KHS Annual Staff Salutes Lewiston Grain Growers

Our Kendrick Branch of Lewiston Grain Growers has been serving this community and the Clearwater Valley area for over 50 years. The LGG buildings first started out as a flour mill, which was owned by Clearwater Volmer. After the mill burned down, it was bought out by Lewiston Grain Growers.

Tom Jeffries is the regional manager of the Clearwater Valley, which covers about 3600 square miles from Weippe to Anatone. Other staff includes Unis Heimgartner, who is the secretary; and Ken Konek, Darel Hazeltime, and Jeff Holsington, who are the warehousemen. The warehousemen take in grain and help handle the seed and feed products.

Lewiston Grain Growers carries a full line of "Land of Lakes" prepared feed. Both high energy and regular feed is available for dogs, horses, swine, cattle, sheep, goats and poultry, and regular feed is available for cats. Because both "Land of Lakes" agricultural, and Cenex petroleum products are owned by a farmer co-operative, the prices are much lower than name-brand products.

Fall and spring wheat and barley seed is also sold. The seed is grouped into five classes: breeder's stock, foundation, registered, certified, and common. Breeder's stock is brand new and spends its first year in a test plot. The next year it is classified as foundation, then as registered. The registered seed is sold as certified seed the next year, and is the type that is planted most. The next year's common wheat can't be sold for seed. It is usually shipped out and sold for flour.

The Kendrick elevators hold approximately 6,000 tons of barley and 350,000 bushels of wheat. The malt barley is ordered by plumb and then is most often sold for beer and cereal. Another interesting fact about grain is that it has to be rolled from bin to bin every sixty days or it will burn—spontaneous combustion is a safety concern in elevators. There is also a law that states how much dust you can have on the wheat. These laws are EPA and FDA regulations.

Lewiston Grain Growers, really, is an interesting place to visit and they also carry a lot of items that are useful around the house. It just goes to show you that you don't need to be a farmer to appreciate and be interested in Lewiston Grain Growers.

Lewiston Grain Growers in Kendrick has always been a wonderful supporter of Kendrick High School and the Kendrick-Juliaetta community. The KHS annual staff proudly salutes LGG as friends and good neighbors.

Gov. Andrus Announces Eldercare Volunteer Corps Grant

Governor Cecil D. Andrus this week announced that Idaho will receive an Eldercare Volunteer Corps grant in the amount of \$30,000.

"We are pleased to receive this funding to increase our volunteer efforts because volunteers have been the lifeblood of Idaho's aging network," Governor Andrus said. "They have contributed thousands of hours of service as aides in nutrition programs and as bus drivers, ombudsmen, outreach workers, foster grandparents, health insurance advisors, respite care providers and the list goes on."

Idaho's \$30,000 Eldercare Volunteer project, administered by the Idaho Office on Aging, will have a statewide focus and will comprise three components:

- Public awareness building and education will be emphasized through a statewide media campaign and presentations before civic organizations, religious groups, governmental agencies and businesses.
- The Idaho Office on Aging will develop a training kit emphasizing effective use and management of volunteers. Interested persons will be identified in various parts of the state to receive training in recruiting, training, and placing volunteers; they, in turn, will provide that training through local workshops for organizations interested in using volunteers to provide community-based services to older Idahoans.
- A data base will be developed and maintained. It will include information on the current level of volunteer involvement in serving the elderly, best practices techniques, current state of knowledge and documented need for additional volunteers.

Kendrick put two touchdowns on the scoreboard in the opening quarter before the Cats scored.

Running back Cade Konek culminated a Tiger drive by taking the ball in for a TD on a five yard run for the first Tiger score. Later in the same period quarterback Ryan Blewett passed to wide receiver Shawn Tanata for another touchdown after a 47-yard play.

Marvin Speelmon, the Clark Fork quarterback who gave the Tigers trouble all afternoon, score on a 12-yard run in the first quarter that ended with the Tigers ahead 14-6.

Kendrick shut down the Clark Fork offense in the second quarter and Blewett scored for the Tigers from one-yard out to give Kendrick a 20-6 halftime lead.

In the third quarter Blewett, in a change of pace, took a 19-yard pass from Shawn Tanata to make the score 26-6 and it looked like the Tigers were going to nail down a substantial lead. But Clark Fork was not finished and later in the quarter scored on a pass play, covering 49 yards and then kicked the point after touchdown and were back into contention 26-13 at the end of the third period of play.

Blewett passed to Bob Wegner in a play covering 81 yards and Cade Konek ran over the conversion to give what seemed to be another comfortable lead to the Tigers 32-13. Clark Fork answered that touchdown with a 63-yard bomb from Speelmon to Travis Hewett and the Cats closed back up to 32-19.

Then, Cade Konek took the return Clark Fork kick off and brought the crowd to its feet with a 91-yard return to make the score 40-19 and send his team into the semi-finals of the State playoffs.

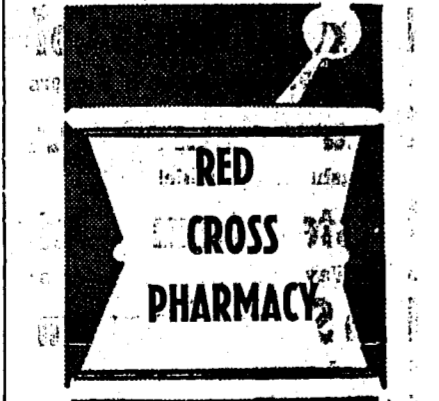
