Ernest Steigers, 89, Passes Nov. 13

Ernest Steigers, a retired farmer and rancher, died Wednesday, Nov. 13, at his Cherrylane home of causes related to age. He was 89.

Ernest and his wife, Nellie, farmed at Cherrylane until the mid-1950s, raising tomatoes, melons and potatoes to truck to market in the surrounding towns. They also raised grain and sold cream and eggs,

After World War 11, Steigers began working on construction crews building grain elevators at Cherrylane, Lenore, Culdesac and Lapwai. He then began a cattle operation with his son Kenneth.

After retirement, Steigers continued to tend more than an acre of garden. He enjoyed playing the fiddle and was a member and past president area. Mrs. Howerton later told the of the Idaho Old Time Fiddlers.

Ernest was born Oct. 8, 1902, to William and Elizabeth Schneider Steigers at Rhineland, Mo. When he was 8, the family moved to Kansas, prairie to farm.

In 1913, the family packed the land near Burley, Idaho. In 1918, they sold that land and joined relatives in Asotin. The next year, they purchased a farm in the Cherrylane area, 21 miles east of Lewiston along the Clearwater River.

Steigers completed grade school at the Stony Point School and attended high school at Juliaetta. He married Nellie Dean October 21, 1925, at Lewiston. She survives at the Cherrylane made in its efforts to build a golf home.






