Tigers Zap Troy 52-6

A week's lay-off didn't seem to dull the attack of the Kendrick Tiger football team as the unbeaten Tigers raced to a 52-6 victory over the Troy Trojans last Friday night on the KHS field. As of this week the Kendrick team has rolled up a total of 174 points in four games and has given up just 20 points.

Sophomore running back Corey Meyer didn't waste any time getting his team into the scoring column in the Troy game, Corey returned the opening kick-off 72 yards for a touchdown. The Tigers converted the touchdown and were ahead 8-0 with only 12 seconds gone in the first quarter.

Local fans settled back expecting another short game, but the Troy team had other ideas. After almost breaking a man clear on the return kick, the Trojan controlled the ball for the next five minutes, slowly working their way down the field to the Tiger 3 yard line and scored over the middle with 4:28 left in the first.

Kendrick recovered from the Troy touchdown and put its attack in full gear. In one series of plays Kendrick drove down to the Trojan 20 yard line, and Cade Koen banged down to the 3 and on the next play Jarrod Silflow crossed over to score with less than 3 minutes of the second quarter gone. A Ryan Blewett pass to Shawn Tanata brought the Tigers from their own 35 to the Trojan 31, put the Tigers in scoring position again after Blewett kept the ball instead of passing and packed it down to the 6 where Silflow scored to make it 22-6. Jason Witt tipped the scored to 24-6 when he ran over the conversion.

The Tiger machine just kept on rolling in the second half even as coach Ken Swanger began using his bench strength freely. Jarrod Silflow went 70 yards for a touchdown and Koen made it 32-0 with the extra points.

Blewett and sophomore Chad Heimgartner teamed up for the next Tiger score on a 70 yard pass play, with Heimgartner catching the ball on the Trojan 35 and racing in to make it 40-6 after another successful conversion.

Koen put the Tigers up 46-6 as he caught a Blewett pass on the 11 and took it in to score. The extra point try failed.

With 3:15 left in the final quarter, Troy fumbled on their own 11 yard line but the Tigers couldn't capitalize on the break.

Not long after that Chad Heimgartner intercepted a Troy pass with 1:12 left in the game and on the next play Blewett flipped a pass to Koen who scored to make it 52-6. That put the Tigers ahead by more 45 points and ended the game.

The Tigers are still at home this Friday night to host the Highland Huskies, a team they beat 52-6 in the opening game of the season.

Berdetta Louise Johnson, 73, a long-time resident of the Gold Hill area, died of pancreatic and liver cancer Friday, Sept. 27, at her home in Lewiston.

She was born Aug. 24, 1918, at Akron, Ohio, to Jessie James and Lillian Brickley Rainey. Due to the death of her mother, she was sent to live with Anna and Ray Weaver. They later moved to Proctor, Mont., where she attended school.

On July 3, 1937, she married Sanford (Sam) Elmer Weaver at Kallispell, Mont. He died April 15, 1981.

They moved to the Gold Hill area near Southwick. She was the correspondent for Cedar Ridge area for the Kendrick Gazette for many years.

She moved to Lewiston in 1981. She married Laverne Johnson on March 12, 1983. He survives at their Lewiston home.

She was a member of the United Brethren Church of Gold Hill, WMA Club at Southwick, Valley Christian Center at Lewiston and participated in the Singing Christmas Tree for 10 years. She also enjoyed entertaining the elderly at the Orchards Nursing Home.

Berdetta enjoyed flowers, gardening, crocheting, knitting, and quilting.

Survivors in addition to her husband include a son, Elmer Weaver of Lewiston; three daughters, Ellen Kiele of Kamiah, Penny Saarela of Lewiston and Cheryl Livengood of Lewiston; two brothers, Horce Rainey of Portland, Oregon and Douglas Rainey of Akron, Ohio; a stepbrother Ira Weaver of Kallispell; nine grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.

Ervin Lohman, 79, Retired Cameron Farmer Passes

The funeral for retired Cameron area farmer Ervin J. Lohman was held Monday morning, Sept. 30, 1991 at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston. The Rev. Robert Kenyon of Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church officiated, recalling many fun-filled memories. Ervin's children remembered when they were young; for instance, the time they tried teaching their Dad to ride a bicycle coming down the hill by the house, saying, "peddle faster, Dad, it'll help you balance!" Ervin ended up amidst the harrows he had left by the garage. That ended the bicycle riding. Also recalling one 4th of July when Ervin blew a hole in the watering trough with a fire cracker, not realizing what the outcome would be, was totally surprised.

Ervin died of complications following surgery Wednesday at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center at Lewiston.

Ervin and his wife farmed near Cameron, retiring in 1976, but always kept abreast of the farming operation, driving truck to take either peas or lentils to the warehouse at Southwick or getting parts from town or going for seed grain.

He was born on January 4, 1912, in Cameron to Carl and Hattie Old-gard Lohman, pioneer of the Cameron area. He attended Grinold School in Cameron.

He married Margot (Connie) Conrath on September 29, 1934, in Kendrick.

Ervin was a member of the Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church. He enjoyed hunting, fishing, talking old times and being with his family.

Survivors include his wife at the family home in Cameron; two sons, Gary Lohman of Lewiston and Ronald Lohman of Cameron; a daughter, Sharon Parks of Blackfoot; a brother, Elmer Lohman of La Grande, Ore.; a sister Edna Thorklason of Seattle, Wash.; four granddaughters, Teri Parks of St. Helens, Ore., Jeri Parks of Mexico City, Mexico, Wendy Lohman and Vicki Hankens, both of Spokane, and one great-granddaughter, Kendra Hankens, also of Spokane; 4 step-grandchildren and 5 step-great-grandchildren.

A sister, Viola Lohman, and a brother, Leo Lohman, died previously.

Burial was at Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens at Lewiston.

The discussion was lively, but orderly, as all of these issues were close to the heart of each delegate, proving that the seniors are determined and eager to create a challenge for better senior living for all.

One of the key words throughout the conference was "volunteerism". It appears that everyone agrees this is the happier way to achieve a goal, especially during a recession.

Transportation was another issue that was well discussed. Coming from a community with no transportation, it was most interesting to Mrs. White. It is hoped some of the situations in other parts of the state can and will be applied in this area. As transportation is needed to bring seniors, along with the handicapped, to the center, doctor's office and for shopping, this issue is vital.

The other issues blended in with volunteerism beautifully, as housing, affordable home care, transportation and home-based care are definitely needed for a good senior life.
