Tribune Staff Visit, Receive Comments And Kind Words

Calling it the biggest and most enthusiastic turnout they'd seen on their rural beat, seven representatives of the Lewiston Morning Tribune traded observations, opinions, and quips with a frank but friendly audience of Kendrick-Julietta folks last Wednesday evening at the Senior Center.

Paul Emerson, managing editor, led off a series of brief job descriptions provided by each of the seven speakers, who also fielded questions and comments from the crowd. Emerson's main thrust was that decisions made regarding the contents of the paper must necessarily take into account the economics of publishing. When one considers, for example, that the Trib spends \$1,000 a page for newsprint alone (that's two million a year!), then he better understands why stock market reports are no longer provided on a daily basis or why the news of this or that rural activity isn't thoroughly covered.

Seth Preston, city editor, and reporter Diane Pettit both reacted to comments and criticism concerning coverage of rural news. Asked if the newsroom kept in touch with rural communities by way of their weekly newspapers, Preston replied in the affirmative—except in the case, he said, of Kendrick-Julietta, whose weekly—the venerable Gazette—the Trib did not receive. By evening's end, that was due to change as editor and publisher A. L. "Butch" Alford, Jr. and wife Nancy stopped by the Gazette office at a late hour (what other kind are there?) and subscribed to the paper.

A member of the audience reminded everyone that in the good old days the Trib had "stringers" out in rural communities, people like our own Millie Corkill (and later, Lucille Magnuson). On the payroll, Millie wrote up local stories for 22 years, and Lucille for another five or six. Alford granted that an important, intimate contact with rural communities was lost to progress or change when folks like Millie hung up their final "30." Alford remembered receiving Millie's copy when he first went to work for the Trib. An attempt will be made to reestablish that communication link through a contact person in the community of Kendrick-Julietta.

Representing the circulation department, manager Michael McBride and district manager Alan Brown both emphasized better service for subscribers. Granting that there have been some bugs in the system, both men were delighted to hear positive comments from local subscribers. Even the criticisms, delivered with good humor and tolerance, were positive.

Jim Fischer, editorial writer, was kept to last, the idea perhaps being that the other staff could escape the crowd of angry readers while he was being blasted. Not so. The folks seemed to already understand Fischer's point that his function as an editorial writer is to provoke thinking, and the more agitated the reader becomes the better Fischer is doing his job. Bill Hall, scheduled to be there with the others, missed the friendly give-and-take because of illness.

"Butch" Alford acting as cleanup batter for the Tribune staff, brought the evening to a close with expressions of appreciation for the turnout and for the Senior Center's providing the meeting place. Ruth White, president of Golden Sunset Senior Citizens, and seniors Kathryn Morey and Alberta Turner, had acted as hostesses, while they and other seniors provided a tempting variety of cookies.

Invited by Alford to close the meeting, White said, "I don't know about you, but if you saw these faces on the post office wall, would you trust these folks?" She was holding up the Tribune's ad that had announced the meeting. It got the final and biggest laugh of the evening, enjoyed most of all by the visitors!

Elmer F. Lohman, 82, Retired Southwick Farmer, Passes January 27

Elmer F. Lohman, 82, a longtime farmer in the Cameron-Southwick area of Nez Perce County, died of congestive heart failure attributed to many years of emphysema, Monday, January 27, at Mt. Vista Care Center in LaGrande, Oregon.

He was born on Sept. 21, 1909, at Cameron to Carl F. and Hattie Oldag Lohman. He was raised and attended schools in the area, and he stayed and farmed most of his life after completing his education. He moved onto the present farm when he was seven years old.

"He was a lovable person and very outgoing. He loved the outdoors and loved animals, especially his dog, cat and his horses," remembers his granddaughter, Trina Trout Caba, who formerly lived in Troy and now lives in Kearny, Az.

He married Nell Davis on Oct. 10, 1936, at Lewiston. She died on Dec. 25, 1975.

In 1990, Elmer moved to La Grande, Oregon to be near his daughter, Mary L. Williams and granddaughter, Lola Shaw.

He was a member of the Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church. He enjoyed horses and carpentry work. Survivors include two daughters, Mary L. Williams of LaGrande, Oregon, and Carol J. Trout of Troy, Idaho; a son, James E. Lohman of Kendrick; a sister Edna Thorlakson of Seattle; six grandchildren, Joe Greer of Anchorage, Alaska, Ralph Greer of Kendrick, Lola Shaw of La Grande, Oregon, Billie Welch of Richland, Wash., Trina Caba of Kearny, Arizona and Verna Yockey, Maryland; five great-grandchildren, Seth Greer of Anchorage, Alaska, Brock Shaw of La Grande, Michael Greer of Irrigon, Ore, Amy Riddle of Juneau, Alaska and Anthony Yockey of Indianhead, Maryland.

Two brothers, Leo and Ervin Lohman, and a sister, Viola Lohman, preceded him in death.

The funeral was at 2 p. m. Friday, Jan. 31, at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston with the Rev. Bob Kenyon of the Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church officiating. Burial followed at the Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens.

A dinner was served at the Cameron Church following the service by the ladies of the church.

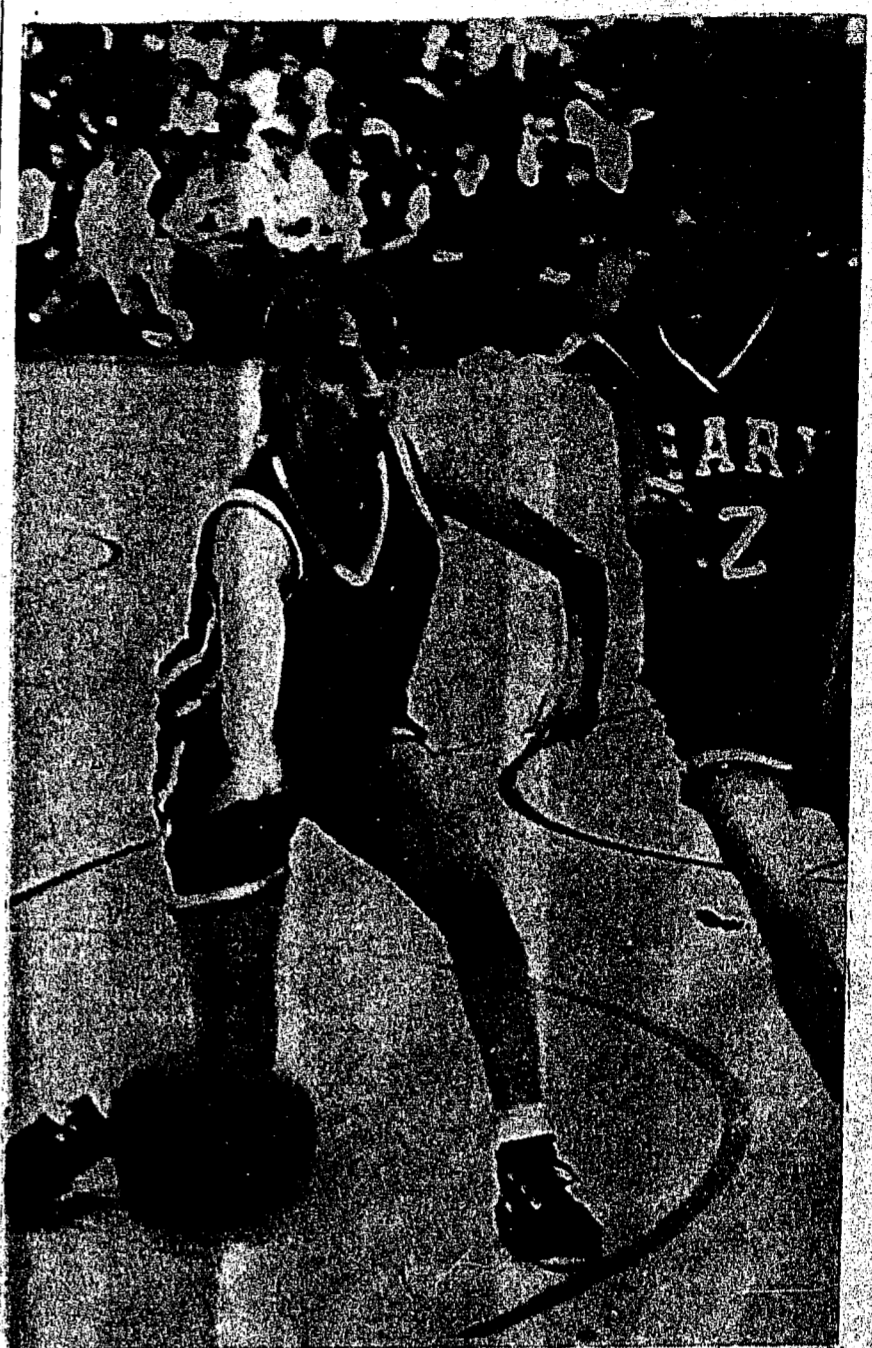

Ed Ulrich was Part Of LCSC's 99th Anniversary Celebration January 27

A chorus of "Happy Birthday" rang from the rafters of the Lewis-Clark State College gymnasium on Monday, Jan. 27, as 1,500 students, faculty, staff and friends paid tribute to the college on its 99th anniversary.

It was on that date (Jan. 27, 1893) that legislation was signed to create Lewiston State Normal School as a teacher's training institution.

Birthday celebrants were taken on a visual journey through the LCSC's past, to the present and into the future in preparation for the official beginning of the centennial observance this fall.

Monday's event, planned by chairpersons of the centennial commission, was spirited and thought provoking, from cheers, trivia questions and songs led by faculty in the Division of Office and Business Technology, to a football film, and the ceremonial cake-cutting.

A slide/video danced on television monitors and on a large screen on the gymnasium wall as the crowd filed into the building. The program featured—to music from the movie "The Sting"—a soundless film of a 1930s LCSC-University of Idaho football game, which the former won 7-6.

Keith Peterson, a well-known historian/author from Pullman, opened the formal part of the program by providing the audience with glimpses of LCSC's past that will be included in his book on LCSC. The book chronicles the role "normal" (teacher's training) colleges played in the development of education, and LCSC's history in that capacity.

LCSC graduate Ed Ulrich, a well-known public school educator in the region, provided anecdotes from his days as a student and athlete in the 1950s and 60s, including efforts to convince the legislature not to close the college in 1950.

Introduced as the theme from futuristic movie "2001 A Space Odyssey" played in the background, LCSC President Lee Vickers concluded the program with a visionary look at the college.

He asked students to join him in projecting the image and role of LCSC 10 years—to the start of the 21st century.

He predicted more than 4,500 students on the Lewiston campus, 1,000 associated with the Outreach Center at Coeur d'Alene, and the addition of two new buildings at LCSC. Lewiston will be the fastest-growing city in the state, he predicted.
