

Telephone Company Cable Work To Resume in May

Construction of cable facilities will be underway again for Potlatch Telephone Company the first of May. According to Jerry Brown, manager of the local utility, the company expects completion and cut over of the Kendrick exchange by May, with the Juliaetta exchange being finished in August of this year.

"Each and every customer of Potlatch Telephone Company will benefit from major construction of this kind," stated Brown. After the construction is completed, Potlatch Telephone Company will be able to upgrade each customer to private line service. Touch Tone and Custom Calling Features will also be available to every customer.

"The majority of the cable facilities are being buried," said Brown, "which will improve transmission and decrease maintenance. Currently, we've buried more than 160 miles of new cable."

"One of our most exciting tasks in this construction effort has been the burying of a fiber optic cable between our Troy, Kendrick, Juliaetta exchanges and to our southwest boundary to connect with U. S. West," said Brown. When put into service in early 1992 customers will be talking over a beam of light providing the latest state-of-the-art digital transmission. At that time customers will notice a much quieter and cleaner sound, since it is not affected by weather or electrical influences.

According to Brown, a customer technician will be visiting each home in the Potlatch serving area to assure the inside wire facilities of each house is adequate to cut over to the new cable facilities.

As with any construction of this magnitude, the company said it realizes it creates a lot of inconveniences and problems to the public and it thanked customers for their patience and understanding during the construction phase of the project.

"We hope, when finished, the pluses will outweigh the minuses, such as improved all one party service, improved transmission, low maintenance and, once poles and wires are removed, the aesthetics of the area will be greatly improved," said Brown.

A Letter from the Persian Gulf Area

(Note: The following is a letter written by Adam Crawford to his friend Crystal Longfellow. Adam is stationed with the Army somewhere in the middle east. Miss Longfellow re-typed and brought in several of Adam's letters which we will publish over the next weeks. Thank you for sharing with us, Crystal.)

Letter dated 30 Dec. 1990—

We are still in the port waiting for our equipment. It should be here the 5th or 6th. Not too long after all this, we will be going towards the border. After all this we are going to set up our base camp. We will be about 150 miles from the border.

We have been training around three or four hours a day on combat tactics and survival. Also nuclear, biological, and chemical survival. Right now our biggest threat is terrorists. There have been about 12 incidents due to terrorism. I just wait till they start and get this over. I can't believe how cool it is here. There has only been two warm days, close to 85 degrees. The rest have been around 70. The nights are extra cold. It should warm up when we move from the Gulf.

The time right now is 4:00 p. m. Earlier today, around 12 noon, we walked to the pier and took a look at the Gulf. There was a guy trying to catch fish. He wasn't having much luck, the fish were stealing his bait. Most of them I have seen in the salt water tanks at pet shops. That was probably the high point of the day. They brought mail in today. I have to get my stuff rounded up and organized so I can leave in a moment's notice. Thank you very much for the letter, calendar and address book. I should do some stuff around my bunk.

Battling their way out of the loser's bracket, the Kendrick Tigers forced the District II, Class A-4 basketball tournament into an extra session last week before finally being beaten for the crown by the Deary Mustangs. Kendrick then had to go to McCall Saturday night and were defeated by Garden Valley for a berth in the state tournament.

Last Wednesday night at Warrior gym on the LCSC campus Kendrick, in the loser's bracket, knocked off Highland in a loser-out game, to keep their tournament hopes alive. The Tigers bumped the Huskies out of further contention by a 61-49 margin.

After losing an early 11-0 lead the Tigers used a pressing, constant attack in the final quarter to win. Highland fell behind the Tigers early as KHS opened up with 11 points before the Huskies even got on the board. Highland rallied back and had tied the game 14-all at the end of the first period. The game was even through much of the second quarter and Highland took a lead 27-25 just before the half, but Ryan Blewett canned a three-pointer with less than a minute to go to give KHS a 28-27 halftime lead.

Kendrick took a big lead in the opening minutes of the third before Highland closed the gap. Then in the final quarter Kendrick exploded for 20 points to win 61-49.
