Mark Mustoe Heads New Centennial Book Fund Committee

Mark Mustoe, a Southwick area farmer and rancher, was elected as the first president of the newly formed "Centennial Book Fund Committee, Thursday evening, June 20. The new committee was formed out of the original Centennial Committee of the Kendrick/Julietta Community Development Association and was responsible for the compiling and publishing of the Kendrick Centennial History Book.

Even though the centennial is now past, work and responsibility still remain, and it was realized that a permanent group was needed to take care of future book sales (there are 700 books still unsold), and also to distribute the money from the sale of the books, all of which has been dedicated to community projects in this area.

After a discussion by the committee, presided over by chairman Geo. Brocke, it was decided to elect a slate of officers for a two-year term who would be responsible for the book sales and the distribute of funds realized from this.

Nominated and elected by unanimous ballot were the following officers:

President: Mark Mustoe
Vice President: Betty Heimgartner
Secretary-Treasurer: Marilyn Eichner

At this point in the meeting, Mustoe assumed the chair.

Harry Burmeister of Juliaetta reported that plans for the May 2, 1992 Juliaetta Centennial are progressing smoothly. Juliaetta will be publishing a Centennial Calendar and a Centennial Cookbook as part of the observance.

In other matters discussed:

The group talked of how to spend the money from the book sales. Some projects were briefly touched on such as scholarships, but other than agreeing that the money should be expended for the benefit of all the communities involved; nothing definite was decided.

Items to be placed in the Centennial time capsule were discussed. Programs, the Centennial Book and other memorabilia of the day should be put in the capsule, it was agreed. Other items will be selected later and the committee will make the choice. Suggestions are still be accepted. When the time capsule will be opened was discussed and on a motion by Marilyn Eichner and a second by Wayne Harris, it was set that the capsule will be opened in fifty years.

A motion by Leasel Abrams and a second by Harry Burmeister to set terms of officers for 2 years by carried unanimously.

Adopting the official named of "The Centennial Book Fund Committee" as made on a motion by Wayne Harris and a second by Harry Burmeister.

The subject of who will be voting members of The Centennial Book Fund Committee" was discussed. It was finally decided that the committee should, at present time, be limited to those individuals on the original Centennial Committee. This was adopted by a motion made by Betty Heimgartner with a second by Marilyn Eichner and carried without dissent.

The next meeting will be held this fall, probably in October. Final decision to be made by the president and his officers.

The committee will contact the Idaho State Library to see if arrangement can be made to sell the centennial book to each library in the state. Harry Burmeister said the book will also be on sale at Juliaetta's Centennial in 1992.

And finally, the group went on record to express its gratitude to George F. Brocke, Jr., for all his efforts, not only in the publishing of the centennial book, but also for all his other labor in preparing and presenting the 1990 Kendrick Community Centennial.

The meeting adjourned at 8:05.

Be Careful With Your Eyes If You Watch July 11 Eclipse

"Directly viewing the July 11 solar eclipse could cause severe eye damage, even blindness," cautions Chris Card, O. D., President of the Idaho Optometric Association.

The July 11 partial eclipse will occur at approximately noon in this area. At the eclipse's midpoint, the moon will cover about 25% of the sun. Looking directly at the sun, during an eclipse or not, allows the sun's invisible rays to painfully burn the eye's retina, which contains the sensitive receptor nerve cells needed for seeing.

During the 1970 solar eclipse in the eastern United States, 140 eye injury cases were reported. Forty percent thought they were using safe viewing methods; the other 60 percent looked directly at the sun without any protection.

"When the retina is burned or scarred, permanent blindness can result," Dr. Card said. "Sunglasses, smoked glass, photographic film of any kind, welder's goggles or photographic filters are not considered safe. But you can view the eclipse indirectly, with a special device called a sunscope, which you can make at home."

Congressman LaRocco Denounces Grazing Fee Hike

Idaho First District Congressman Larry LaRocco this week denounced House approval of a 400 percent increase in grazing fees as a congressional end run that will drive cattle-men off public land.

"We've had a market-oriented grazing fee formula that has worked well for 13 years," Congressman LaRocco said. "This effort to quadruple grazing fees was done without hearings and without committee or subcommittee approval."

The amendment by Reps. Mike Synar, D-Okla., and Buddy Darden, D-Ga., to hike grazing fees from \$1.91 to \$8.74 per Animal Unit Month (AUM) passed 232-192. It now goes to the Senate. A similar proposed increase last year passed the House 251-155 but died in a House-Senate conference committee.

"I oppose the Synar Amendment as a Westerner and a member of Congress vitally interested in the legislative process," Congressman LaRocco said on the floor of the House. "I ask that Congress let the Interior Committee hold hearings, gather data and produce thoughtful, credible legislation to resolve this issue."

The Synar-Darden increase was defeated in an Interior Subcommittee on which Congressman LaRocco sits. But it was tacked on to a public lands appropriation bill before the house last week.

Congressman LaRocco said he backs putting the Public Rangeland Improvement Act back into law. PRIA, originally initiated by Idaho Sen. Frank Church, expired in 1985 and been continued administratively since.

Congressman LaRocco said the PRIA formula is a common-sense method of setting grazing fees based on production costs, market prices

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and private land lease rates. Under the PRIA formula, grazing fees have risen 46 percent over the past four years.
