Kendrick Asks for A Little More Help In Conserving Water Supply

The sudden arrival of summer put a heavy burden on Kendrick's water supply, it was reported this week. In the past week the city's water usage jumped to also 1 million gallons in a day, which is just about the limit the city wells and pumps can handle.

It was this dramatic increase that has forced the city to request an additional cut-back in outside watering. The council agreed Tuesday night at its regular meeting, to ask that homeowners limit their watering to just two hours a day, preferably in either the early morning or evening. The watering restrictions are still in force—North of Main street on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, and south of Main St. on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. No Sunday watering. Everyone west of School House Hill is considered with the north side, everyone east of School House Hill is considered in the south part.

The public's cooperation is requested in this matter.

SEAL COATING PROJECTS TO BEGIN SOON IN DIST. 2

Several seal coating projects will begin soon on various roads in District 2, the Idaho Transportation Department announced.

Included in these are: U. S. 95, Culesac to Webb Road. Crews will be placing a seal coat on 6.6 miles of U. S. 95, from Culesac to Webb Road, just south of Lapwai, beginning Friday, July 12, weather permitting.

Idaho 14, Mt. Idaho Bridge to Brown's Creek. Crews will be placing a seal coat on 8 miles of Idaho 14, from Mt. Idaho Bridge to Brown's Creek, beginning Saturday, July 13, weather permitting.

U. S. 12, Kamiah to Kooskia. Crews will be placing a seal coat on 7.6 miles of U. S. 12, from Kamiah to Kooskia, beginning Monday, July 15, weather permitting.

911 Emergency Phone System Now In Effect

A 911 emergency communication system service is now in operation in the Kendrick-Juliaetta served by Potlatch Telephone Co. It was announced this week. By dialing 911 the caller will be connected with the Latah County Sheriff's office in Moscow.

The 911 Emergency Service is designed to provide quick contact with law enforcement or fire assistance. Last November, Latah County voters overwhelmingly authorized the commission to levy a fee of up to \$1 a month to telephone subscribers outside Moscow for 911 service.

County officials originally intended to begin the 911 service in February, but they ran into technical problems dedicating phone lines at Kendrick, Juliaetta and Troy. That hurdle has been resolved with a call-forwarding system.

At a news conference Monday morning, Latah County officials emphasized the basic 911 service will supplement local emergency services and encouraged residents to use local telephone numbers for fire services.

Commissioner Dana Magnuson said the 911 service doesn't replace existing numbers. The service will largely benefit people who are new to the county, he said.

There will be no change in the present emergency numbers: The fire and ambulance numbers will remain the same:

Kendrick Fire 289-4700
Juliaetta Fire 276-3700
Ambulance 1-800-632-8000

Talking about the new system on Tuesday afternoon Jerry Brown, manager of Potlatch Telephone Co., and mayor of Kendrick, said even though fire and medical response can be obtained by local residents who use the 911 number, he added that quicker response will probably be obtained by dialing the local numbers because it will eliminate "the middle-man", namely the sheriff's office.

Subscribers of Potlatch Telephone Co. who live in Nez Perce and Clearwater counties and dial 911 on their phones will be connected to Latah County Sheriff's office. Brown said when the technology is available these subscribers will have the 911 number blocked, because the Latah response might be unavailable or not appropriate.

There will be a \$1 per month charge for the 911 service beginning with the July billing, Brown said.

Fund Established for Young Leukemia Patient

A fund has been established in the Moscow First Security Bank to take donations for Kenny Anderson, the 16-year-old son of Sharon Anderson of Juliaetta, it was learned this week. Kenny has been diagnosed as having leukemia and is currently undergoing treatment.

Anderson has been receiving blood transfusions and chemotherapy and it is understood that a bone marrow transplant is also being considered.

Editor:

The United States Flag.

Betsy Ross is often given credit for designing the flag. This is not entirely true. George Washington engaged Betsy Ross to sew a sample flag, drawn by him on a piece of paper. The design was rectangular with 13 alternate red and white stripes with 13 stars in a circle on a field of blue (6-pointed). Betsy suggested a 5-point star. This was accepted by Washington. The sample flag was presented to congress and accepted as official June 14, 1777.

Betsy Ross sewed the first U. S. flag and held the contract for all U. S. flags until her death Jan. 30, 1836. Her daughter, Mrs. Clarissa Wilson retained the business. In 1857 the contract was lost to others. This information came from a presidential atlas published in Franklin D. Roosevelt's administration honoring Howard Hughes' flight around the world, and in part from Home Encyclopedia.

Other interesting facts:

When Vermont and Kentucky were admitted to the Union in 1791 and 1792, congress voted to add 2 more stripes and 2 more stars. For 23 years this was the U. S. flag. Frances Scott Kee was looking at a 15 stripe flag when he wrote the "Star Spangled Banner". As more states were added, it was obvious a change in make-up was necessary. In 1818 congress passed a law saying they would have only 13 stripes and a star would be added for each new state.

Until 1916 people made the flag in different shapes. That year the president ordered it should always be one and nine-tenths as long as its height, and the blue field be seven stripes high, five pointed stars, one point directly upward.

Respect for the flag shows respect

for the United States and all it stands for!
