Elementary School Summer Projects Ending

Summer work projects at Juliaetta Elementary School are coming to an end with the painting of the railing and leveling of the ground below the school that will someday include off-street parking. The handicap ramp, sidewalks, curbs and railing is a contract project that was designed by Bellamy Architects of Coeur d'Alene with the plans inspected and approved by the Idaho State Department of Education. The project was mostly paid for by Kendrick Joint School District No. 283 portion of the first two years of the Idaho State Lottery monies and the work was done by D. Taylor Construction of Juliaetta. This project gives handicap access from the classroom level required by current federal and state building standards.

Landscape will be done by the school district in front of the school and the bottom two areas will be designed by the local garden club and the upper two areas will be designed by a Juliaetta student attending Kendrick High School, Shelly Taylor. If anyone in the community is wanting to donate a dogwood tree as a living memory of next year's Juliaetta Centennial or as a living memorial of a family member, please contact the district superintendent, Eldon Taylor at the high school or Emily Fredenbergh, head teacher at Juliaetta Elementary. It appears that there will be room for six dogwood trees along the front of the building.

In other work completed this summer, the third grade classroom was remodeled and made larger by taking out the wall between it and the former girl's restroom. Likewise, a staff/handicap restroom was built on the hall side of the old restroom. All of this work was done by Roger Syverson, the district's maintenance person, as well as the installation of a sprinkler system on the entire playground side of the school building.

Marsha Schoeffler Accepts Position in Fiji Islands

Marsha K. Schoeffler arrived in Fiji Islands in late August to begin her duties at a video production specialist at Southern Pacific University in Suva, Fiji. Marsha resigned her position as a video education producer at the University of Idaho to accept her new job.

In a letter to her mother, Muriel Hubbard of Juliaetta, Marsha wrote that the South Pacific Island is, indeed, a remote area of the world. It takes 7 to 10 days for newspapers to arrive from the United States and Australia and there is, as yet, no television or radio on the islands.

Although it rained the first few days of her arrival, Marsha wrote that the weather is warm, the same night and day. She said the people are friendly. Its a different world there she said, more than she had imagined, even if the natives do speak English.

Eating out, Marsha wrote her mother, you pay \$2.50 to \$3.50 for a huge plate of food which is very tasty. Bus rides cost 25c and a movie is \$1.20. A fresh loaf of bread is 80c and bananas are 3 for 10c. But, she added, lettuce costs \$5.50 a head.

Marsha said she finds her new environment continuously fascinating and appreciates the unique opportunity to experience the world from a new perspective—"that's what I came for," she wrote.
