Phyllis N. Noble, 65, Claimed by Cancer

Phyllis N. Noble, who with her husband owned and operated a grocery store in Juliaetta for many years, died Thursday, Aug. 15 at her home in Lewiston of cancer.

During their business career, she and Charles owned and operated stores in Bovill, Deary and Juliaetta.

She was born May 10, 1926, to Singleton J. and Elizabeth (Patty) Bryant at Ahsahka, Idaho. She attended grade schools at Ahsahka and Teakan, Idaho and graduated from Orofino High School in 1943.

After graduation she worked as a nurse's aid at State Hospital North at Orofino.

She married Charles Noble June 14, 1946, at Lewiston. In the early 1950s, they owned and operated the Noble's Store at Bovill. From 1959 to 1961, she worked at C. C. Anderson's Department Store at Lewiston as a credit manager.

They purchased Ballantyne's Store at Juliaetta in 1961 and operated it as Noble's Grocery there until they sold the business in 1980.

They then moved to their property near Deary where she continued working for the new owners of the store which became Juliaetta Market. She retired in 1988.

The couple owned homes at Deary and Lewiston.

Survivors include her husband at the family home in Deary; a daughter, Janice L. Groseclose of Lewiston; a son Randy E. Noble of Amarillo, Texas; four sisters, Mildred Bashaw, Dorothy Bobbitt and Esther Pelton, all of Lewiston, and Stella Bronson of Independence, Mo.; a brother, Gilbert Bryant of Soda Springs, Idaho; and five grandchildren.

Three brothers and a sister died previously.

The funeral was held Tuesday morning at Brower-Wann Memorial chapel at Lewiston, with the Rev. Dan George of the Juliaetta Community Church officiating. Burial followed at Juliaetta City Cemetery.

A Truly Beloved Lady— "Beloved by all who knew her" is a term often used (and often misused), to describe someone. But, with Phyllis Noble it is the only description that seems fitting for a woman who was so gentle, caring and generous.

During the time she and Charles operated Noble's Grocery, their kindness and generosity were almost legendary. They were active in the community, church and school affairs and their help was always there for any good purpose. The people they helped through the store and in other ways, in good times and bad, made Charles and Phyllis two of the most respected citizens in both Juliaetta and Kendrick.

Friends who had to watch Phyllis's gallant, losing battle against cancer felt a part of the suffering she had to endure and, in a way, feel relief that the helpless fight is over and that Phyllis is now safe and free of pain. But many hearts are full of sadness that this fine lady is gone.

Juliaetta to Re-bid Portion of Water System Project

Because one division of a call for bids on the construction of a new water treatment and collection system was so far above the engineer's estimate, the Juliaetta City Council has decided to re-bid that portion of the project. The action was taken at the August meeting of the council last week.

The project is a \$650,000 undertaking that will be partially funded by a state grant and partially from the sale of municipal bonds. It is being undertaken with the goal of ending the city's chronic water shortage. The plan is to set up a collection system taking water from the Polatch River, running it through a filtration plant and then putting into the reservoir.

The project calls for the bidding to be done in 3 divisions. Division 1 would include the water filtering equipment; Division 2, the building itself and Division 3, the concrete pipe, filtration and water gathering equipment and other necessary equipment.

When the bids were open last Tuesday night, the Division 1 bid was \$169,000, about \$6,000 less than the engineer's estimate. The bid on Division 2 was \$42,000, or \$8,000 less than the estimate. But on Division 3, the lowest of three bids received was for \$511,000. Over \$100,000 more than was estimated. The city had received 12 inquiries about the bidding of this part of the project, but only three bids were actually received.

The bids were so far above the estimate, the city felt that if this portion of the project were to be re-bid and more bids could be received the price might come down considerably.

So the council agreed to again call for bids which would be opened at the September meeting. Councilman Dirk Hammond said this action shouldn't delay the project to any great measure and that if the action is successful, work on the new water plant should begin about on schedule.

But what the city began to do, said councilman Dirk Hammond, was to begin taking each violation on a case-by-case basis and make personal contact with individuals involved. Most of the resident who have been contacted have responded with their plans to correct whatever problems existed. This, according to Hammond, was what the city was concerned about. Once contact is made, Hammond Tuesday afternoon, the next step is to meet with the people involved and set down and try to get a plan of corrective action and a time frame of when the action is to be taken. Hammond said he and another councilman, George Bacon, had gone out and personally viewed some of the property involved and talked with the property owners. He felt this helped speed the response to city concerns.

Hammond said he feels the main point is to convince those who might be in conflict with Ordinance 238 and 238A, that the council is aware of all the problems and that each situation can and will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, GRANTING TO THE POTLATCH TELEPHONE COMPANY, INC., THE RIGHT TO PLACE, ERECT AND MAINTAIN POLES, WIRES AND OTHER APPLIANCES AND CONDUCTORS AND TO LAY UNDERGROUND WIRES FOR THE TRANSMISSION OF ELECTRICITY FOR TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH PURPOSES IN AND UPON AND UNDER THE STREETS, ALLEYS, AVENUES, THROUGHFARES AND PUBLIC HIGHWAYS WITHIN THE CITY OF JULIAETTA; PROVIDING THAT THE GRANTEE MAY EXERCISE THE PRIVILEGE OF OPERATING TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH INSTRUMENTS AND CONDUCTING A TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH BUSINESS WITHIN THE CITY OF JULIAETTA; PROVIDING THAT THIS GRANT SHALL BE FOR A PERIOD OF TEN YEARS; PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT UPON ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION ACCORDING TO LAW.

SECTION 1. Provides for the award of a telephone franchise to the Potlatch Telephone Company, Inc., and permits said Grantee to utilize the City's right-of-ways and easements.

SECTION 2. regulates how Gran-

tee may use City property.

SECTION 3. Provides that Grantee shall hold the City harmless from claims arising from its use of City property.

SECTION 4. Requires Grantee pay the costs of this ordinance.

SECTION 5. Provides that the provisions of this ordinance be severable.

CITY OF JULIAETTA ORDINANCE NO. 238A

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF IDAHO, PROHIBITING THE PLACING, LEAVING OR MAINTAINING OF ANY VEHICLE, MACHINERY, TRAILER, OR EQUIPMENT IN A WRECKED OR PARTIALLY DISMANTLED CONDITION, SO AS TO CAUSE A NUISANCE; PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES; PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT FROM AND AFTER ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION ACCORDING TO LAW.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council deem it in the public interest to control the public nuisance and visual nuisance caused by abandoned, wrecked and disassembled vehicles in the City;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. VEHICLES ON STREETS: It shall be unlawful for any person to place, keep or leave any motor vehicle, piece of machinery, trailer or equipment in a wrecked or partially dismantled condition or in a state of repair, for a period of forty-eight hours or more on a public street, alley or other public property. Such vehicle, machinery, trailer or equipment is hereby declared to be a public nuisance.

SECTION 2. VEHICLES ON PRIVATE PROPERTY: It shall be unlawful for any person to place, keep or leave any motor vehicle, piece of machinery, trailer or equipment in a wrecked or partially dismantled condition or in a state of repair, for a period of more than ten (10) days on private property unless enclosed in a building or other area screened from public view and fenced in a manner to prevent children from entering the property. Any such fence and screening shall be constructed in compliance with the current provisions of The Uniform Building Code. Such vehicle, machinery, trailer, or equipment is hereby declared to be a public nuisance unless properly fenced or enclosed.

SECTION 3. VEHICLES OR EQUIPMENT CAUSING ENVIRONMENTAL PROBLEMS: It shall be unlawful for any person to place, keep, leave or maintain any vehicle, piece of equipment or machinery in a fashion which permits same to leak or discharge oil or gasoline onto the ground or pavement or which discharges freon into the air. Such vehicle, equipment or machinery is hereby declared to be a public nuisance.

SECTION 4. REMOVAL OF VEHICLES: The Mayor or Chief of Police or their designee may cause any motor vehicle, piece of machinery, trailer, equipment which is in violation of this ordinance to be removed at the expense of the owner of the personal or real property. If the owner fails to pay for such removal within 30 days of billing, the amount owing shall be submitted to the appropriate county official for collection with property taxes in accordance with Idaho Code.

SECTION 5. PENALTY FOR VIOLATION OF ORDINANCE: A violation of this Ordinance is a misdemeanor. Any person convicted of a violation of any section of this Ordinance shall be fined in the sum not to exceed three hundred dollars (\$300.00) and such person may be confined in County Jail for a period of not more than thirty (30) days, OR both such fine and imprisonment may be imposed. Each day, after notice, that the property remains in violation shall constitute a separate violation. Both the person playing the nuisance on the premises and the owner of real property permitting such nuisance to exist on his or her property shall be deemed in violation of this Ordinance.

SECTION 6. REPEAL OF INCONSISTENT PROVISIONS: Any provision of any Ordinance of the City which is inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance is hereby repealed. PASSED by the City Council and APPROVED by the Mayor this 6th day of August, 1991.

RESOLUTION NO. 116
A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, PROVIDING FOR APPOINTMENT OF A RISK MANAGER; PROVIDING THAT ALL EMPLOYEES AND PUBLIC OFFICIALS SHALL BE ADVISED OF THIS POLICY. PROVIDING FOR THIS RESOLUTION TO BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT UPON ITS PASSAGE AND APPROVAL.

WHEREAS, the City recognizes the need to manage public funds prudently and further recognizes that local government with its range of services, is considered a high-risk operation; and

WHEREAS, the City is dedicated to managing the risks, providing services to its citizens and doing all it can to prevent losses and create a safe workplace for employees; and

WHEREAS, the City recognizes that although losses will inevitably occur, the City considers no loss acceptable and will make every effort to identify and treat all loss exposures;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK AS FOLLOWS:

1. The administration of the Risk Management Policy and the supervision of loss prevention activities will be under the direction of the Risk Manager. The Risk Manager shall advise the City Council of policies and actions advisable to minimize risk to the City and its citizens. The Risk Manager will be appointed by the Mayor with the consent of the City Council.

2. Every elected official and employee will adhere to the policies and practices established pertaining to risk management and loss prevention. All elected officials, department directors and employees of the City of Kendrick are responsible to employ safe work practices and to identify unsafe conditions while performing their daily tasks and to report unsafe conditions to the Risk Manager.

3. The Risk Management Policy of the City of Kendrick will have the ultimate objective of preservation of this public entity's assets. As a means to that end, the Risk Manager has the responsibility of formulating and implementing programs and procedures that will minimize the public entity's property, revenue, and personnel losses.

4. The attached Risk Management Policy Statement is hereby adopted and shall be provided to all new employees and newly elected officials.

5. This Resolution shall be in full force and effect upon its passage and approval.
