Kendrick Sewer, Garbage Rates Raise

Sewer and garbage rates for residents of Kendrick will increase this month, reported clerk Lynne Bruce. The increases were approved at the January 14th meeting of the City Council.

The garbage rate was increased 15c to \$7.25 to cover the annual Latah Sanitation raise and to cover the cost of maintaining the burn pile.

Sewer rates were increased \$1 to \$7 to pay for the regular maintenance and installation of the new chlorination system.

The basic rate for water, sewer and garbage service will now be \$28.25 for residences.

Any residents interested in serving on a Planning and Zoning Committee are asked to please contact chairman Mike Boe, committee chairman.

In other action councilpersons Darrel Brocke and Rita L. Blewett were sworn in and installed. Both were re-elected to four-year terms at the November city election.

Postal Service Announces Exams for Rural Mail Carriers

The United States Postal Service has announced that it will be having an examination for Rural Mail Carrier positions at Culesac, Juliaetta, Kendrick, Lapwai, Lewiston, Grangeville, Lenore, Orofino, Kamiah, Cottonwood, Craigmont, Kooskia and Pomeroy.

All qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, religion, color, national origin, sex, political affiliation, age, mental or physical handicap, or any other non-merit factor.

Applications are now being accepted, and an examination will be given to establish a register of eligibles from which future Rural Carrier vacancies in these Post Offices will be filled. All interested persons who meet the requirements are urged to apply.

Rural letter carrier starting salaries range from \$8.97 per hour, part-time.

Submit application card, PS Form 2479-A/B, to the postmaster of any of these offices or place designated. Form 2479-A/B is available at the Juliaetta and Kendrick Post Office.

Applicants will be notified of the date, time and place of the examination.

Juliaetta Public Meeting Thursday At School Gym

Juliaetta Mayor Jeff Lohman reminds all residents of the public meeting to be held Thursday evening, Jan. 23, in the Juliaetta Elementary School gym beginning at 7:00 o'clock.

The meeting is being called to discuss the status of the city's water project. Last week the Department of Commerce informed the council that it was withdrawing a \$400,000 grant, previously granted last year. The money was to be used to build a facility that would draw water from the Potlatch River, treat it and put it to use to remedy Juliaetta's long-time water shortage. The city's residents approved a \$250,000 water revenue bond to meet its share of the cost.

Apparently the grant was withdrawn after the State disapproved of the way Juliaetta was proceeding with the project.

Mayor Lohman said Monday evening the city is attempting to get the grant money restored. He said he and the city's attorney, Will Herrington, will meet with an official from the Dept. of Commerce Thursday morning in Lewiston prior to the evening public meeting. It is understood that this official will also be present at the evening meeting at the school gymnasium.

Lohman has urged that all Juliaetta residents possible to be at the meeting.

ORDINANCE NO. 633
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF IDAHO, PROVIDING FOR THE VACATING OF FOURTH STREET BETWEEN BLOCKS ELEVEN AND TWELVE; PROVIDING THAT THE CITY SHALL RETAIN A TWENTY-FOOT WIDE UTILITY EASEMENT DOWN THE CENTER OF THE VACATED STREET; PROVIDING THAT TITLE TO SAID VACATED RIGHT-OF-WAY SHALL VEST WITH THE OWNERS OF THE PROPERTIES ON EACH SIDE OF FOURTH STREET DIVIDED BY THE CENTER LINE OF FOURTH STREET; PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT FROM AND AFTER ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION ACCORDING TO LAW.

WHEREAS, the owners of adjacent properties have petitioned the City for the vacating of a portion of the Fourth Street right-of-way; and

WHEREAS, on the 14th day of January, 1992, the City Council conducted a public hearing on the matter of vacating a portion of the Fourth Street right-of-way and determined that such action was in the public interest;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK AS FOLLOWS:
SECTION 1: That the following described street right-of-way be, and the same hereby is, vacated as of the effective date of this Ordinance:

All of that portion of Fourth Street lying between and being contiguous to Blocks 11 and 12, original Kendrick town site, said property being within the City of Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho; the City retains a utility easement as described herein.

SECTION 2: That the City of Kendrick retains a twenty-foot wide utility easement down the center of the vacated right-of-way.

SECTION 3: That ownership of the above-described property be,

and the same hereby is, granted to the owners of the property adjacent to the vacated right-of-way on each side of Fourth Street with the property dividing line being the former center line of Fourth Street.

SECTION 4: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.
