# A Part of Valley's **History Burned Apr.3**

A piece of the history of this area and "the old place" to a pioneer family was burned to the ground Wedonesday, April 3. The buildings were over 100 years old by best

The farm, located two miles east of Kendrick was owned by members of the Riley family for many years. The land stretched above the Bear Ridge Road where White's once had a fruit packing business. Apples, cherries, peaches, plums and pears were shipped to different parts of the country when the orchards were being utilized.

The main road followed the Potlatch River out of Kendrick and up to combat peer pressure. Texas Ridge. South of the farm was once a favorite camping site of the Nez Perce Indians. They would arrive in the summer and camp in teepees for many days by the river.

The men and women of the tribe had long braids decorated with turquoise and colored beads with leather. They wore beaded mocassins and carried beaded bags. They also had bright colored blankets. The children played, the campfires burned and the men and women prepared for their long journey into the mountains or high country to dig camas, pick huckleberries, hunt and fish. When they returned in the fall they presented our family with huckleberries and dried meat.

Some of the men rode ponies and bought hay from my father. When ladies. I was six years old, a colt was presented to my father by one of the men. It brought much happiness and the Valley Christian Center at Lewjoy to my brother and sister and me.

My parents, Amelia and Barney Riley, were always friendly to them. They shared the spring water and gave them fresh milk and eggs. My brother and sisters were taught to respect the indians and I have taught my children the same. Many times they told my father of the wars they fought and their experiences with the white people.

My daughter, Patty, has a collection of arrowheads, pestiles, spearheads, grinding tools and other artifacts she has found in the fields. They are her prize possessions. Now, the campfires no longer burn, the little children's laughter is gone, but the loving memories will always live on.

The land is now owned by John Snyder and a golf course is planned for the future.
