Swimming Lessons At Kendrick Pool Begin July 8

Two sessions of swimming lessons will again be offered at the Kendrick Swimming Pool this summer, pool manager Audra Callison reported this week. Each session is two weeks long.

Children must be at least six years old to enroll in the American Red Cross Swimming Program. Beginners, advanced beginners, and intermediate swimming classes will each be \$15.75. Swimmers and emergency and basic water safety will be \$21.00. BWS and EWS will also require the purchase of course texts from the American Red Cross.

The popular "pre-guppy" class will again be offered this summer for children ages 4-6 during the first session, from 5 to 5:30 p. m. The first session will begin July 8 and run through July 19, Monday to Friday. The second session will be July 29 to August 9, Monday to Friday. There are more classes offered and more openings in each class during the first session of lessons.

Payment is required upon registration at the Kendrick Pool. Audra Callison, Karen Clemenhagen and Lianne Weyen are all certified Water Safety Instructors, (WSI), as well as certified lifeguards through the American Red Cross. Audra Callison, manager.

Richard L. Watson Former Area Resident, Passes

The funeral for Richard LaVerne Watson was held Saturday, June 22 at Pine Hills Funeral Chapel at Orofino with the Rev. Art Dryver of Faith Lutheran Church at Pierce officiating. Burial followed at the Fraser Cemetery near Weippe.

He died of a heart attack Wednesday, June 19, 1991 at his Weippe home. He was 57 and had worked in the logging industry.

He was born Aug. 9, 1933, at Crescent, Idaho, near Southwick to Llewellyn and Alma Swanson Watson. He attended schools at Crescent, Southwick, Kendrick and Cathlamet, Washington.

After completing his schooling, he began working in the logging industry.

He married Dorothy Wilson at Lewiston in June 1952. They were later divorced.

Watson worked as a line machine operator and log truck driver for various logging companies and at one time owned his own logging truck. He worked at Kendrick and Elk River and moved to Pierce in 1965. He became a Weippe resident in 1974.

He married Dolores Bailey at Coeur d'Alene Jan. 30, 1974, and they made their home at Weippe. He was of the Lutheran faith and enjoyed raising horses and cattle.

Watson retired from logging in 1978 because of ill health and, after receiving a kidney transplant in 1984, returned to work until November 1990.

Survivors include his wife of Weippe, two sons, David Watson of Pullman and Duane Watson of Weippe; two stepsons, Barry Bailey of Weippe and Rick Bailey of Headquarters, Idaho; two stepdaughters, Terry Millage and Sue Wyatt, both of Weippe; his mother and stepfather, Alma and George Finke of Southwick; five grandchildren and 14 step-grandchildren.

His father died previously. The family suggests memorials be sent to the Timberline EMTs, Box 76, Weippe, Idaho 83553.

Cameron Church Marks Centennial Sunday, June 23

Sunday morning, June 23, was just a little special for Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church. For one thing the Bishop, the Rev. Robert Keller, was there representing the Eastern Washington-Idaho synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America. As was his father, retired pastor Martin Keller of Fairfield, Washington, along with many guests, some from as far away as Seattle.

And there were other visiting clergy, too, including Cameron's son of the church, retired Pastor Sherwin Schmidt, his wife and daughter. Pastor John Blom and wife Carol were also on hand to celebrate. Daughter of the congregation Dorothy Schnaible, former missionary in India and widow of the late Rev. Fred Schnaible, had come home for the big occasion, joining her sister, former missionary Hermina Meyer, and mother Thelma Meyer in recalling Cameron's past.

It was a big day, too, for Rev. Theo Meske, as the congregation again expressed its loving appreciation for his 41-plus years of ministry at Cameron.

You see, it was Cameron Emmanuel's big Centennial Sunday Celebration, a special service recalling God's blessings over the last 100 years and reaffirming faith and hope for the future. The liturgy for the day, written largely by Cameron's Pastor Bob Kenyon, celebrated the past and set the direction for the future of the church.

The Bishop preached, reminding his audience that the church is not the building but rather the people of God who gather there. Coming from a rural setting himself, he has a special feeling for the small country church. He was especially impressed by Cameron's choir, which sang three anthems that day under the direction of Joanne Gertje. Leading the congregation in the prayer of the church were sisters Thelma Meyer and Margaret Parks.

Recognized during the introductions was Wayne Beebe, agent for the Aid Association to Lutherans, which had provided Cameron Emmanuel a generous grant to help stage the year-long centennial celebration. Yes, the celebration actually began a year ago with an old-fashioned outdoor Missionfest Sunday in the woods. During the year since, the Sunday bulletins have featured family sketches of members of the congregation. A souvenir booklet, "A Decade of Change," was available, along with notecards and postcards, some featuring pen and ink drawings of some of the church buildings in Cameron's long history. The brief history written by Frank Jacobson recounts the major changes that occurred during the final decade of Cameron's first 100 years. The booklet also contains a mission statement for the future written by Pastor Kenyon with help from the church council and the stewardship committee.

Letters from those unable to attend were read during the service, including congratulations and blessings from Troy's Pastor Bryon Hansen and from former Cameron Pastor Peter Vorhees. Former intern Paul Meeker, now serving in Bremerton, sent greetings, as did Interim Pastor Jerry Hickman and wife Sharon. Roger Pettenger, Lutheran Campus Pastor at W. S. U., expressed the pain that he felt at having to miss the service—and the picnic on the lawn that followed.

Special greetings were read from Cameron's sister congregation, Zion Lutheran in Juliaetta, who were also represented in person by members of that congregation.

As for the picnic, the committee in charge included Margie Silflow, Vickie Witt, and Suzanne Brammer. Some hardy folk did, in fact, enjoy their barbecued beef outside on the lawn, but many others stayed indoors to enjoy the food, the fellowship, and the program, which began with a rousing song about Cameron's history written by Rosalie Blankensteph and sung by Rosalie, Vickie Witt, and Alma Lawrence, accompanied at the piano by Ruth Slind. Chelsea Jo Kenyon and Charles Lyons each sang a song, as did Wender Brammer—in German yet! And Horst Reil gave his old squeeze box a good workout, too.

The consensus at the end of the day was that the celebration had been a great success. No one volunteered, however, to begin planning for the next one.
