Tigers Face Clark Fork In Saturday Play Offs

Coach Ken Swanger and his KHS Tiger football team actually scored two victories this past week. Thursday night the Tigers were up at Troy and romped to an easy 50-14 win over the Trojans to clinch a tie in the Whitepine eight-man league and finish the season with an 8-1 record. Monday the Tigers engaged in a coin-flip with the Deary Mustangs to see who would go into the playoffs as No. 1 and No. 2 team. Kendrick won the toss of the coin and chose to go into the Saturday games as the No. 2 team. This decision will match them against the No. 1 team from the North Star League the Clark Fork Wampus Cats in a 4 p. m. contest.

Deary will face the Garden Valley Wolverines, two-time defending state state champions. That game begins at the Kibbie Dome in Moscow at 1:30 p. m.

Trojans Blitzed 50-14

If the last two games of the regular season are any forecast of things to come, the Clark Fork Cats are going to see alot of aerial action when they meet the Tigers Saturday afternoon. Last Thursday night the Troy Trojans were forced to endure an air blitz from Tiger quarterback Ryan Blewett who threw for six touchdowns as the Tigers romped to a 50-14 win.

Cade Konen ran for a 26-yard touchdown ramble to open the scoring Thursday night. Then Cade was on the receiving end of Blewett's first touchdown pass covering 51 yards. Both conversion attempts failed.

In the second quarter Blewett was still winging away, connecting with Konen for a 23 yard touchdown, a 40 yard pass to Jarrod Silflow (Ryan passed to Bob Wegner for the extra points), and found Konen again for another touchdown pass play covering 59 yards. Seth Thomas of the Trojans got Troy on the scoreboard in the second period with a four yard run and ran his own conversion.

Jason Witt marked up the only Tiger score in the third quarter with a 14-yard run, which the Tigers did not convert. Troy's Thomas scored on a 2 yard run and then in the final quarter Blewett threw a 10 yard pass to Konen and a 5-yard pass to Wegner to make the final score 50-14.

Education for The Handicapped

Kendrick School District No. 283 is committed to the early identification and intervention of Special Needs Children. In order to assure that we meet this commitment and that all handicapped children are afforded a Free Appropriate Public Education we need the help of the community in our "Child Find Activities."

What is Child Find?

Child Find is a service of the Idaho State Department of Education and your local school district.

The purpose of Child Find is to identify children who may have individual needs that result from disabilities (handicaps) or development delays.

Child Find helps determine if a child has a disability and what kind of educational services would best meet his or her needs.

Who is Child Find Looking For?

Child Find is looking for children with disabilities, especially children between 3 and 21 years of age.

Child Find is looking for children who are "not exactly the same" as others their age. These youngsters may have difficulty walking, talking, hearing, or learning. Or they may have behavior problems.

Who Can Call Child Find?

Parents, Grandparents, Doctors, Teachers, Anyone concerned about a youngster who isn't exactly the same as others the same age.

How Can Child Find Help?

Many of the youngsters who are referred to Child Find may be entitled to special education and related services. And, the younger the child, the more effective those services will be.

Children who are referred to Child Find will receive free testing to determine if the differences you notice require services or if they are "nothing to worry about."

If the child has a disability and is eligible for special education or related services, the public schools will work with the child's parents to design a program just for that child.

Children with milder delays or disabilities might not be eligible for services. But the school may suggest ways that parents could enhance their child's development or they may schedule the child for a re-screening/reassessment at a later date.

Other children may have no disabilities or delays and their parents will be reassured there is "nothing to worry about."

But the only way to tell is to contact your school district or the State Department of Education.

How Can I Tell If a Child Should be Referred?

Gem Community Certification Given Juliaetta-Kendrick

Congratulating the community of Kendrick - Juliaetta for "extraordinary accomplishments worthy of Gem Community Certification," James V. Hawkins, Director of the Idaho Department of Commerce, last week informed local coordinator Frank Jacobson that together, "we have reached another landmark in what will be a long-standing partnership between the State of Idaho and your community."

The one year certification, commencing November 1, follows two years of thorough study and planning done by representatives of the community and members of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association, as assisted by Dr. Mary Emery of LCSC, a community development specialist. The final step in the certification process, the mock-site visit, took place here just two weeks ago.

Thanks to the thorough work done by the River Crossing, Inc. group and the support of representatives of the local Development Association and Golden Sunset Senior Citizens, there was never any question at the last that Kendrick-Juliaetta would be certified as a Gem Community.

Now that it's happened, so what? What does all this mean for our community? First of all, no less than two and up to four Gem Community Highway signs will be posted at major entries to the community where state highways enter Gem Community. Certificates will be issued for the year of certification, and a press conference will be held by the Idaho Dept. of Commerce to announce the community's certification and achievements.

In addition, each Certified Gem Community will be offered advanced training sessions and will receive 50 copies of their Idaho Dept. of Commerce Community Profile.

And, finally, our community will be eligible to apply for one \$10,000 Gem Community Action Grant (pending availability of funds), and will qualify for bonus points when applying for public facility housing, or economic development grants under the Idaho Community Block Grant Program.

And now, says Gem Community coordinator Frank Jacobson, it's time to get the Development Associations committees to work implementing first year goals, refining the long-term plan and identifying additional needs in the community. Jacobson plans to have the three committees meet together for an orientation session before each goes off on its own to pursue its assignments, whether in infrastructure, business retention/expansion, or economic diversification. Jacobson plans to involve Kendrick Grange in the effort as part of a year-long community project.

Above all, certification for Jacobson is proof that when people put aside the past, its hurts and its prejudices, and work together systematically, they can encourage the development of new leadership in the community and achieve their goals. And this is what community development is finally all about.

Editor: Congratulations to Carolyn Gravelle on her letter concerning child abuse reporting. I agree fully!

The 911 system is in operation. We are told to use the old system for everything except police. This is good advice because 911 is a third-party and subject to errors. Response time will be delayed by the time it takes the dispatcher to collect the information and relay it. This delay could cost someone their life! Example: when breathing or heart stops, or both, irreversible brain damage begins in four minutes, death is certain in ten minutes. (This does not apply to the condition of deep hypothermia or cold water drowning).

CPR started in 0 to 4 minutes and if an ambulance arrives in 0 to 8 minutes, the survival rate is 43 percent. CPR started in 0 to 4 minutes with an ambulance arrival of 16-plus minutes survival rate is 10 percent with a drop of 5 percent for every minute's delay. Start First Aid immediately! Call Direct!

These survival percentages vary greatly depending on cause of stoppage. Because of geographic locations, I would suggest everyone know the location of the emergency unit nearest them and average response time. Example: The Deary Ambulance can get to my place in half the time the Juliaetta/Kendrick ambulance can. This is true of several other residents on the far end of the Kendrick address system on Big Bear Ridge, the general boundary of the J/K Emergency Service.

Annual Notification: Inspection and Review Of Student Records

Certain rights pertaining to the inspection and review of student's records and challenging the content of such records are afforded to parents of children under 18 years of age, students 18 years of age or older and married students attending Public School District No. 283. The District has established procedures allowing the above individuals access to school records.

Joint District No. 283 has established and maintains records in the following areas: Academic, Attendance, Testing, and Health. These records are housed in the following locations: The central files, special education classrooms, and ancillary personal offices. Individual student files reference the location of any additional records pertaining student. All record are stored in secure facilities.

All student records are maintained indefinitely. Special Education records, except for permanent attendance and enrollment information which the district is entitled to maintain indefinitely, are destroyed when the information is no longer needed to provide educational services. Parents of Special Education students and eligible students will be notified when student records are to be destroyed so they may obtain copies of desired records.

Personally identifiable school records and files of students will be released to only certain school and other educational agency officials unless written consent to further release is obtained. Furnishing, in any form, any personally identifiable information contained in personal school records to any persons, other than the above, will be permitted only by written consent, specifying the record(s) to be released, the reason therefore, to whom the copies are provided, or permitted when required by judicial order or lawful subpoena.

Any person, agency, or organization legally entitled to student records and desiring access to such records must sign a written form to be kept in the student's file for inspection by the parent or eligible student. Copies of student records are available at the school of attendance at a cost of 50 cents per page (unless the cost effectively prohibits parent or eligible student from obtaining a copy of the record). Joint District No. 283 is required by Federal and State regulations to make student records available to parents or eligible students who request to see them within 45 days of date of request.

State and Federal regulations afford parents and eligible students certain rights pertaining to student educational records. Parents and eligible students may inspect and review all educational records with respect to the identification, evaluation, and educational placement of the child, and provision of a free and appropriate public education.
