Mrs. Bonish and Marian (Schupfer) Meyer had driven from California to attend the Juliaetta Centennial in early May, but unfortunately, the evening before the event, were in an auto accident and had to spend May 2 in the hospital.)

Centennial Committee:

I wish to thank all of you for all of your hours of labor and effort for that great day, May 2, 1992! I did not get to attend, but I'm searching around for pics and video tape copies. My brother, Keith, took many video pics but the noise was so great in the background, those giving their names could not be heard. One of these days Marian, Keith and I will sit down together and view it. Between the three of us we will identify most of the people. If anyone in your group took any pics or video, I would gladly pay for a copy or copies. In the hallway between the two rooms were two pictures of baseball teams of Juliaetta, and my Dad, George Miller, was in both. If anyone knows how I could get copies I would be so pleased to pay for them. I'm grateful I at least had a peek at the rooms and started to take pics when Marian wanted to get to her folk's home to meet Maribel. Alas, I ended up in the hospital. The five cracked ribs are getting less painful, but the fingers and thumb of the left hand and knuckles remain very swollen. My third cast is so fantastic; all Vclero, so I can remove it and shower as well as soak the wrist (cracked in two places) and hand in very warm water, squeezing a soft ball for therapy. My seven cracked or chipped teeth will be repaired once I can sit in my nephew's contour dentist's chair, in about three weeks! Time will heal all afflictions. How I hated missing that outstanding Centennial. I especially want to thank Margaret Bostick for her notes of information. If it weren't for her, many of us in California would have missed getting history of our family in the Juliaetta History Book (another great feat by three wonderful, hard-working ladies. My, the work there) Plus I would have missed getting the book!

I also wish to thank and recognize Betty and Floyd Helmgartner for their letters and phone calls of information.

Donna Cope also was so gracious to answer phone calls.

Again, thank one and all of the Juliaetta Centennial Committee for an outstanding job.

Clyde Baker, in the Juliaetta History Book, said it ever so beautifully: "There's never going to be a greater town than 'our' Juliaetta, even with its 'cracker box' gymnasium as some used to call it." Fred O. Stedman, Retired Postmaster, Passes June 8

Fred Oral Stedman, a retired Kendrick postmaster and rural mail carrier, died of causes related to age June 8, 1992, at his Lewiston Orchards home. He was 91.

He was postmaster at Kendrick for 17 years, then worked as a letter carrier in the Big Bear and American ridge areas near Kendrick for eight years.

The son of William and Addie Jones Vallad, he was born Jan. 4, 1901, near Yuma, Michigan. After his mother's death, he was adopted by Nelson Hubb and Harriet Stedman, his mother's sister and brother-in-law.

The family moved west in 1902, then returned to Shiloh, Mich., the following year. They remained in Michigan until April of 1910, when they moved to Cosmopolis, Wash.

He attended school at Cosmopolis through the 10th grade and graduated from high school at Aberdeen, Wash., in 1921.

While in school, he worked part time in a cafe. After completing his schooling, he worked in a logging camp as a timekeeper, second cook and fireman and later drove the North River Stage Line outside of Aberdeen.

He came to Lewiston in 1924 to work on construction of the Clearwater Timber mill, now Pottlach Corp. He also worked as a cook at the Court Bar and Little Brick Cafe in downtown Lewiston and later worked for Pottlach Forests Inc.

He married Geneva Queen Stanton on Sept. 4, 1927, at Kendrick. They made their home at Clarkston for a short time before moving to the Stanton Ranch near Kendrick.

In 1929, they moved to Cosmopolis, returning to the ranch outside of Kendrick in 1931, where he farmed. He also worked with the Works Progress Administration to help build the Big Bear Ridge road and worked part time with the Lewiston Grain Growers at Kendrick.

He was appointed U. S. postmaster at Kendrick April 1, 1944, a position he held until 1961, when he became a letter carrier on Big Bear and American Ridges. He retired July 4, 1960.

The couple moved to Lewiston Orchards in 1972 and she died in October of 1983.

He was a member of the National Rural Letter Carrier Association and a charter member of the Kendrick Assembly of God. He was also a member of the Victory Tabernacle at Clarkston.

Survivors include a daughter, Barbara Joy Comyn of Seattle; a son, Samuel N. Stedman of Lewiston; two brothers, Ray Vallad of Detroit, Mich., and William Vallad of Hartford City, Ind.; 10 grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren.

A memorial service was conducted Saturday, June 20 at Victory Tabernacle with the Rev. Hubert Deweber of Everett, Wash. officiating.

The family suggests memorials be sent to the Victory Tabernacle for literature for China.

ORDINANCE NO. 257

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, PROVIDING FOR FEES PERTAINING TO CONNECTION WITH CITY'S WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM AND FOR PAYMENT FROM USERS WHO INCREASE DEMAND ON EITHER SYSTEM; PROVIDING THAT CONNECTION FEES BE HELD IN A DEDICATED FUND FOR REPLACEMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS TO THE CITY'S WATER AND SEWER FACILITIES; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF INCONSISTENT PROVISIONS; PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT UPON ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION ACCORDING TO LAW.

WHEREAS THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL HAVE DEEMED IT IN THE PUBLIC INTEREST TO AMEND ITS APPLICABLE SEWER AND WATER CONNECTION FEES; NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: EQUIVALENT RESI-

DENCE: For purposes of this Ordinance, particularly for commercial and industrial connections to the City's utilities, the term "equivalent residence" (ER) shall be defined as the sewage flow or water use from one average single-family residence. This flow has been estimated for purposes of charging connection fees connection fees at 8,000 gallons per month.

SECTION 2: DETERMINATION OF WATER CONNECTION FEE: A sewer connection fee in the amount of \$1,350 is hereby established as a minimum fee for any user connecting to the City's water system. This fee shall be charged to each single-family residence connecting to the system. For commercial and industrial uses which connect to the system, a fee based on the number of ERs will be evaluated by the City's engineer or an economist and a fee of \$1,350 per ER will be charged.

SECTION 3: DETERMINATION OF SEWER CONNECTION FEE: A sewer connection fee in the amount of \$1,250 is hereby established as a minimum fee for any user connecting to the City's sewer system. This fee shall be charged to each single-family residence connecting to the system. For commercial and industrial uses which connect to the system, a fee based on the number of ERs will be evaluated by the City's engineer or an economist and a fee of \$1,250 per ER will be charged.

SECTION 4: DEDICATED FUND: The foregoing funds shall be maintained in a dedicated water and sewer fund. Purchases from this dedicated fund will be limited to replacement and capital improvements for the City's water system and sewerage system, including the sewage treatment plant.

SECTION 5: EXISTING SERVICES: Existing users connected to a City utility service will not be required to pay any connection fee for that service; however, commercial or industrial users who increase their demand on such services shall be required to pay a fee equal to the increase in ERs times the foregoing fee per ER.

SECTION 6: INCONSISTENT PROVISIONS REPEALED: That any provision of any Ordinance of the City in conflict with a provision of this Ordinance is hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

SECTION 7: EFFECTIVE DATE: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.

DEFINITIONS; PROVIDING FOR THIS ORDINANCE TO BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT UPON ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION ACCORDING TO LAW. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: That Ordinance No. 255 be, and the same hereby is, repealed in its entirety.

SECTION 2: DEFINITIONS. The following words and phrases used in this Ordinance shall be given the following interpretations. All other words and phrases used in this Ordinance, the definition of which is not given, shall be given an ordinary and commonly understood and accepted meaning.

(a) **100 YEAR FLOODPLAIN:** The term 100 year floodplain shall be defined as all land in the service area described on the floodplain map of the City designated as the 100 year floodplain; said map is attached as Exhibit 1 and incorporated herein.

(b) **FLOODWAY:** The channel of the river or other water course and the adjacent land areas which must be reserved in order to discharge the base flood without cumulatively increasing the water surface more than one foot. This area is designated on Exhibit 1.

(c) **WATER SERVICE:** Water service shall mean any person, entity, or property which receives water from the Juliaetta Municipal Water System.

SECTION 3: FLOODPLAIN PROHIBITION: The following prohibition shall apply within the flood prone areas:

Water service shall not be extended to any person, entity or structure lying within the 100 yr. floodplain as described in Exhibit 1; except for irrigation of the City Parks, drinking water delivered by free standing fountains in the City Parks, and water to any open-air pavilion (a roof and necessary supports creating a structure which is open on all sides and does not provide bathroom facilities in City Parks.

This prohibition applies to any structure for which construction is initiated or substantially altered after the date of passage of this Ordinance.

SECTION 4: REPEAL OF INCONSISTENT PROVISIONS: Any provision of any Ordinance inconsistent with a provision of this Ordinance is hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

SECTION 5: PUBLICATION: This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force upon its passage, approval and publication in the official newspaper of the City of Juliaetta.

THIS ORDINANCE PASSED under suspension of the rules and duly enacted as an Ordinance of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, at a regular meet of the Council on the 9th day of June, 1992.

ORDINANCE NO. 257

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, PROVIDING FOR FEES PERTAINING TO CONNECTION WITH CITY'S WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM AND FOR PAYMENT FROM USERS WHO INCREASE DEMAND ON EITHER SYSTEM; PROVIDING THAT CONNECTION FEES BE HELD IN A DEDICATED FUND FOR REPLACEMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS TO THE CITY'S WATER AND SEWER FACILITIES; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF INCONSISTENT PROVISIONS; PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT UPON ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION ACCORDING TO LAW.

WHEREAS THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL HAVE DEEMED IT IN THE PUBLIC INTEREST TO AMEND ITS APPLICABLE SEWER AND WATER CONNECTION FEES; NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: EQUIVALENT RESI-

DENCE: For purposes of this Ordinance, particularly for commercial and industrial connections to the City's utilities, the term "equivalent residence" (ER) shall be defined as the sewage flow or water use from one average single-family residence. This flow has been estimated for purposes of charging connection fees at 8,000 gallons per month.

SECTION 2: DETERMINATION OF WATER CONNECTION FEE: A sewer connection fee in the amount of \$1,350 is hereby established as a minimum fee for any user connecting to the City's water system. This fee shall be charged to each single-family residence connecting to the system. For commercial and industrial uses which connect to the system, a fee based on the number of ERs will be evaluated by the City's engineer or an economist and a fee of \$1,350 per ER will be charged.

SECTION 3: DETERMINATION OF SEWER CONNECTION FEE: A sewer connection fee in the amount of \$1,250 is hereby established as a minimum fee for any user connecting to the City's sewer system. This fee shall be charged to each single-family residence connecting to the system. For commercial and industrial uses which connect to the system, a fee based on the number of ERs will be evaluated by the City's engineer or an economist and a fee of \$1,250 per ER will be charged.

SECTION 4: DEDICATED FUND: The foregoing funds shall be maintained in a dedicated water and sewer fund. Purchases from this dedicated fund will be limited to replacement and capital improvements for the City's water system and sewerage system, including the sewage treatment plant.

SECTION 5: EXISTING SERVICES: Existing users connected to a City utility service will not be required to pay any connection fee for that service; however, commercial or industrial users who increase their demand on such services shall be required to pay a fee equal to the increase in ERs times the foregoing fee per ER.

SECTION 6: INCONSISTENT PROVISIONS REPEALED: That any provision of any Ordinance of the City in conflict with a provision of this Ordinance is hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

SECTION 7: EFFECTIVE DATE: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.

PASSED by the City Council and APPROVED by the Mayor this 9th day of June, 1992.

DEFINITIONS; PROVIDING FOR THIS ORDINANCE TO BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT UPON ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION ACCORDING TO LAW.

SECTION 1: That Ordinance No. 255 be, and the same hereby is, repealed in its entirety.

SECTION 2: DEFINITIONS. The following words and phrases used in this Ordinance shall be given the following interpretations. All other words and phrases used in this Ordinance, the definition of which is not given, shall be given an ordinary and commonly understood and accepted meaning.

(a) 100 YEAR FLOODPLAIN: The term 100 year floodplain shall be defined as all land in the service area described on the floodplain map of the City designated as the 100 year floodplain; said map is attached as Exhibit 1 and incorporated herein.

(b) FLOODWAY: The channel of the river or other water course and the adjacent land areas which must be reserved in order to discharge the base flood without cumulatively increasing the water surface more than one foot. This area is designated on Exhibit 1.

(c) WATER SERVICE: Water service shall mean any person, entity, or property which receives water from the Juliaetta Municipal Water System.

SECTION 3: FLOODPLAIN PROHIBITION: The following prohibition shall apply within the flood prone areas:
Water service shall not be extended to any person, entity or structure lying within the 100 yr. floodplain as described in Exhibit 1; except for irrigation of the City Parks, drinking water delivered by free standing fountains in the City Parks, and water to any open-air pavilion (a roof and necessary supports creating a structure which is open on all sides and does not provide bathroom facilities in City Parks. This prohibition applies to any structure for which construction is initiated or substantially altered after the date of passage of this Ordinance.

SECTION 4: REPEAL OF INCONSISTENT PROVISIONS: Any provision of any Ordinance inconsistent with a provision of this Ordinance is hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

SECTION 5: PUBLICATION: This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force upon its passage, approval and publication in the official newspaper of the City of Juliaetta.

THIS ORDINANCE PASSED under suspension of the rules and duly enacted as an Ordinance of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, at a regular meet of the Council on the 9th day of June, 1992.
