Juliaetta to Re-bid **Portion of Water** System Project

Because one division of a call for bids on the construction of a new water treatment and collection system was so far above the engineer's estimate, the Juliaetta City Council has decided to re-bid that portion of the project. The action was taken

The project is a \$650,000 under-taking that will be partially funded by a state grant and partially from the sale of municipal bonds. It is being undertaken with the goal of brother, Gilbert Bryant of Soda ending the city's chronic water shortage. The plan is to set up a collection system taking water from the Potlatch River, running it through a filtration plant and then putting into the reservoir.

The project calls for the bidding to be done in 3 divisions. Division 1 would include the water filtering equipment; Division 2, the building ards for children playing around any itself and Division 3, the concrete pipe, filtration and water gathering equipment and other necessary equipment.

Juliaetta Council Revises 'Clean-Up' Ordinance No. 238

Meeting in regular session last Tuesday evening the Juliaetta City Council approved and passed Ordinance No. 238A, which is a revision city residents.

Basically, Ordinance was designed to give the city the authority to stop the practice of leaving abandoned or dismantled vehicles on the streets of the town and also discourage the practice of allowing old wrecked or dismantled vehicles and other mechinery and equipment to remain or accumulate on private property. If such equipment or old vehicles are on private property the ordinance requires they been screened or block-

ed from public view. Earlier this year a public opinion ballot was presented to the voters of the city and 85% of of those voting indicated they wanted the ordinance enforced. Later the council began sending notices to those residents who were deemed to be in possible violation of the ordinance, requesting that these people meet with the city or inform the city of how they propose to come into compliance.

As the council began to pressure some of the persons who did not respond to initial contacts, a group of citizens appeared at a council meeting last month to express their dissatisfaction with both the ordinance and the methods the council was using. Supporters of the ordinance were also present at the meeting urging continued enforcement.

Tuesday of last week the council responded by approving and passing Ordinance 238, which is a modification and clarification of the original ordiinance. In addition No. 238A addresses vehicles or equipment that might cause environmental problems and conditions that could pose hazvehicle or equipment that is unprotected or unguarded. The new ordinance also more clearly spells out possible penalties and how these penalties would be collected. In short, the city didn't give an inch on its clean-up" plans.


