Cecil Gruell, 88, Now Underway at School Retired Mail Carrier, Passes February 16

Cecil Gruell, a retired Juliaetta mail carrier, died Saturday, February 16, at Sacred Heart Medical Center at Spokane of heart and kidney failure. He was 88.

He was born February 19, 1902 at Peola, Wash., to Samuel and Lela Thompson Gruell. He moved with his family to Juliaetta in 1911. He attended school at Pomeroy and Jul-

He married Crystal M. Ottosen on June 16, 1929 at Juliaetta. He worked as Juliaetta city marshall and maintenance man for nine years. Using a horse drawn dray, Cecil was the one who hauled the brick for the Juliaetta school from the depot to the construction site He was a star-route mail carrier and served the Juliaetta, Kendrick and South- Kendrick FFA Team wick area from 1942 until his retirement in 1970.

He and his wife visited five continents and 49 of the 50 states. He was a past master of Kendrick Lodge No. 26, AF&AM, a life member of Lewiston Scottish Rite, and a charter member of the Kendrick Camper Klub and the Golden Sunset Senior Citizens. He attended the Juliaetta Community, Church.

Cecil was the first in Juliaetta to nstall a working televsion set in the early 1950's and later with 14 others. helped organize and install the Juliaetta Translator system and served as its president for a number of years. He also enjoyed fishing, camping traveling and gardening.

Survivors include his wife, Crysta M. Gruell at the family home; a son, Kenneth C. Gruell of Lewiston; brothers Albert Gruell of Lewiston and Teacher Reserach Associate grant.
