Juliaetta City Ordinance No. 238

is the "Clean Up" ordinance that was passed by the council June 20, 1989. The provisions of the ordinance prohibit the placing, leaving or maintaining of any vehicle, machinery, trailer, or equipment in a wrecked or partially dismantled condition. so as to cause a nuisance. Then the city mailed letters to residents asking that residents who might be affected to contact the city and tell them of plans to correct whatever problems


