

## Kendrick School District Announces Policy for Free, Reduced Price Meals

Kendrick School District No. 283 this week announced its policy for free and reduced price meals for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch Program. Each school and the office of the Superintendent has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The following household size and income criteria will be used in determining eligibility. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available from the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

Taylor, Superintendent, will review the applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to Doug Harris, Board Chairman, Kendrick, Idaho, Phone 289-4622 for a hearing on the decision.

Households that list a food stamp or AFDC case number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Other households approved for benefits are required to report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in house size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown below.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for school meal benefits. If a household wishes to apply for benefits for foster children living with them, the household should contact the school for more information.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for the purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age, or handicap. If any member of a household believes he/she has been discriminated against, he or she should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250.

## Kendrick is Subject of Recent "Latah Legacy"

Kendrick, Idaho, is the subject matter for the most recent edition of "Latah Legacy", a journal of local and regional history produced by the Latah County Historical Society.

Kendrick's Charles A. Bower wrote the article "One-Room School House" and Milton D. Patterson provided six of the twenty-four photographs in the photo section.

Carolyn Gravelle of Juliaetta researched, selected, and edited the articles and photographs for this 40-page edition.

This issue is a centennial salute to Kendrick, mostly by using old newspaper articles from Kendrick, Moscow, and Lewiston newspapers to trace some of its 100-year history.

For example, there is Thomas Kirby's letter from the Moscow Mirror, describing his controversy with Juliaetta's townspeople and why he left Juliaetta to start Latah (Kendrick's original name).

In addition, there are original articles and photos of the 1899 train wreck, the 1900 flood, the 1904 fire, the Brady Gulch flood, the first Locomotive Blossom Festival, the School of Country Living, the Kendrick Gazette, and the Centennial Celebration itself.

Many familiar names are mentioned in the articles and familiar faces are seen in the photographs, which makes this "Latah Legacy" interesting and informative reading for the K/V people.

Copies are available for \$4 at Phil's Food City in Kendrick, at the Chicken Co-op in Juliaetta, and at the Latah County Historical Society in Moscow.

You can receive a free copy of the Kendrick Centennial issue of "Latah Legacy" when you join or purchase a gift membership in the Latah County Historical Society by December 31, 1991, according to LCHS director Mary Reed.

Categories for yearly membership are for individuals as low as \$7.50; for families at \$12.50; for businesses at \$25.

Membership benefits include 20% discount on all LCHS publications, two issues of the "Latah Legacy", a quarterly Newsletter, invitations to exhibits and special events.
