The Juliaetta - Kendrick Ambulance Service took possession of its presented certificates and plaques to new ambulance late last week and Jenni Hazeltine, Brandon Bowen, the new unit will be in service as soon as the final equipping of the Softball coaches Clarke Bradley vehicle is accomplished, said Jim and Aaron Cummings presented the Hoogland, secretary of the J-K Amfollowing plaques: Most Valuable, bulance Service. The new unit was Michele Hogan; Most Improved, purchased from Eagle Ambulance of Boise and the module was manufactured by Mobile Medical.

The completely new medical unit was built on a 1990 Ford XL E-350 diesel chassis, and will replace the old 1978 ambulance which was also a Ford E-350 with a gas engine. Am-Shawn Tanata. Best Pitcher, Bob bulances are no longer manufactured with gas engines because of safety concern. Hoogland said a 1990 Model vehicle was purchased because it came with a 60,000 mile warranty while the 1991 models carry only a

40,000 mile warranty. The new medical unit is completely paid for, Hoogland said proudly. The cost was \$63,863.00. Included in the new equipment on the unit will be a stretcher that is more versitile, modern and convenient for the EMTs to use, and a Oximeter which will

duct the first sessions. Your Support Did It The ambulance cost over \$63,000 and the ambulance service was able to purchase it without debt, Hoogland said. He added that \$18,500.00 of the money came from a grant from the State of Idaho. The money for this type of grant comes from the fifty cents additional fee that it charged whenever the state issues a driver's license. The rest of the money came from the support of the community in the form of memorials. donations, gifts and the bi-annual EMT sausage feed. The new ambulance is possible only because of the support the community gives, Hoogland said. The J-K Ambulance Service and each E. M. T. truly appreciates what the people of Kendrick. Juliaetta and the surrounding
