River Crossing, Inc. Seeks Two More Board Members to Promote Golf Course

At the regular monthly meeting of River Crossing, Inc., held on Feb. 11, its Board of Directors focused on the obvious need to publicize their efforts to undertake the construction of a nine-hole golf course and on the pressing need to attract two more members of the community to serve on the recently expanded board.

Reporting on a publicity committee meeting held back on January 28, Lil Howerton indicated that application for a \$5,000 grant from the Idaho Community Foundation had been made through the Clearwater Economic Development Association (\$1,000 for publicity and \$4,000 for preliminary engineering expenses). Additional funding in the form of gifts is also being quietly pursued. Greg Mann of Hayden, Ross and

Company, accountant for the organization, is currently working on having River Crossing, Inc. certified as a tax-exempt entity. Mann is also pursuing the possibility of involving a University of Idaho business student in conducting a feasibility study and designing a marketing plan for the golf course.

According to Howerton, River Crossing, Inc. will have a booth at the Sausage Feed and Family Fun Night on March 16, a community-wide event sponsored by the J/K EMT unit to raise funds for the JK Ambulance. The booth (a putting green, what else?) will allow the organization to help raise money for a new ambulance and at the same time publicize its own efforts toward community development.

Other matters considered at the February 11 meeting included the possibility of getting the driving range in operation this year and fine-tuning the language of a pledge agreement document that is central to fund-raising efforts. The Board of Directors agreed to begin soliciting pledges as soon as the language of the form is formally approved by them. The group looks forward to the first annual meeting of the membership in January of 1992, at which time the membership at large could decide whether sufficient funds are on hand to begin construction of the course.

Also present at the February 11 meeting was Jerry Bruce, who reported on fine-tuning the construction plan he presented back on January 14. Bruce has not only updated cost figures but has also included more specific information concerning various components of the project. An engineering schematic prepared by Bruce concerning proposed treatment of the river bed—a drawing that stretched all the way across the Farm Bureau office—will provide an important focus for discussion when representatives of the organization sit down with the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers to talk permits.

Organization head Wally Butler and Bruce, equipped with the updated construction plan and schematic drawing, were scheduled to meet with the Latah County Planning and Zoning Commission on February 13. The organization must also deal with the Nez Perce County P&Z since the golf course will lie in both counties.

Kendrick's Centennial medallion designed and River Crossing's latest board member, Jim Black, reported that he's been busy sketching logo designs for the golf course. He had at least two dozen eye-catching possibilities with him at Monday's meeting.

The organization also agreed that night to provide the imaginary "situation" for the mock site-visit by an Idaho Department of Commerce team. One of the final requirements for certification as an Idaho Gem Community, the mock site-visit tests a community's ability to meet visitors and promote some phase of its economic development plan. If approved by the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association, the make-believe role of the visiting team will be to see how the golf course development group deals with potential investors.

Of all the groups that have been working on community development, River Crossing, Inc. is the most ready to deal in specifics. And to deal realistically.

Cecil Gruell, 88, Retired Mail Carrier, Passes February 16

Cecil Gruell, a retired Juliaetta mail carrier, died Saturday, February 16, at Sacred Heart Medical Center at Spokane of heart and kidney failure. He was 88.

He was born February 19, 1902 at Peola, Wash., to Samuel and Lela Thompson Gruell. He moved with his family to Juliaetta in 1911. He attended school at Pomeroy and Juliaetta.

He married Crystal M. Ottosen on June 16, 1929 at Juliaetta. He worked as Juliaetta city marshal and maintenance man for nine years. Using a horse drawn dray, Cecil was the one who hauled the brick for the Juliaetta school from the depot to the construction site. He was a star-route mail carrier and served the Juliaetta, Kendrick and Southwick area from 1942 until his retirement in 1970.

He and his wife visited five continents and 49 of the 50 states. He was a past master of Kendrick Lodge No. 26, AF&AM, a life member of Lewiston Scottish Rite, and a charter member of the Kendrick Campers Klub and the Golden Sunset Senior Citizens. He attended the Juliaetta Community Church.

Cecil was the first in Juliaetta to install a working television set in the early 1950's and later with 14 others, helped organize and install the Juliaetta Translator system and served as its president for a number of years. He also enjoyed fishing, camping, traveling and gardening.

Survivors include his wife, Crystal M. Gruell at the family home; a son, Kenneth C. Gruell of Lewiston; brothers Albert Gruell of Lewiston and Harold Gene Gruell of Payette, Idaho; sisters Lucile Hartung of Moscow, Marie Custer of Clarkston, and Gertrude Heimgartner of Juliaetta; three grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. He was preceded in death by three brothers and an infant son.

Memorial services were conducted Wednesday at 10:30 a. m. at the Juliaetta Community Church with the Rev. Dan George officiating. The body was cremated at the request of the deceased and his remains were returned to the hospital.

Masonic services were conducted at the Wednesday memorial. Honorary bearers were Ray King, James Reeces, Bud Holt, Floyd Heimgartner, Art Foster, Charles Taylor and David Clayton.

Organist was Janice Groseclose and vocalist was Margarette Cox. Interment will be at a later date. The family suggests memorials go to the Juliaetta Community Church or the Juliaetta-Kendrick Ambulance Fund.

"Friends of Scouting" Campaign Seeks Support For L-C Council

Juliaetta-Kendrick Cub Scout Pack 101 leaders and workers will soon be distributing "Friends of Scouting" pledge cards, seeking support for the Lewis-Clark Council, the organization that directs and helps guide the local Scout movement.

The Lewis-Clark Council, operating out of Lewiston, receives just 24% of its budget from the United Way project. The other 65% must come from the program, trust services, and projects such as the "Friends of Scouting".

While the local Packs, such as Pack 101 which has 26 Cub Scouts actively involved, plus 11 adult leaders, have their own programs and projects, the Lewis-Clark Council is the administrative arm of the local Scouting movement. Its jurisdiction covers all communities in eight counties in the Inland Northwest.

The council is headed by an Executive Board composed of outstanding volunteer leaders. They employ a small professional staff to handle administration of all phases of Scouting in the council. The full-time professionals train volunteer leaders, organize units and maintain liaison with the program users—religious organizations, service clubs, PTAs and other community organizations.

The council also operates a service center where volunteer Scout leaders can get literature, insignia, advancement badges, and other materials. In addition, the center provides overall coordination, information about Scouting and various program aids for leaders. The council also owns and operates Camp Grizzly, an outdoor learning center for all youth.

The LC Council is a very important part of the successful operation of the local Cub Scout Pack.

Cub Scout Pack 101 is sponsored by the Kendrick Lions Club.

Julie Heimgartner, Cubmaster of Pack 101, said Monday that the Juliaetta/Kendrick area has a goal of \$760 based on the number of Scouts in the local program.

Mrs. Heimgartner said those wishing to enroll in the "Friends of Scouting" project may mailed the cards they will be receiving back to her, or she will collect them, or the cards may also be mailed directly to the council in Lewiston.

Tigers Top Highland, Lose to Deary In District Tournament

The Kendrick Tigers rolled to their second win in the District II, Class A-4 basketball tournament last Tuesday night at the LCSC gym by putting on a blazing 24 point effort in the final quarter to defeat the Highland Huskies 53-37.

The Tigers scored the final 20 points of the game to improve to 17-4 and set up a match with top-ranked Deary Monday night.

The Tigers picked up eight of the 20 points from the free throw line as they controlled the offensive boards. Kendrick's trapping defense also caused numerous Huskie turnovers which were converted into easy baskets.

Highland jumped out to an early lead and were ahead of the Tigers 15.9 at the end of the first quarter. Kendrick pulled back with 12 points in the second quarter and had tied the game 21-21 at the half.

Highland stormed back early in the third and with slightly over 3 minutes left in the third had the Tigers down by 32-23. The Huskies took a hard blow right after as Billy Hunter of Highland fouled out.

Shane Taylor paced the Tigers final period attack as he picked up nine of his 14 points in that frame. Reece Hewett led all scorers with 18 total points.

**A Letter from the
Persian Gulf Area**

(Note: The following is a letter written by Adam Crawford to his friend Crystal Longfellow. Adam is stationed with the Army somewhere in the middle east. Miss Longfellow re-typed and brought in several of Adam's letters which we will publish over the next weeks. Thank you for sharing with us, Crystal.)

Letter dated Dec. 25:

It's a lot like what I thought it would be here: flat and sandy. It's not really hot yet. Today, it was the warmest, close to 85. At night it has been really cold. It's kind of strange. We are in a port off the Gulf now. We are waiting for our trucks and equipment to arrive. We are probably going to be here for a number of days.

It's getting close to the 15th. Our main objective is to supply weapons, etc. They say when we leave here we are heading a good distance north.

We are staying in a giant, empty warehouse about the size of a football field, crammed full of people, wall to wall. They have a lot of these buildings and they are all full.

King Fahd has been taking good care of us. He is paying for our food and water. They had a large Christmas dinner today: it's unbelievable the food they had. Well, I'm going to eat, be back in a second—

I could have been on TV yesterday, but I didn't know if they showed AFN (Armed Forces Network) clips at home so I let someone else do it. By reading the paper, the 15th

seems so close. I just got back from the showers. It's a lot like M*A*S*H, except quite a bit larger.

We have been doing PT two times a day to speed up climate adjustment. We really haven't been doing a whole lot; we train about 3 hours a day. I'll be kind of glad when our trucks come so we can get out of here. There is a lot of brass around here.

Yesterday we were out by the water tossing stuff to feed the seagulls, when a couple of sharks (about 4 or 5 feet long) came to the surface. Needless to say, the birds quit landing on the water for food.

This Saturday, we are heading in the desert for an all day land navigation course. It's supposed to have all five characteristics of the desert in a 10k radius.

They just told us yesterday that we also have to participate in a sport for one hour a day that causes vigorous movement. It won't take long to get into good shape here.

God bless you and I hope Christmas was as good as it could be.
