Letters to the Editor . . .

Editor: On Child Abuse: Much publicity has been given to my community and to how the local newspapers are handling the child abuse cases in Juliaetta.

Many local townspeople worry about our city's poor reputation because of this "adverse" publicity. But look, child abusers are getting caught in Juliaetta, Idaho. Is that really so very bad? I think not.

Even though I can console myself about living here, don't particularly like reading explicitly graphic descriptions about child molestation—especially when it concerns my neighbor down the road. To tell the truth, it disgusts me.

It's sickening, sickening, sickening. And the more I think about it, the sicker I become, fearful that perhaps we have just begun to see, let alone touch, "the tip of the iceberg."

So how do we react to all this "trashy" news? Writing scathing letters to the editor and cancelling subscriptions seem to be the trend.

Now how does a letter or a subscription cancellation remedy the problem? Does lashing out on the people who describe child abuse to us solve it? Maybe not, but it makes us feel better.

Get real, people. Quit pointing fingers at reporters and editors. We act as if they are the nasty child molesters. When, ironically enough, they are the ones who are not only doing their job, but are being responsible!

Although many feel their "trash" sold more papers, money was not the true issue. Shocking me into seeing child abuse in "my own backyard" appeared much more important to them than keeping any cash flow alive.

If we can't tolerate reading about child abuse, why then do we tolerate living with it? If we don't want to read about disgusting, sexual acts targeted at our children, then why do we keep letting this unacceptable behavior perpetuate itself generation after generation, day after day?

Hiding from the issue, along with ignorance, is unethically careless, irresponsible, and dangerous. That fact has already been proven—right here in Juliaetta. Instead we are finding that in child molestation cases, awareness, knowledge, and involvement are crucial elements to improve the quality of our children's future.

So let's go beyond this initial shock of learning that child abuse does exist in our neighborhoods, let's accept that reality, and most importantly, let's change it. We must let our children know and see that if people like Fleury, Cluff, and King exist in their lives, all of us, not just the newspapers, will nail these abusers, that we will not tolerate their perverted hang-ups, that we will expose them, that we

will catch them, and that we will make them accountable for their actions at a very high price—like their lives instead of that of the children.
