ZIP + 4? Will our world ever stop assigning us numbers? With the computer age upon us, don't count on

Recently a mailing went out to all addresses in the Kendrick area encouraging postal patrons to use their ZIP + 4 numbers. Many of you have shown an interest and called to ask questions. Thank you for your interest and cooperation.

Like it or not, AUTOMATION is here. The huge volume of mail can no longer be handled by human hands and highly sophisticated optical scanning equipment is now "reading" the addresses and directing the delivery destination. It's mind boggling, to say the least. A letter without a Zip code is a delayed item. Now, ZIP + 4 is easy if you have a post office box. You simply fill in zeroes plus your box number to make up the four digits . . . i. e., Box 249 would have an assigned +4 of 0249;

Box 9 would be 0009. Easy enough. However, if you have rural route delivery, it's a little more challenging. The following charts show the breakdown for Route 1 and Route 2 served out of Kendrick.
