Otto Silflow, 94, Native of Cameron, Passes December 1

Otto F. Silflow, 94, a retired Cameron area farmer and one of the community's oldest citizens died Saturday, December 1, 1990. He was found dead in his car after it had plunged down a 42-foot embankment in the back yard of his home at Juliaetta that morning. It is suspected Mr. Silflow had suffered a possible heart attack just prior to the acci-



He was born at Cameron to Ferdinand (Fred) and Ida Lohmann Silflow on April 16, 1896, the same day his parents signed the deed to buy the family farm,

Otto was a life-long member of the Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church, and received his education at the Cameron School.

In his younger years, in between farming, he often worked for the county road boss and plowed the furrow (by horse) to make a guide line for the new side road east of Cameron.

He married Emma Emtman, June ted it for 40 years. In 1956 they moved to their present home in

At one time he was a director of the Kendrick Bean Growers. He and his wife enjoyed attending the gatherings at the Senior Citizens' The ladies of Christian Family mealsite at Kendrick and also their heartfelt thanks to the people in our making wood, which he did on the

In addition of his wife, Emma, he is survived by a son, Roy, at the Cameron family farm, and a daughter, Gladys Whitinger, at Southwick, Idaho; 11 grandchildren, and 14 great-grandchildren.

Otto was the last of the surviving children of his parents. Brothers and sisters preceding him in death were: Hedwig, Herman, Fred, Elsie Wegner, Martha Kruger, Ida Erich, and Walter.

As one of the oldest and most respected members of the community, Otto was very helpful in compiling the centennial history for the communities, and was proud to represent them in the Kendrick Centennial parade on October 13, 1990. He never cared to travel and had

often said, "I'm satisfied just where I am, this is the most beautiful country around." He did, however, keep up on the daily world news and could comment on any subject. The funeral was held at Cameron
