Jack M. Delaney, 69, Retired Mail Carrier, Passes Away Nov. 14

Jack M. Delaney, 69, a retired Orofino mail carrier, died Wednesday, Nov. 14, at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center at Lewiston of leukemia and pneumonia.

He was born March 6, 1921, to George and Carlene Hartman Delaney at Orofino. He grew up at Clarkston and graduated from Clarkston High School. He attended Lewiston Business College for a year before being employed by the Orofino Creamery.

He served in the Army Air Corps from 1942 to 1945 in the Pacific Theater. After his discharge he returned to Orofino and worked at the creamery until it closed. He then became the rural mail carrier on Route 3. He retired in 1983.

He married Bonnie McCollister at Orofino April 21, 1946. She survives at the family home near Orofino.

He also served on the Clearwater County Draft Board and the board of directors of the Orofino Community Credit Union. He was a member of the Orofino United Methodist Church and a life member of VFW Post 2396 at Orofino.

Survivors include two sons, Joseph P. Delaney of Idaho Falls and Kenneth L. Delaney of Spokane; a brother, Ernest N. Delaney of Mill Creek, Wash., and five grandchildren. He was a brother-in-law of Mrs. Elsie Onstott of Kendrick.

Burial was at Riverside Cemetery at Orofino.

Advice from Educators: Study Skills can Reduce Test Anxiety

Success as a high school student depends greatly on how effectively students use their study time and face exams. Here are tips for both you and your students to build confidence and improve test scores.

Parents Can Help—

Take an interest in your student's performance in school.

Note test dates on your calendar and offer assistance in preparing for the test.

Avoid discussions, decisions or other major family activities that are stressful prior to the test date.

Provide a quiet, well-lighted, comfortable area for study in your home.

Provide nutritious meals and snacks.

Set up a reward system—financial, a favorite meal or treat, an extended curfew or whatever is appropriate for your family.

Be realistic. No test completely and accurately assesses every student's knowledge level.

Student Tips:

Taking Notes and Handling Reading Assignments:

Don't try to write down everything the teacher says. Write down key points in your own words. Pay particular attention to examples.

Don't be afraid to ask questions. If you don't understand, chances are others don't either.

Go over your notes that evening while they're still fresh in your head. Add whatever you need to make your notes more clear.

Before you start reading your textbook assignment, preview the material. Look at all the illustrations and read the captions. Read all the boldface works in the chapter and headlines. Read carefully the first and last chapter paragraphs. Briefly read any question, vocabulary lists, chapter summaries or objective if they are present. Skim the chapter before you read it thoroughly. A preview provides an outline for sorting the details of the chapter. It helps you remember what you read.

Study—

Study a little bit every night. Don't try to cram everything into your mind the night before the test. Don't study for long periods of time. Take a break occasionally.

Do read sitting up and use good lighting without shadows on your pages.

If you can't read for a reasonable time without getting tired, restless or experiencing burning eyes, you may have a vision problem. Have your eyes tested if there's any question. If you are supposed to wear glasses, WEAR THEM!

Preparing for Tests—

The night before the test, make time for enjoyable, relaxing activity and get sufficient sleep.

Exam day eat nutritious foods and reduce your caffeine intake—too many soda pops can add to your jitters.

Have with you the materials required for testing, such as pencils, pens, paper, etc.

Be realistic. This is only one test of many. Don't panic. Everyone feels tension before a test. Tension makes you alert. Let it work for you.

Read the entire test before you do anything else. This allows you to get rid of the "butterflies", start with the easiest questions. Budget your time, start your thinking on the tougher questions and perhaps pick up clues to some answers in other questions.

Look for clues in the questions themselves. Use the process of elimination for matching or multiple choice questions. In true/false test, look for words such as all, always, never, none. If you think of one exception, the question is false. For essay questions, think first, jot down a few key concepts in a simple outline, then write your answer.

Tigers Settle for Second in State Football Play-off

A nervous Kendrick Tiger football team had a hard time getting started last Friday night in the U. of I. Kibbie Dome and lost to the Garden Valley Wolverines 42-22 for the state Class A-4 eightman football title. It was the third championship crown in a row for the Garden Valley team who finished its season with a perfect 10-0 record and the championship. The Tiger ended a successful season with a 9-1 record.

Garden Valley was a good, well-coached team that wasn't nervous about playing for the championship. They jumped on the Tigers early and hard, taking advantage of the breaks and playing good ball.

The Wolverines shut down the Tigers running and passing game in the first half and were leading 16-0 at half time and were ahead 30-0 before Kendrick finally got its attack moving in the right direction.

Garden Valley's first two touchdowns came on short runs, but the third was the 87 yard return of a Tiger kick and the Wolverines followed that with a 47 yard punt return for another touchdown.

Kendrick got on the board in the third quarter when Reece Hewett connected with Shawn Tanata on a pass play covering 28 pass. Hewett passed to Shane Taylor for the extra points.

Garden Valley answered with two touchdowns—one a 67-yard play through the air and a 2 yard pass interception.

Hewett passed to Cade Konen for one Tiger touchdown in the final quarter on a 24 yard play and then passed to Ryan Blewett for 33 yards and another touchdown.

Hewett finished the game with 320 yards, completing 18 of 33 attempts.
