Colette Cozort Attended Science/Math Academy at Corvallis, Oregon

Corvallis, Oregon—Colette Cozort, a teacher at Kendrick High School was among 50 teachers who participated in a two-week science and math academy designed to enhance teaching skills, promote leadership potential, and improve educational opportunities for students in some of the country's more remote areas.

Cozort, a science teacher at KHS, has gained hands-on experience in journal writing, science curriculum reform, classroom astronomy, grant writing, science and math for minorities, and other instructional and leadership areas.

Teachers from rural areas in Alaska, Washington, Oregon, Idaho, and Montana have learned from trainers in math and science education and have shared successful practices as part of the Science and Mathematics Academies for Rural Teachers: The SMART Project. The Academy began July 15 and ended July 26. Some of the participants teach at schools accessible only by air, and many teach a variety of subjects in schools with fewer than 50 students in grades K-12.

"One of the greatest concerns expressed by rural teachers is the need to collaborate and learn from others in their profession," says Steve Nelson, Director of the Rural Education Program at the Northwest Regional Educational Laboratory (NWREL) in Portland, Oregon, coordinator of the Academy. "Many of the teachers participating in the SMART Academy come from schools where they are required to teach subjects ranging from science and math to social studies, history and English. The Academy is providing these teachers an opportunity to develop their skills as both educators and leaders in their rural school districts. And it will provide them with instructional skills and techniques designed to improve student outcomes in their classrooms."

Goals of the project included:
—Build regional capacity for improving the quality of science and math instruction in small, rural schools,
—Recognize and reward outstanding science and mathematics teachers in small, rural schools by providing them professionally renewing experiences and leadership roles,
—Provide opportunity for teachers from small rural schools to actively participate in reform of science and mathematics education in their states.

Mildred Spicer, 86, Formerly of Kendrick Passes August 9

Mildred L. Spicer of Lewiston, a former Kendrick resident, died of causes related to age Friday, Aug. 9 at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center at Lewiston. She was 86.

She was born June 7, 1905, to William H. and Mary M. May Holt at Galena, Mo., and grew up at Galena.

When she was 14 years old she and her younger sister and brother were orphaned. In 1919 she moved to Kendrick where she was raised by her older sister and her family.

She graduated from Kendrick High School in 1924 and then attended Lewiston State Normal College, now Lewis-Clark State College, for two years. She graduated with a teaching degree.

She taught school for a few years at Avon, Idaho, Fix Ridge, Idaho, and Rose Lake, Idaho near Kellogg. She moved to California in the 1940s and worked in a shipyard during World War II as a riveter.

She married William E. Spicer on May 1, 1948, at Boise. They lived at Whittier, Calif., until returning to Kendrick in 1957. He died in 1961.

She lived at Kendrick until 1974, when she moved to Lewiston.

She was a member of the Evergreen Friendship Club while living at Kendrick and was also a member of the Retired Teachers Association. She enjoyed flowers.

Survivors include a sister, Dorothy Holt of Lewiston.

Five sisters and four brothers died previously.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 11 a. m. at Malcom-Brower Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston with Gary McIntosh officiating.

Soloist was Merrill Womach who sang "Whispering Hope" and "God Will Take Care of You".

Water Will be Shut Off In Kendrick Thursday Morning, Aug. 15

Water service to a large portion of Kendrick will be disrupted for several hours Thursday morning, August 15, said city maintenance man Steve Howerton.

The water will be turned off from the bottom of school house hill, 9th St., out to the west end of town, beginning at 8 a. m.

The shut down is being made so workers can replace a leaking fire hydrant in front of the Ackerman home on Main Street.

Steve also said that present watering restrictions appear to be allowing the city pumps to keep up with demand, so far. He said last week the city drew 968,000 gallons in a 7-day period and the main pump in the west end was operating almost constantly to keep the reservoir full.

The city appreciates the excellent cooperation residents have given this year in using water for outside purposes.

Committees Named at Development Meeting Thursday

Fifteen members of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association were present at a noon meeting of that group held Thursday at the Town and Country Diner.

Reports were heard that work and requirements were almost complete which would qualify Juliaetta and Kendrick for certification as "Gem Communities" under a program of the state's Department of Commerce. Certification would mean the two communities would be eligible for greater state assistance with economic development and also make the area eligible for matching fund grants.

In the course of conversation, the topic of working for the creation of a rural fire protection district was discussed. Formation of a rural fire protection district in the Southwick-Cameron area was attempted a number of years ago, but the issue was voted down at an election.

The naming of some members for subcommittee was accomplished.

The appointments are only a partial list and more members will, or can be added:

Infrastructure: Jerry Brown, Lynne Bruce, Eldon Taylor and George Bacon.

Business Development and Expansion: Donna Heinen, Donna Long, Gary Collins and Wayne Harris.

Economic Development: Phil Heinen, Greg Mann, Lora Schmidt, Bill Roth, Dirk Hammond.

Discussion of having a "Welcome Wagon" for the communities was also discussed and the idea was received favorably, although no action was taken at this time.

Lil Howerton reported on the progress of the creation of a brochure for the communities and said the project is coming along well and a preliminary draft is expected to be available soon.

Frank Jacobson spoke to the group about his research and work on his association appointment to help promote this area in attracting retirees to the community. The association voted to spend \$100, if needed, to participate in a venture of this kind.

It was also voted, on a motion by Bob Hasholdt, to invite a guest to the October meeting. Last October the association hosted the Council General of Australia to its meeting and the whole affair was most successful.

The subject of having a night meeting of the association came up and was received with almost overwhelming apathy.

And, finally, the subject of all the adverse publicity the communities, especially Juliaetta, have received, was discussed. No one at the meeting had an idea on how to counteract this type of thing but it is something the area will probably have to deal with if the community desires to maintain a good image.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, GRANTING TO THE POTLATCH TELEPHONE COMPANY, INC., THE RIGHT TO PLACE, ERECT AND MAINTAIN POLES, WIRES AND OTHER APPLIANCES AND CONDUCTORS AND TO LAY UNDERGROUND WIRES FOR THE TRANSMISSION OF ELECTRICITY FOR TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH PURPOSES IN AND UPON AND UNDER THE STREETS, ALLEYS, AVENUES, THOROUGHFARES AND PUBLIC HIGHWAYS WITHIN THE CITY OF JULIAETTA; PROVIDING THAT THE GRANTEE MAY EXERCISE THE PRIVILEGE OF OPERATING TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH INSTRUMENTS AND CONDUCTING A TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH BUSINESS WITHIN THE CITY OF JULIAETTA; PROVIDING THAT THIS GRANT SHALL BE FOR A PERIOD OF TEN YEARS; PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT UPON ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION ACCORDING TO LAW.

SECTION 1. Provides for the award of a telephone franchise to the Potlatch Telephone Company, Inc., and permits said Grantee to utilize the City's right-of-ways and easements.

SECTION 2. regulates how Grantee may use City property.

SECTION 3. Provides that Grantee shall hold the City harmless from claims arising from its use of City property.

SECTION 4. Requires Grantee pay the costs of this ordinance.

SECTION 5. Provides that the provisions of this ordinance be severable.


