

Donna Cope Retires After 33 Years as JES Secretary

After working for 33 years as the secretary at Juliaetta Elementary School, Donna Cope is retiring.

A retirement party was given in her honor at the Eldon Taylor residence recently. On behalf of the Board of Trustees and the District, a plaque commemorating her years of service was presented to Donna.

Donna has spent a total of 45 years at the Juliaetta School, 33 years as an employee.

Donna's memories of the school date back to 1932 when her father helped build the building.

Over the years she has touched the lives of many people and will be greatly missed.

Mrs. Emily Freidenberg asked some of her eighth grade students to write stories concerning the retirement of Mrs. Cope. Here are two of them.

Donna Cope, secretary of Juliaetta Elementary School, has decided to retire after 33 years of service.

Donna has lived in Juliaetta all her life. She graduated from Juliaetta High School and then attended Lewis Clark State College. While attending LCSC she studied elementary education.

One day, while at home, she received a telephone call from Jerry White, who was the principal of Juliaetta Elementary at that time. He asked if she would mind coming up to the school to register the students. After that she never stopped going back.

They ended up hiring her for \$65 a month. When asked why she worked for so little money she replied, "I love kids."

Donna married Onal Cope in 1947. At the time he worked for Gem State Lumber. He retired in 1982.

Donna is the mother of two children, Fred and Debbie. Fred died in 1981 in an accident. She also has five grandchildren.

Donna says that she has been at the grade school long enough. Now it is time for her to get out and travel. Everyone will miss having her at the grade school.

As secretary of Juliaetta Elementary School, Donna Cope has had many memorable moments. We spoke with her and are writing about some of the most memorable over the years. Some of these events are not so funny, and some are.

One of the funniest events happened when a second grader's parents were getting a divorce. He told all classmates that his parents were getting a divorce. Soon all the first grade students knew about it, and, not knowing what a divorce was, thought it sounded pretty neat. That morning all the first and second graders came dancing into Mrs. Cope's office singing about all their parents getting a divorce. She asked one if he knew what a divorce was and he said, "No, but my parents are getting one." Several thought it was a kind of car.

Another memorable moment that was not so funny happened when a third grade student, Richard Silflow, ran into the side of a pickup truck that the janitor had parked in the playground. It knocked one of his front teeth out, roots and all. Blood was everywhere. When Mrs. Cope learned about this she went outside, found the tooth, washed it off, kept it wet in a paper towel, and called his mother, Mrs. Roy Silflow. She took him to the dentist who put the tooth back in.

One of Mrs. Cope's pet peeves is kids running down the stairs. She has a good reason for this. Before the school was remodeled, there was a glass door at the bottom of the stairs. A student, who had been running down the stairs, slipped, fell, and smashed his arm through the door. Another student, who was coming in through the door, got some shattered glass in his nose. Mrs. Cope was afraid he had lost his sight, but he was okay.

Another time, a class was taking the President's Physical Fitness test when Mrs. Cope heard a student in the sixth grade room breathing heavily and making a loud noise. Mrs. Cope entered the room and found Ruth Ann Hutcheson hyperventilating. Mrs. Cope called the ambulance. While in the ambulance they gave Ruth Ann oxygen. By the time they got to Dr. Christensen's office the student was better. He told Ruth Ann to get off the bed; Mrs. Cope needed it more!

Advice on Measles Given by Health Officials

The North Central District Health Department is advising steps to prevent the spread of rubella (hard measles) due to an outbreak in Moscow, Idaho.

In response to numerous questions and concerns, the Health District is recommending the following persons be immunized for MMR:

—Children 15 months or older who have never been immunized.

—Anyone in the high school or jr. high population who were immunized prior to 15 months of age.

—Children at age 5 years, or 12 years or college entrance should receive their second dose of MMR.

—Persons exposed to a physician-diagnosed case of measles.

Anyone born before 1957 is considered immune.

Anyone having additional questions should contact their private physicians or the local health department.

The council also gave approval to Ed Campos for the purchase of cut-off saw and bolt meter.

The Clearwater Economic Development Association was retained by the city for overseeing the forthcoming water project. Rick Berenson will be in charge of the project for CEDA.

Jack Hammond, the water project engineer was present at the meeting and informed the council that the bids will be open to contractors on August 5.

Micio Flock Products showed a film that demonstrated how the new water plant will operate.

Kendrick Watering Restrictions Begin Jun. 17

The Kendrick City Council voted to restrict all outside watering within the city limits beginning Monday, June 17. The action was taken at the council meeting Tuesday evening. While the water situation isn't critical yet, the council is attempting to avoid a condition that happened last year when then water supply was thought to be adequate, and then found that a sudden warm spell ran the reservoirs dangerously low.

The watering restrictions, beginning Monday, June 17, will be the same as they were last season.

These are: the town will be divided into two areas for watering purposes. North of Main Street and West of School House Hill (9th St.) will be allowed to use outside watering on Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

South of Main Street and East of School House Hill (9th Street), will be permitted to water on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.

Getting Involved In the Local Election Process

Have you ever wondered how the people who set at the table when you go into a polling place to vote got there? Well, it's not that hard to be a member of an election board at a precinct voting place. If you are interested, and want to earn a little extra money at the same time, all you have to do is write a letter to your precinct party committee person and they will recommend your name to the County Clerk to be placed on a list to serve during the public elections in your area. It's called getting involved with your government of elections. Idaho Code on appointment of election judges by county clerk, 34-303.

The democratic process of voting and a place in your local precinct to vote on all county levies. Recently a public election was held on the library taxing system. We do have a branch of the county library located in the town of Juliaetta. But we voters who don't live in the town of Juliaetta should have the right to vote in our own regular voting precinct, not just where the library is located. The democratic process of voting on any taxation levies in the county should be held at all voting places that have been established regardless of the cost to the system involved. (Idaho Code 34-302).

What the library failed to do when reporting the figures of percent for passing the levy was tell how many people voted! For/against we saw 78% approval—but how many people voted in the Juliaetta Library election for all the other areas in South Latah County!

He enjoyed the outdoors and hunting and fishing.

Survivors include his parents, Lance and Susan Hollister of Bovill; four sisters, KayLee Evans of Lewiston, Holly Hollister, Tiffany Hollister and Deirdre Hollister, all of Bovill; his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Thelma Hamilton of Horseshoe Bend, Idaho; his paternal grandparents, Don and Alice Hollister of Nampa, Idaho and his fiancée, Danette Heinen of Kendrick, Idaho.

Services will be held Friday, June 14, at 2pm at Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston with Pastor Steve Howerton officiating. Cremation will follow.

Stephen was a fine young man and although he had not lived in the community for a very long time, he had a host of friends and acquaintances who knew and respected his good and gentle ways. Many aching hearts will again ask why these things happen, but there is no answer. God calls us all home in His own time and His own wisdom and we are left with the comfort of our faith and precious memories. Time will dull the sharp pain now being felt by those who loved him most. Our faith and memories will remain forever.
