Saturday night, running roughshod over the Tigers of Mullan High School 62-34.

The win, the 9th without a loss for Coach Ken Swanger and his squad, set the stage for a contest for the State Championship this Friday night at 7:00 p. m. in the Kibbie Dome at Moscow between KHS and Garden Valley. Garden Valley, the defending champions from last season have been ranked ahead of the Tigers in the AP poll all year.

Kendrick was defeated last year in the semi-finals by Plummer and it was obvious that the Kendrick team didn't want a repeat of that to occur. Showing a strong running and passing attack, the Tigers piled up a 46-8 first half lead and only a pass-and-pray throw in the final seconds of the second quarter saved the Mullan team from the invoking of the 45-point rule.

Jarrod Silflow drew first blood as he went 15 yards to score the first touchdown for the Tigers. Cade Koenen ran over the conversion to make it 8-0 and the Tigers were on the move. Koenen went 42 yards a few minutes later for the second TD and Shawn Tanata took a pass from Reece Hewett for the extra points. Hewett went to air again in the first period, this time passing to Shane Taylor on a 28 yard play for 6 more points and Koenen added two more on the conversion run.

Completely dominating the contest, Kendrick continued to pour it on in the second quarter with Cade Koenen scoring on a 51-yard run, Kendrick failed to convert on a pass play, then Koenen took a pass from Hewett good for 64 yards and another six point. Hewett passed to Taylor for the extra points. Hewett then got into the scoring column himself with a 9 yard run and Bob Wegner ran over the extra points. Mullan was spared the embarrassment of having the game called at the half when Mullan's quarterback connected on a 48-yard play to Troy Osiadacz with 10 seconds left in the second quarter. Murray converted for the Mullan Tigers.

Fired up by finally scoring a touchdown, Mullan came out and scored twice in the third period without an answer from Kendrick and Mullan closed the gap to 46-22 as the two teams went into the final period of play.

Young Shawn Tanata showed the team from the north that Kendrick still had the power as he went 13 yards for a touchdown and Silflow ran for the extra points. Mullan scored again on a 13 yard run by Osiadacz, but that was answered with a 46-yard gallop by Koenen and Silflow packed over the conversion again. Coach Swanger was easing off the pressure and Mullan managed another touchdown which they again failed to convert.

Kendrick rolled up 525 yards of total offense in the game. Hewett completed 12-of-20 passes for 196 yards and two TD throws to Taylor and Koenen. Reece rushed for 75 yards in 10 carries.

It was another fine performance by hard-running Cade Koenen who piled up 171 yards on 10 carries and scored four of the Tiger touchdowns, three by rushing. Cade hooked six passes for 142 more yards.

Shane Taylor finished with two receptions (one for a TD) for 40 yards and Jarrod Silflow added 71 ground yards on nine carries.

It is understood that a lack of available motel accommodations in Moscow Friday night for Garden Valley forced the change of the game from Saturday night to Friday.

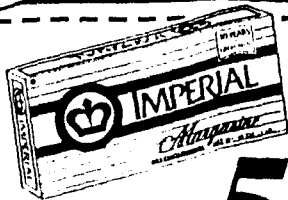
