

Robert Hutcheson Claimed by Cancer

Robert J. Hutcheson, 68, a retired truck driver, died of cancer Wednesday, January 30 at his home in Juliaetta.

Bob worked for 24 years for E. L. Farrington Logging Co. at Juliaetta as a truck driver until he retired in 1984.

He was born September 2, 1922, at Fort Dodge, Iowa, to James and Martha Chase Hutcheson. His family moved to the Deep Creek area north of Potlatch, Idaho, when he was a child and he attended Deep Creek Country School north of Potlatch.

He served in the U. S. Army during World War II in Europe and Africa.

He married Vera Ulinder, June 30, 1950, at Potlatch. They made their home north of Potlatch where he worked for the Potlatch Highway District five years. In 1953, they moved to Juliaetta and he worked for a rock crusher for the next seven years. In 1960, he went to work for E. L. Farrington Logging Co. as a truck driver until his retirement in 1984.

He was a charter member of the Juliaetta Community Church and a member of Kendrick Grange No. 413.

He enjoyed camping and fishing and attending local athletic events.

Survivors include his wife at the family home in Juliaetta; four sons, David of Kendrick and Paul, Brian and Brent, all of Juliaetta; three daughters, Sharon Barr of Cheyenne, Wyo., Nancy Sprout of St. Regis, Mont., and Ruth Ann Hutcheson of Glasgow, Mont.; three sisters, Fannie Jondle of Othello, Iowa, Virginia Cool of Cottonwood, Calif., and Jenevieve Christiansen of Potlatch, and seven grandchildren.

The funeral was held Saturday, February 2, at the Juliaetta Community Church with the Rev. Dan George officiating.

Jo Bencotter, 92, Passes February 1

Jo W. Bencotter, 92, a long-time resident of the American Ridge area, died of pneumonia Friday, February 1, at the Lewiston Care Center.

She was born December 12, 1898, to Charles L. and Dama M. Fish Guy at Enid, Oklahoma. The family moved to Kendrick in 1912 and her father owned and operated the hotel in Kendrick for a number of years. She graduated from Kendrick High School and attended Lewiston State Normal School for two years, earning her teaching degree.

She taught at Harvard, Idaho, for two years before marrying Frank P. Bencotter June 19, 1919, at Kendrick. They farmed on American Ridge northwest of Kendrick and were active in civic and fraternal community affairs. Frankie died on November 9, 1981, and Jo moved to Kendrick in 1985.

She was a member of the High Hope Extension Club, the Kendrick Grange, the Latah County Pomona Grange, the Idaho State Grange and the National Grange. She was a member of the Kendrick Community United Methodist Church and The Order of the Eastern Star, and was a charter member of the Golden Sunset Senior Citizens. She had also served as a 4-H leader and a sewing judge at the Nez Perce, Latah and Clearwater County Fairs.

Jo was the American Ridge correspondent for the Kendrick Gazette for many years.

Survivors include two sons, Donald D. Bencotter of Lapwai and Ray P. Bencotter of Lewiston; seven grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

Two brothers and four sisters died previously.

The funeral was held at 10:30 a.m. Monday at Vassar Rawls Funeral Home at Lewiston with the Rev. J. Stanley Lyman officiating.

Organist was Marie Jones and Del Sewell was vocalist.

Topics of Interest About Mailing to Persian Gulf Area

With the interest in mail going to and coming from our military men and women in the Middle East, Postmasters Sharon Harris of Kendrick and Ben Carpenter of Juliaetta put together this information about the subject they feel would be of interest.

Mail, to and from Operation Desert Storm, is taking about seven to ten days. Bear in mind, they said, that this figure represents the time mail is postmarked until it ARRIVES in Saudi Arabia for distribution to our troops, and from its final point of departure in Saudi Arabia to the States. There are now more than 150 APOs/FPOs serving Operation Desert Storm, Harris and Carpenter reported.

In order to expedite Operation Desert Storm mail, volume figures are indicated in pounds only. Volume to Desert Storm since its August inception is just over 30 million pounds and the volume is now averaging 305,000 pounds per day. The peak mailing period was in early December with volume running 505,000 pounds per day.

Items for Packages— Harris and Carpenter also said that post office personnel are often asked what type of small gift items our military personnel might appreciate receiving from home. These are a few appropriate items the post office suggests:

Flea collars (the sand fleas bite!), disposable razors, shaving cream, Hart's Flea Spray, calamine or caladryl lotion (for the sand flea bites), chapstick, sun screen, Merry Mix, Chex Cereal Mix, nuts, popcorn, (put in plastic bag in box to avoid insects), and hard candy (especially the filled ones). They also enjoy Kool-aid and dry drink mixes. The drink mixes should NOT be mailed in envelopes.

Logging Accident Claims Life of Nick E. Armitage

The son of Arlie and Priscilla Bencotter Armitage, Nick was born June 17, 1956, at Kendrick. He was raised in the Southwick area and graduated from Kendrick High School in 1974.

He later graduated from the vocational-technical department at Lewiston State College at Lewiston and became a farmer and rancher in 1977.

He was a member of the Palouse-Clearwater Search and Rescue team and members of that unit recall that he was one of the most active members, always willing to assist when and wherever needed. He was also on the board of directors of the Cattlemen's Association. He enjoyed hunting and was an avid reader.

Survivors include his parents of Southwick and a sister, Tammy Ford of Moscow.

The funeral service was held at 2 p.m. Saturday at Malcom's Browef-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston with the Rev. Dan George of Southwick - Juliaetta Community Church officiating.

Juliaetta Votes to Enforce "Clean Up" Ordinance

Last Thursday, while the voters of Juliaetta went to polls to approve the water bond issue, they also approved an ordinance issue vote that stated, in effect, that the city should begin to enforce City Ordinance No. 238. This ordinance gives the city authority to order the clean-up of old and abandoned cars and other vehicles within the city limits on both streets and private property. The ordinance prohibits the placing, leaving or maintaining any vehicle machinery, trailer, or equipment in a wrecked or partially dismantled condition, so as to cause a nuisance.

The ordinance was passed into law June 20, 1989, but was never actively enforced, the city council hoping that residents would take care of the situations themselves.

This has not worked out and now the city went to the people and ask if such enforcement should begin. The answer came back Thursday with a resounding affirmative vote. The citizens voted 147 to 24 in favor of enforcement of Ordinance 238.

The city was given an incentive to begin cleaning up the town as the Juliaetta Centennial approaches in 1992. The Thursday vote, where over eighty percent of those casting ballots, wanted the city to enforce its ordinance, would seem to be another clear mandate.

However, councilman Dirk Hammond told the Gazette Tuesday afternoon that the city will not rush into a head-on battle with violators. Instead, he said, the city plans to explain to the people what it plans and ask for cooperation. Persons violating this ordinance will be given a reasonable amount to time to correct any violations before legal action is taken.

Juliaetta Approves Water Bond Issue By Large Majority

Voters in the City of Juliaetta went to the polls last Thursday, Jan. 31 and approved a \$250,000 water bond issue by a huge 147-27 margin. The bond issue approval was necessary to meet the city's share of a \$650,000 improvement project which is hoped will bring an end to that community's chronic water shortage.

The project for the city calls for the construction of a water treatment plant capable of producing 300 gallons of water per minute drawing its source from the Potlatch River.

The city needed the authority to issue up to \$250,000 in revenue bonds to meet a \$400,000 Block Grant from the State.

Dirk Hammond, a council member, said the next step is to submit the city's plan to the Idaho Department of Commerce. Hammond said there are currently twenty-two applications for grants pending in the state at present time. He added that the city was informed that probably 16 or 17 of these applications will be approved and that Juliaetta's application is in the 11th position, so the city has an excellent chance of receiving the grant for its water project.

Once the grant is received the next step is the "design phase", where the city will solicit from companies specializing in this type of building, designs for the new treatment plant. Preliminary plans called for construction work to begin July 1, but Hammond said it would probably be closer to August 1 when the work begins. It is estimated that it will take ninety days to completed the plant once work begins.

Selling the bonds must also be done by the city. Hammond said there are two possible routes. One is selling the complete bond issue to the Farm Home Administration at 7% interest. The other is to sell the bonds on the private market to individual buyers. This would probably be done if a lower rate of interest can be obtained.

Hammond also said the Juliaetta council was very grateful and appreciative of the support the citizens gave for this project.
