With no no one else even interested, the board met Monday and declared Parks the new trustee. This saved the Cemetery District the expense of hiring judges, printing ballots, renting a voting place and other incidentals. And, they still have good trustees. It is expected that NezTah Cemetery District will move in the same manner as Darrel Brocke is unopposed in his bid for trustee.






