K-J Development Association Discussed Organizational Plans at Thursday Meeting

Members of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association who met at the Kendrick Fire Hall for a noon luncheon session Thursday, Jan. 9, heard an update on some of the re-organizational plans that are being made within the group.

Newly-elected Association president Wally Butler offered both his and the Association's gratitude to outgoing president Geo. F. Brocke, Jr. for all of his work in guiding the group these past two years, especially through the time-consuming project of the 1991 Kendrick Centennial.

Secretary Leasel Abrams read the minutes of the previous meeting and new treasurer Greg Mann of the accounting firm of Hayden, Ross and Company gave a brief report on the status of the finances.

Reporting on the Board of Directors of the Association, Butler told the members that "delegate" will be

the key word this year, as he will be involved in the work of River Crossing, Inc., the group working to develop a golf course on Cedar Creek east of Kendrick. Butler said River Crossing, Inc. has made a down payment on the land involved and continues to feel optimistic about its future.

Frank Jacobson, coordinator of the Gem Community Program, spoke to the members on the progress of forming the committees that will function importantly in making the goals of the Gem Program a reality. Lora Howerton, who had been tapped to serve as chairman of the Economic Diversification Committee was present to say she would be unable to accept the chairmanship because of previous commitments and involvements, but that she would serve to convene the first meeting of that committee.

Jacobson told the association that Lynne Bruce will serve as chairman of the Infrastructure Committee and Donna Heinen will be chairman of the Business Retention and Expansion Committee. "We'll wait until the first meeting of each of these groups to determine how the development and function will work," Jacobson said.

It was also reported that Greg Mann is coordinating a meeting of the Vandal Boosters Club in Kendrick on Thursday, April 23, at the V. F. W. Hall. This will bring some U. of I. coaches and others down from Moscow for a dinner meeting and give local residents a chance to get a first-hand up-date on University of Idaho athletics. Leasel Abrams will be working with the VFW Post and Auxiliary in arrangements.

A Calendar of Events will be developed for the association to help publicize events the group is interested and involved in. Zana Sherman, owner of First Bank of Pizza in Juliaetta and a new member of the Board of Directors will help with this project, as will Barbara Clayton.

As mentioned previously, president Butler reported that River Crossing, Inc. picked up its option to purchase land for the proposed golf course on December 23 and there is now a sign placed on the land advertising the project.

The association went on record as officially thanking and commending Jim Hoogland for all the work he has done since the organization of the association in keeping its financial records straight and in good order. Jim has handled the medallion sales, the Centennial project and several other projects, mainly in an almost unofficial capacity and certainly with no pay. At a recent meeting of the Board of Directors it was decided to recreate a position as treasurer. This was done and Greg Mann accepted the position. The association truly appreciates the many hours Mr. Hoogland has given to the group, and he will be receiving a letter telling him this soon.

In one final matter, secretary Abrams reminded the association that dues are due for the coming year. It was also emphasized that it is not necessary to be a business person to join the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association. All that is required is a desire to help the community and preserve and maintain the quality of life all find so vital to this area. The dues are just \$10 a year.

Tigers Win 51-37

In the boys game Saturday night, the Tigers had to put down a Nezperce rally in the third quarter before going on to a 51-37 Whitepine League win.

After Adam Sneve dropped in the first points of the game with 7:16 left in the opening quarter, Kendrick appeared to have the game well under control and were leading 23-16 at the half.

But the visiting Indians had other ideas in the opening minutes of the third quarter, capitalizing on a Tiger cold streak, as they tied the score 23-23 with 5:18 left in the period. Many of the Tigers shots just rolled around the hoop and dropped off.

Tiger coach Clarke Bradley had his team call a time out when Nezperce tied the score and after that break, Cade Konen dumped a field goal for the KHS team from in under the basket and made a free throw to give Kendrick a 26-23 lead and the Tigers never trailed after that. Mike Morgan's field goal made it 30-23 and then Jarrod Silflow's tip-in put the Tigers ahead 30-27 with 2:20 left in the third quarter. Kendrick had moved out to a 34-25 lead at the end of the third.

The Tigers outscored Nezperce 17-12 in the final period with Morgan doing some excellent work or the Kendrick team, both offensively and defensively for the 51-37 win.

Grant L. Clemenhagen, Former Big Bear Ridge Resident, Passes Jan. 11

Grant L. Clemenhagen, 90, a Big Bear Ridge resident for 85 years, and a retired farmer died Saturday morning at his home in Kendrick of cancer.

Grant was born October 8, 1901, at Fort Ransom, North Dakota, to Henry and Adrienne (Moser) Clemenhagen. The family moved west in 1903, settling in the Colton, Wash., area.

In 1906, they moved onto Big Bear Ridge near Kendrick, where he lived until moving to Kendrick this past year.

He attended country school on the ridge and later farmed and worked part time as a logger.

He married Hulda Olson on Oct. 11, 1928, at Moscow.

Grant was a friendly man, well-liked and respected by all who knew him. He was always willing to help with projects on the ridge and he enjoyed going on drives, picnics and picking huckleberries.

Survivors include his wife at the couple's home in Kendrick; a daughter, Doris Israel of Euphrata, Wash.; two sons, Buddy Clemenhagen of Milwaukee, Ore., and Monte Clemenhagen of Vancouver, Wash.; three brothers, Roy and Fred of Juliaetta and Sidney of Tacoma; seven grandchildren, five great-grandchildren, and one great-great grandchild.

Cremation has taken place and a memorial service was held Wednesday at the Big Bear Ridge Community Hall. Grant had helped cut logs for the hall and also helped in its construction.

The Rev. Bob Kenyon of the Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church officiated at the memorial service and a covered dish dinner followed the service.

The family suggests memorials be given to the Kendrick-Juliaetta Ambulance Fund or the Big Bear Ridge Community Hall.

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City Council Stunned by Department Action—

State Terminates Juliaetta's Grant For Water Project

In a letter that could only be described as "stunning", the Idaho Department of Commerce has notified the City of Juliaetta that city's previously-approved water project grant has been terminated. It was less than a year ago, in February of 1991, that the State approved a grant of \$400,000 to the city after Juliaetta's citizens approved a \$250,000 water revenue bond for its share of a \$650,000 project that would draw water from the Potlatch River, treat the water, and make it available to the city to end a chronic water shortage problem.

Councilman Dirk Hammond told the Gazette Tuesday evening that the city has already requested reconsideration of this (the state's) action.

The Juliaetta City Council will hold a town meeting on Thursday, January 23, at 7:00 p. m. at the Juliaetta Elementary School gymnasium. The council encourages all residents to attend this meeting.

Hammond said the state did give reasons for its action and these reasons will be disclosed at the public meeting on the 23rd. In addition to telling the public what the reasons were for the state's surprise move, the council will also discuss what the city's residents may do to help appeal this action by the Dept. of Commerce.

The City of Juliaetta has already sent an initial response to the state informing the Dept. of Commerce that they believe there are substantial reasons why the Dept. of Commerce should reconsider its action.

This is the latest and possibly the most devastating set-back Juliaetta has received in its long, frustrating battle to provide an adequate water supply for its citizens.

Grange Schedules Gritman Administrator For Public Meeting

Kendrick Grange will open its February 21 meeting to the general public for a presentation by Gritman Hospital administrator Bob Colvin. As a part of the Grange's effort to assist in community development this year, the program will provide an update on the important part this Moscow medical facility plays in the infrastructure of Kendrick-Juliaetta.

Colvin will not only review the hospital's plans for improved and expanded services, he will also comment on the problems being created by Medicare for both patients and hospital providers. The latter part of his presentation, while advocating no particular solutions, may well stimulate thought about the problem and even some political action.

The public is invited to attend this presentation, which will begin at 7:00 p. m. next Tuesday. A question period will follow. The regular closed meeting of the Grange will follow the program.
