Other city news includes: The council announced the phone number for maintenance man Ed Campos is 276-4872.

The city will pay for the garbage dumpster when the Centennial Committee decides on dates for Juliaetta's clean up days.

The upper reservoir will be drained for repairs in the near future.

## Ordinance No. 238 to be Enforced

Letters will soon be sent to residents concerning Ordinance No. 238, which reads as follows:

... prohibiting the placing, leaving or maintaining of any vehicle, machinery, trailer, or equipment in a wrecked or partially dismantled condition, so as to cause a nuisance; providing for penalties; providing that this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.

The citizens of Juliaetta requested enforcement of this ordinance by ballot vote at a recent election.

Councilman Dirk Hammond is to be in Boise Thursday for a meeting with the Idaho Economic Advisory Council. The council should know the outcome of this meeting by late Friday afternoon. The meeting concerns Juliaetta's grant from the state for the new water system.

The council will meet Friday, the 15th, at 3 p. m. to interview engineers for the project.

## County Assessor to Offer Tax Help in Valley Wednesday, April 3

It is time to sign up for the "Circuit Breaker", Senior Citizen Tax Exemption, as the April 15 deadline approaches, reminds the Latah County Assessor.

There will be a representative from the Assessor's Office in the Kendrick Senior Citizens' Center on Wednesday, April 3, from 10:00 to 12 noon, and at Juliaetta City Hall that same afternoon (Apr. 3), from 2:00 to 4:00 p. m. to help with the sign up.

If your income does not exceed \$15,100 per year, and you are a widow or widower, 65 years old or older, disabled or a disabled veteran, you may qualify for the exemption. This exemption must be applied for every year.

You will want to bring with you the following: A copy of your Federal Income Tax Form 1040, if you filed one. Your Social Security Benefit Statement Form SSA-1099 stating the amount you received from Social Security. All medical expenses, including prescriptions and medical insurance premiums. Any medical expenses you paid for and were not reimbursed by medicare or insurance.

Please come into the office of the Assessor in Moscow at the Courthouse if you cannot make the April 3 times in this area.

## Maj. Steve Hoogland Home from Iraq War

Major Steven J. Hoogland and 900 men under his command from the 101 Air Borne Division arrived back in the United States Saturday, Mar. 9, after serving in the Middle East since August 29. The transport carrier bearing Steve and his men landed first in Florida and then departed for Fort Campbell, Kentucky, the home of the 101st. The troops were first taken to Frankfurt, Germany and left for the States from there.

Steve's wife, Jean, and his two children were at the base to meet him.

Steve told his father in a phone call that he and his unit were pulled out of Iraq on March 4. They had been among the first US troops to invade Iraq when the ground war began.

Steve said the 900 men in that shipment home all received 21-day block leave on their arrival at the base. Steve, as the senior officer of the returning unit, didn't get leave.

He reported back to duty the following morning. He will, however, be given leave in the future. He was needed at this time to prepare for the return of other units.

Although the set of the pieces and the blocks is organized rather than random, the coverlet has the "flavor" of a Victorian crazy quilt. Perhaps the feel of the Victorian quilt is achieved by the use of exotic fabrics such as silk, satin and velvet.

The ties for this coverlet were given by members of the Stony Point Friendship Club and the Kendrick Canyon Klub. These neckties were collected from family members including husbands, sons, brothers, uncles and cousins. Others were collected from close friends.

The origins of the ties were as diverse as their colors and patterns. One tie came all the way from Jerusalem, one from Africa. Several came from California and some from Spokane. A few came from the old Baldeck store, formerly of Lewis-ton.

Two of the ties were worn at the wedding ceremony of the owners. One of the weddings was about 50 years ago.

Since the collection of ties covered a span of about sixty-two years, many different styles were evident. Some ties were as narrow as one inch, while others were as much as five inches wide.

A few of the original owners have passed away, but their ties continue to give pleasure, and for some, precious memories when a favorite tie of a loved one is recognized.

The other materials used in the coverlet such as the satin backing and the velvet blocks were purchased by the Kendrick Canyon Klub.

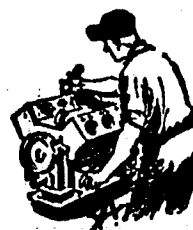

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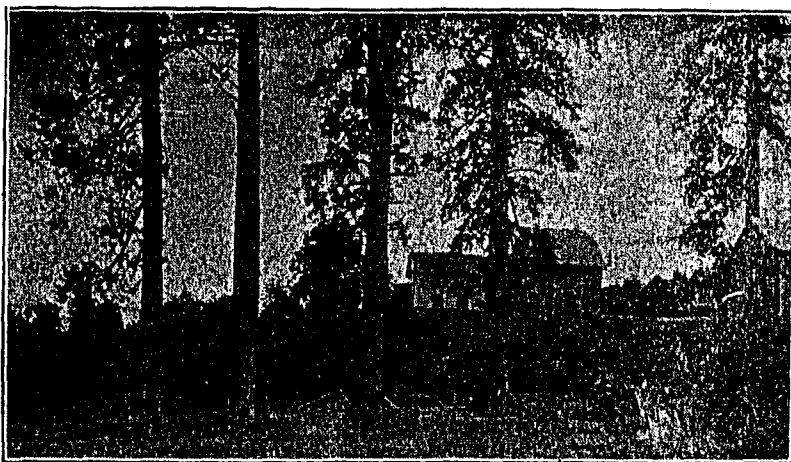

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, HEREINAFTER CALLED "CITY", A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF IDAHO, ADOPTING RATES TO BE CHARGED PRODUCERS AND GENERATORS FOR THE COLLECTION OF SOLID WASTE WITHIN THE CITY; PROVIDING THAT THIS RESOLUTION SHALL SUPERSEDE EXISTING RATES; PROVIDING THAT THE PROVISIONS OF THIS RESOLUTION BE DECLARED SEVERABLE; PROVIDING THAT THIS RESOLUTION SHALL BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT AS OF 12:01 A. M. ON JANUARY 1, 1991.

WHEREAS, the Council finds it necessary to increase existing fees for the collection of solid waste within the City in accordance with the terms and conditions of the franchise.

WHEREAS, the Council will include in the total cost a 1.63% fee to cover recycling facilities.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: That all existing resolutions and ordinances relative to the rates for collection of solid waste within the City are hereby superseded by this resolution.

SECTION 2: That the rates for collection and disposal of solid waste for residential units, per month, shall be as follows:

RATES FOR RESIDENTIAL UNITS PER MONTH: CURBSIDE  
Individual residential units, including mobile homes, duplexes, and apartments each unit \$6.93

SECTION 1: That the rates for collection and disposal of solid waste for business units shall be as follows: RATES FOR BUSINESS UNITS: Manual containers—0 to 2 each unit per month \$6.93 Additional bags or containers each .90

This resolution shall be in full force and effect as of 12:01 A. M. on January 1, 1991.
