Russell Baker, 80, Dies February 28

Russell Baker, 80, a retired U. S. Forest Service worker, died of congestive heart failure Thursday, Feb. 28, at his home in the Southwick

He began working for the U. S. Forest Service during the summer while a student at the University of Idaho during the 1930s. Throughout his career he was involved in many aspects of the Forest Service before retiring in 1969.

He was born March 10, 1910, to Benjamin F. and Maude E. Douglas Baker at Southwick and lived most of his early life in the Southwick and Orofino areas. He graduated from Southwick High School in March of 1930. After graduation he attended the UI from 1930 to 1932 as a geology major.

He enlisted in the U.S. Army in 1941 and served in the United States and Brazil, South America, as a meterologist and weather observer. He was discharged as a staff sergeant November 2, 1945.

After his discharge he returned to the Forest Service and began working as a communications technician until his retirement. He was involved in the transition to more modern telephone systems, radio and later with the application of the new electronic systems. His career also included being a lookout guard, fireman, dispatcher, supply and property clerk, telephone lineman, and service man.

He recently constructed a small neighborhood telephone line. He was a wildlife photographer and one of his many oil paintings is on permanent display in the Forest Service lobby at Orofino.

Russell had a great love for music and was an accomplished pianist. He built an organ, but after moving to his present home, had no room for it, and sold it to Albert and Alma Lawrence. Russell also made the first black and white television set for his father and step-mother, Anna Kimbley Baker. Many of the neighbors also enjoyed watching this television with the family.

Russell was not only helpful with his knowledge of the community, but developed and printed many copy prints from old pictures which he generously donated to the Centennial Committee of the Southwick

Russell is survived by a sister Gertrude Fourdray of Fiddletown, Calif.; a cousin Nadine Hanks of Kimbley of Kendrick, and Robert Great-grandparents are Mr. and Kimbley of Southwick; 2 stepsisters, Margaret Craig of Moscow, and Edna Magee of Lewiston; a stepaunt, Adaline Jassman of Juliaetta, and many nieces and nephews. He never married.

He was preceded in death by his parents and step-mother, Anna Kimbley Baker; a brother Harry Baker; 2 step-nephews, Jim and Bill Magee and a step-sister Irene Hudson.

Organist was Ruth Slind and the singers were Margarette Cox and Betty Chisholm.
