How To Choose a Christmas Tree That Will Last Through the Holidays

Braving the icy wind and blowing snow, you searched every lot in town until you found the perfect Christmas tree. You brought it home, put it just the right spot in the living room and decorated it with care.

And a few days later the needles started falling off.

Unfortunately, countless people go through this scene every year. But it doesn't have to happen. University of Idaho Extension forester Ron Mahoney says three simple tests will determine if a tree is fresh enough to remain healthy and attractive throughout the holiday season.

In addition to the tests, Mahoney recommends that Christmas tree shoppers look for trees that were grown in the Inland Northwest. "These trees are naturally conditioned by colder growing conditions and will usually retain needles and color far better than trees shipped in from coastal areas, he says.

The first thing to check is the needle appearance. If the green of any of the needles has faded and become slightly whitish, or if the needles appear shrunken rather than well-filled and firm, the tree has begun to dry out. Because branch tips and the upper third of the crown will usually keep a fresh appearance longer than the crown's lower interior, it is better to check the inside part of the crown on the lower two-thirds of the tree. If you detect no signs of dryness, the tree should be in good shape.

The second concern is needle brittleness. Needles that have begun to dry will usually respond differently than fresh needles to a simple "pull test." To test for brittleness, take hold of a few needles with your

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thumb and forefinger, bend them over your thumb at about a right angle and give a steady pull. On most species, needles that have begun to dry will break: when pulled in this way. Needles that are fresh will normally pull loose at their base where they join the twig or branch.

The final test is needle resistance to shock. On the spruce and Douglas fir, the needles' points of attachment to twigs begin to weaken as soon as they start to get dry. To test for dryness, lift the tree about 16 inches and let it free fall so the butt of the tree hits hard ground or pavement. If any green-colored needles shatter from the tree, it is a sign of dryness. If very few green needles are loosened by the fall, the tree is safe to use with proper care.

You can keep the tree fresh and safe by following a few tree-care suggestions:

- Store the tree in a cool, shaded place until you take it into the house. Saw off a half-inch or more from the bottom of the stem and place the tree in water. The fresh cut will enable the tree to take up water more readily. Don't shave the bark from the sides of the stem.
- Be sure the tree stand is stable and that it will allow the butt of the tree to rest in water. Keep the stands water basin filled to prevent the tree from drying out and becoming unsafe.
- Place the tree as far as possible from a radiator, woodstove, fireplace or other source of heat.
- Locate the tree so all exits from the room remain accessible.
- Carefully check the cords and connections of the electric lights to be used on the tree; frayed cords or faulty connections are dangerous. Avoid plugging tree lights into an overloaded circuit.
- Keep metal foil and tinsel out of tree light sockets.
- Allow no playing with electrical toys under the tree.
- Keep all used wrapping paper and other flammable materials away from the tree.
- Never use lighted candles or other open flame on or near the tree.
