J/K Development Assn. to Work on Constitution, Bylaws

To meet the state requirement for a Gem Community, the Kendrick Juliaetta Community Development Association is now in the process of a re-organization and adopting a constitution and a set of bylaws. It is also probable that the group may incorporate to qualify as a non-profit Idaho corporation.

When the group was formed several years ago, it was a loose-knit, rather informal gathering of local business firms and individual. Since then the organization has become involved in becoming part of the Gem Community project, a State Dept. of Commerce project specifically designed to aid and encourage small community development. Since its involvement in the Gem Community program, the Development Association realizes the need for a more structured organization.

Frank Jacobson, chairman of the Gem Community ad hoc committee and also who serves as a "community encourager" through Lewis-Clark State College's part in the Gem Community program, has urged the re-organization of the Development Association.

Heeding Jacobson's advice, the Association moved forward Friday, March 22 in creating a board of directors for its organization. Meeting at the Kendrick Meal Site, Wayne Harris, acting in the absence of Geo. Brocke and Wally Butler, reported that a seven-person Board will be elected. Automatically on the board will be George F. Brocke, Wally Butler and Leasel Abrams, who are the duly elected president, vice-president and secretary-treasurer. To complete the board there will need to be four directors chosen. Harris said those who have been nominated thus far are: Frank Jacobson, Lillian Howerton, Bob Hassholdt and Harry Burmeister. Harris said the nominations are still open and elections will be held at a later date.

In other action, the Association heard a report by Harry Burmeister that plans for the May 2, 1992, Juliaetta Centennial are underway and "lots of enthusiasm" is being shown by the city residents.
