River Crossing, Inc. Hears Report on Costs of Golf Course

The board of directors of River Crossing, Inc., met Monday evening, January 13, to hear a preliminary report from Jerry Bruce of Kendrick concerning the process and cost of building a golf course out on Cedar Creek Road. The design plan for the proposed course can be seen at the Farm Bureau Insurance office in Kendrick.

Bruce's report, well documented by pages and pages of specific cost estimates prepared by him, covered not only the price tag for the golf course (\$600,000 at the very least) but also provided a lesson for the board and visitors in how one goes about the construction of a course. While Bruce has no experience in the building of a golf course, he has many, many years of experience as a heavy equipment operator and construction supervisor on road and other projects involving sculpting the earth to serve new and useful purposes.

Those present came away with a solid preliminary grasp of the sequence of events taken in building a course, including, in this case, some excavation and considerable earth moving, beginning the clubhouse and parking facilities, laying of water mains and laterals for the sprinkler system, bridging the river at two points, reinforcing river banks with rip-rap, preparing the fairways and greens, including soil amendment and seeding. The list goes on.

Bruce also commented quite frankly on the disadvantages as well as advantages of using volunteer labor. He stressed that it is important to have a carefully thought out, sequential work plan; to have materials and tools on hand when volunteers arrive on the site; and to provide supervision to assure safety and efficiency.

Bruce, who volunteered his time to prepare the detailed report, would be interested in being employed by River Crossing, Inc. to plan for and supervise the construction of the golf course.

Headed by Wally Butler, River Crossing, Inc. is anticipating a meeting with the Latah County Planning and Zoning Commission on February 13 to update and keep in force the permits that have previously been issued. Representatives of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers and the State Water Resource Board will be attending the next meeting of River Crossing's board on the second Monday in February.

Action was taken at the January 13 meeting to add two more members to what had been a five member board. Jim Black of Kendrick was elected to take the place vacated by Tim Ackerman. Two additional spots on the board will now need to be filled. Currently serving in addition to Butler as president are Phil Heinen, vice president; Lil Howerton, secretary, and Dirk Hammond, treasurer.

The group, which had already retained Steve Rishling as its attorney, decided at the January 13 meeting to use the services of Greg Mann of the accounting firm of Hayden, Ross, and Company as necessary. Mann has since agreed to serve in this capacity and has volunteered to donate his time.

Others present at the meeting included John and Meirle Snyder, Ross Armitage, Bob Allen, and Frank Jacobson, representing the Juliaetta-Kendrick Community Development Association. Asked for his impression of the meeting, Jacobson said, "Jerry Bruce was a breath of fresh air! He's got his feet on the ground and mud on his boots." Jacobson feels that both this project and the whole community improvement effort need to deal more and more with the real world.

Obviously the group needs to give much thought to funding the enterprise and seeking out its supporters—and even its detractors. In this connection, they will hold a special promotion planning meeting at 7:00 p. m. in the Farm Bureau Insurance office on Monday, January 28.

Everyone interested in moving the project further forward is invited to attend.

Juliaetta to Vote On Water Bond Issue Thursday, Jan. 31

The citizens of Juliaetta will vote on a bond issue that will help build a new water treatment system that promises to end that town's chronic water shortage. Residents will go to the polls Thursday, January 31 to approve or disapprove the issuance of not more than \$250,000 in revenue bonds for a thirty year period. That sum will meet the requirements to qualify for an additional \$400,000 Community Development Block Grant from the Idaho Department of Commerce.

The election will be held at the Juliaetta City Hall between the hours of 12 noon and 8:00 o'clock that same evening. All residents over the age of 18 years and who have lived in the city limits for more than 30 days prior to the date of the election and who are registered to vote, are eligible to cast ballots.

What the city seeks to do is to construct a totally new water treatment facility that would draw its water source from the Potlatch River, run the water through a system of purifying filters and then out to the water lines. The proposed plant would be constructed on city-owned property in the east end of town between the highway and the railroad tracks. In addition to the treatment plant, it is planned to improve some of the water lines that service a portion of the residences.

The proposed water system has an estimated capacity to furnish the city of Juliaetta with 300 gallons of good water per minute which is more than adequate to furnish the requirements of the town.

Water, or the lack of it, has been a major problem for Juliaetta for many years. At the present time the city is drawing its water supply from six wells and two springs. The last well drilled by the city (near the Roger Kechter home), quit producing in September, 1990, and residents were on limited watering and usage almost all summer. Even in this time of less use, the water supply available would not be adequate to fight a major fire in the town.

If the water bond issue passes said Juliaetta councilman Dirk Hammond, there would be no increase in property taxes. These are revenue bonds the city is seeking that means the repayment would come from the water system itself. There would, of course, be an increase in water bills. Hammond said Tuesday afternoon that if the new system is installed residents could probably expect to see their water bills just about double. Those who are now paying \$11 per month might be paying \$21.

A majority vote is needed to approve this issue.

The total existing indebtedness, including interest accrued as of December 1, 1990 of the City of Juliaetta is \$235,440.29. The interest rate anticipated on the proposed general obligation bonds is seven and four-tenths percent (7.40%). The range of anticipated rates is from six percent (6.00%) to ten percent (10.00%). The total amount to be repaid over the life of the proposed revenue bonds, based on the anticipated interest rate is \$486,737.00.

**RESOLUTION NO. 243
FAIR HOUSING RESOLUTION**

LET IT BE KNOWN TO ALL PERSONS of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, that discrimination in the sale, rental, leasing, financing of housing or land to be used for construction of housing, or in the provision of brokerage services because of race, color, religion, sex or national origin is prohibited by Title VIII of the 1968 Civil Rights Act (Federal Fair Housing Law).

It is the policy of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho to implement programs to ensure equal opportunity in housing for all persons regardless of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. Therefore, the City does hereby pass the following Resolution: **BE IT RESOLVED** that within available resources the City will assist all persons who feel they have been discriminated against because of race, color, religion, sex or national origin to seek equity under Federal and State laws by filing a complaint with the Idaho Human Rights Commission or the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Seattle Regional Office, Compliance Division.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City shall publicize this Resolution and through this publicity shall cause owners of real estate, developers, and builders to become aware of their respective responsibilities and rights under the Federal Fair Housing Law and any applicable state or local laws or ordinances. **SAID PROGRAM** will at a minimum include, but not be limited to the following:

- 1) The printing and publicizing of this policy and other applicable fair housing information through local media and community contacts.
- 2) Distribution of posters, flyers, and any other means which will bring to the attention of those affected, the knowledge of their respective responsibilities and rights concerning equal opportunity in housing.

This Resolution shall take effect January 8, 1991.

RELOCATION ASSISTANCE PLAN**

Under Section 104(d) of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended

The City of Juliaetta, Idaho will replace all occupied and vacant occupiable low/moderate income dwelling units demolished or converted to a use other than as low/moderate income housing as a direct result of activities assisted with funds provided under the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, as described in 24CFR 570.496a(b)(1)*.

All replacement housing will be provided within three years of the commencement of the demolition or rehabilitation relating to conversion. Before obligating or expending funds that will directly result in such demolition or conversion, the City of Juliaetta will make public and submit to the Idaho Department of Commerce the following information in writing:

1. A description of the proposed assisted activity;
2. The general location on a map and approximate number of dwelling units by size (number of bedrooms) that will be demolished or converted to use other than as low/moderate income dwelling units as a direct result of the assisted activity;
3. A time schedule for the commencement and completion of the demolition or conversion;
4. The general location on a map and approximate number of dwelling units that will be provided as replacement dwelling units;
5. The source of funding and a time schedule for the provision of replacement dwelling units; and
6. The basis for concluding that each replacement dwelling unit will remain a low/moderate income dwelling unit for at least 10 years from the date of initial occupancy.

The City of Juliaetta, Idaho will provide relocation assistance, as described in 570.496a(b)(2)* to each low/moderate income household displaced by the demolition of housing or by the conversion of a low/moderate income dwelling to another use as a direct result of assisted activities.

Consistent with the goals and objectives of activities assisted under the Act, the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, will take the following steps to minimize the displacement of persons from their homes:

1. Use CDBG funds to provide seed money grants or loans, long-term mortgage loans at favorable rates, or capital grants to tenant groups of multi-family buildings to help convert to cooperatives.
2. Stage rehabilitation of assisted housing to allow tenants to remain during and after rehabilitation, working with empty buildings or groups of empty units first so they can be rehabilitated first and tenants moved in before rehab on occupied units or buildings is begun.
3. Establish temporary relocation facilities in order to house families whose displacement will be of short duration, so they can move back to their neighborhoods after rehabilitation or new construction.
4. Evaluate housing codes and rehabilitation standards in reinvestment areas to prevent their placing undue financial burden on long-established owners or on tenants of multi-family buildings.
5. Establish counseling centers operated by the City or non-profit organizations to assist homeowners and renters to understand the range of assistance that may be available to help in staying in the area in the face of revitalization pressures.

The City of Juliaetta, Idaho hereby certifies it has officially adopted and published in a newspaper of general circulation said Residential Anti-Displacement and Relocation Assistance Plan. This plan shall become effective January 8, 1991.

nonviolent civil rights demonstrations within its jurisdiction; AND WHEREAS the City of Juliaetta has received a Community Development Block Grant and is required to comply with the Armstrong/Walker "excessive force" Amendment;

AND WHEREAS the use of excessive force against demonstrators may cause the CITY to lose its grant or eligibility for future federal grants; NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO:

SECTION 1: It is the POLICY of the CITY that excessive force by local law enforcement agencies shall not be used against individuals engaged in lawful and non-violent civil rights demonstrations within the City boundaries.

SECTION 2: The City Council directs the Police Chief to implement this Resolution by amending applicable police department procedures. **PASSED BY THE CITY COUNCIL, CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO.**

Shall the City of Juliaetta, Idaho issue its water revenue bonds, in the aggregate principal amount of not more than \$250,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, for the purpose of providing funds with which to improve the municipal water system by improving, bettering, and extending the present water supply system including water supply and treatment facilities and improvements to portions of the distribution facilities, said bonds to mature annually over a period commencing at the expiration of one (1) year from their date and ending not more than thirty (30) years from their date and to bear interest at a rate or rates to be prescribed by ordinance or resolution of the City, as more fully provided in Ordinance No. 242 signed and approved the 14th day of January, 1991, the principal of and the interest on said bonds to be payable solely from the net revenues to be derived from the operation of the municipal water system?

At the Election only registered qualified electors of the City will be permitted to vote on the question submitted.

A qualified elector shall be of the

age of eighteen (18) years or over, a citizen of the United States, and a bonafide resident of the City 30 days before the Election.

The polls shall open at the hour of 12:00 o'clock noon on such date, and shall be open continuously until the hour of 8:00 o'clock p. m., at which time the polls shall be closed. There shall be one (1) voting precinct for the Election which shall be at the following location: Juliaetta City Hall, Main Street, Juliaetta, Idaho.

Mary Jo Vallem, City Clerk, is the ex officio Registrar of the City for this Election. The place of registration is the office of the City Clerk, at City Hall, Main Street, Juliaetta, Idaho.

Except as provided by Section 50-414, Idaho Code, it shall be necessary to register in order to vote at the Election. When once so registered for a general City Election, thereafter an elector shall not be required to again register for the special bond Election so long as he or she shall have continued to reside at the same address, or within the same precinct in which he or she is registered except as hereafter provided. If an elector shall have moved from the City and shall remain away from such City for a period of one (1) year, his or her name is stricken from the elector's register. If he or she shall thereafter again reside in City he or she may again register and be eligible to vote, provided that he or she possesses the other qualifications required by law. If an elector shall have failed or neglected to vote at any general biennial City election, the Clerk shall strike the name of such elector from the elector's register, and such elector, in order to vote at the special bond Election, must again register.

Persons who are not currently registered may register as follows: on each day at any time during the office hours of the City Clerk until and including January 18, 1991, and on January 18, 1991, register between the hours of 10:00 a. m. and 8:00 p. m.

The voting at the Election shall be by ballot. The ballots to be supplied the voters for their use at the Election shall be in the form set out in Ordinance No. 242.

Said Ordinance No. 242 was adopted for the purpose of ordering the improvement of the municipal water system by the improvement, betterment, and extension of the present water supply system including water supply and treatment facilities, and improvements to portions of the distribution facilities, and ordering the

issuance of water revenue bonds subject to the assent of a majority of the qualified electors voting on the question at the Election.

Proceedings to contest the results of the special municipal bond election on the above question may be instituted as provided in Section 34-2001A, Idaho Code, but shall be instituted within forty (40) days after the votes cast at such election have been canvassed and the results thereof declared and not thereafter.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE WATER SYSTEM OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO; PROVIDING FOR AND CALLING A SPECIAL ELECTION AT WHICH THERE SHALL BE SUBMITTED TO ELECTORS QUALIFIED TO VOTE THEREON THE QUESTION OF ISSUING THE CITY'S WATER REVENUE BONDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF DEFRAYING IN PART THE COST OF RENOVATING, IMPROVING, UPGRADING AND BETTERING THE CITY'S WATER SYSTEM; PROVIDING DETAILS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH; THE ELECTION ON THE QUESTION; AND PROVIDING THE EFFECTIVE DATE THEREOF.

**CITY OF JULIAETTA
LATAH COUNTY, IDAHO**

A summary of the principal provisions of Ordinance No. 242 of the City of Juliaetta, Latah County, Idaho, adopted on January 14, 1991.

Section 1: Ratifies all previous consistent actions taken by the City Council.

Section 2: Provides for construction of water system improvements upon the assent of a majority of the electors.

Section 3: Describes the water system improvements to be constructed with the proceeds of the bonds to be voted upon by the electors (the "Project").

Section 4: Describes the engineering studies relating to the Project and where they may be inspected.

Section 5: Provides a cost estimate for the Project and the manner in which the Project costs are expected to be paid. Not more than \$250,000 of revenue bonds shall be issued to fund a portion of the Project costs pursuant to this Ordinance.

Section 6: Describes the revenue bonds proposed to be issued, and an estimate as to the terms of payment, rates of interest, and maturity of the revenue bonds.

Section 7: Schedules a special municipal bond election for January 31, 1991 from 12:00 noon until 8:00 p. m. to enable electors to vote on the question of issuing not more than \$250,000 of revenue bonds to fund a portion of Project costs, pursuant to this Ordinance.

Section 8: Identifies one voting precinct for the election for residents of the City of Juliaetta.

Section 9: Identifies the polling place for the election and the Judge and Clerks who will conduct the election.

Section 10: Sets the hours of the election from noon until 8:00 p. m.

Section 11: Sets forth the form of the ballot to be used for the election.

Section 12: Provides for preparation of sample ballots and publication of sample ballots at least twice before the election.

Section 13: Provides for the furnishing of ballots to the Judge and Clerks who will conduct the election.

Section 14: Provides for publication of notice of the election at least twice before the election.

Section 15: Sets forth the form of notice of the election which will be published at least twice before the election.

Section 16: Provides for canvassing the results of the election at a special City Council meeting to be held in the Council Chambers of the Juliaetta City Hall at 8:30 p. m. on January 31, 1991.

Section 17: Provides that revenue bonds will be issued pursuant to law if a majority of the electors vote in favor of issuing the bonds.

Section 18: Authorizes officers of the City to take appropriate action to put into effect the provisions of the Ordinance.

Section 19: Repeals prior inconsistent actions.

Section 20: Provides for severability.

Section 21: Provides for publication of the Ordinance.

Section 22: Provides for effective date of the Ordinance.
