> The issue began to simmer after the council mailed letters to some residents informing them they might be in violation of Ordinance No. 238 and asked the alleged violators what action they proposed to take.

Councilman George Bacon told to enforcing this ordinance." But he added that the council is not opposed to treating each case individually and working out a plan. But, he also said that it is each individual's responsibility to respond to the city's request to inform them of: 1. A description of the property involved 2. Provide a plan they (the property owners) have to meet the requirements to correct what is deemed as an undesirable condition, and, 3. for the first time, members being Have some time and date frame pro-

posed to have improvements made. The criticism of the whole issue appeared to center on certain recurring themes, namely, "We were here "When you came here you were aware of the situation", "You can't tell us what we can do on our own property", and, "You want us to bear the expense of obeying the ordinance". Also raised question of whether the town can grow in view of the water situation.

"What is junk?" was also a question asked at the meeting. To some,

Also raised was the question of scemingly "selective enforcement". Why some residents were singled out for possible violations and received letters and why others were not. 'We've had responses from some councilman Dirk Hammond, who said some residents have told the council what they planned to do. Some residents failed to respond to the city's requests.

For those who supported the council's present course of action, the answer was plain and clear—Enforce the ordinance. These people want the ordinance enforced and the town cleaned up. Also the issue of zoning was raised. Councilman Bacon was of the thought that moving in the direction of a zoning regulation may be another means of dealing with the subject and that a committee. might be appointed to consider such


