During their stay, the girls attended the American Royal Rodeo, Ag Hall of Fame Tour, American Royal Craft Fair, the Ag Career Show and the convention.

Featured guest speaker, President George Bush spoke on working for excellence in education and keeping America competitive in the foreign markets. He was awarded the "Outstanding American Award", which was only the third given in the history of the convention. Carolyn Suzanne Sapp, Miss America, also spoke to the group concerning the improvement of education through parent and community involvement.

Besides the formal business transactions of the convention and election of new officers as well as the retiring speeches of the old officers, leadership workshops were given on various topics relating to self esteem and how students could make a difference.

Special awards were given to Guam and the Virgin Islands who received their state charters, Ag Science programs in the school systems, Computers used for Ag management, and the winners in the contests covering Ag Sales, Forestry, Farm Business Management, Nursery and Landscape, Dairy Foods, Livestock Judging, Meats, Ag Mechanics, Floriculture, Poultry, BOAC programs and the Honorary American FFA Degree.

Expanded programs such as agriculture, marketing, computer technology, and international agribusiness are areas which need promoting in our own systems.
