New Idaho History Book Packed with Fascinating Facts

Did you know that:
—Pack camels once traveled the predecessor of today's I-90, the Mullan Road (1861-66).
—Residents of Franklin, Idaho's first town, originally insisted that they lived in Utah.
—Potatoes were introduced to the

state in the 1830s by missionary Henry Spalding, but Idaho lagged behind Maine as the nation's top potato producer until the 1950s.
—Idaho's first telephone system, in Halley, offered weather reports to its twenty-five subscribers (1883).
—During the crash of 1893, the mayor turned off all eight gas street lights in Boise to cut costs.
—Idaho was one of four states that allowed women to vote in 1896 (more than a dozen years before Washington and Oregon did).
—The campus of the University of Idaho was landscaped by the Olmstead Brothers, the same firm that

designed New York's Central Park in 1907.
—Moses Alexander, Idaho's governor during World War I, was not only the nation's first elected Jewish governor, but also a native of Germany.
—In 1922, fifteen-year-old Phil Farnsworth of Rigby pioneered the picture-tube electronic that would make television possible.
—State unemployment was so high during the Great Depression that arsonists set forest fires so that they could earn money putting them out.
—Vardis Fisher's "Idaho: A Guide in Words and Pictures" was the first WPA state guide to be published (1937).
—Rupert had the nation's first electrically heated high school in 1914; Arco was the first community lighted by nuclear-generated electricity (1955).
—Nearly 10,000 Japanese Americans from Seattle and Portland were removed to the Minidoka Relocation Center near Twin Falls during World War II, but Idaho's own 1,200 Japanese-American residents were not relocated.

—Although it was the first Pacific Northwest state to establish a major state park (Heyburn Park in 1911), Idaho today is the only Western state without a national park.
Discover more about Idaho's past in an extensively illustrated new book by Carlos Schwantes, published this summer by the University of Nebraska Press.
"In Mountain Shadows" begins with Lewis and Clark's 1805 explorations. Schwantes describes Idaho's native residents at that time, divided by the same geographical and cultural boundaries that persisted through much of Idaho's history. He recounts the experiences of missionaries and Mormons, the fur traders and miners who were among Idaho's first non-native residents. He describes the booms and busts of mining days, the coming of the railroad, and the vigilantism and chronic animosity towards Indians and Mormons during Idaho's territorial years. Economic downturn, labor unrest, and Populist activism figure prominently in the region's history after statehood in 1890.
Carlos A. Schwantes is a professor of history at the University of Ida-

ho, and author of "The Pacific Northwest: An Interpretive History", also published by the University of Nebraska Press.
