Thieves Raid Area Pop Machines Sunday Night

All the outside soft drink machines and the coin boxes at the Juliaetta Market's car wash were burglarized late Sunday night or early Monday morning of this week. The thieves made a clean sweep of eight pop machines. The burglaries were discovered Monday morning when the business owners came to work.

Two machines at the Kendrick Garage, one on Main St. and one at the card lock self-service area on the back street, two machines in front of Snyder's Home Center, 1 machine at Fleming's Truck and Equipment before going on to Juliaetta and raiding the pop machines and the coin collector at the car wash at Juliaetta Market. The pop machine at Juliaetta Elementary School was also robbed.

No figure on the amount of money taken from the machines was available.

Tom Blewett, of the Latah County Sheriff's office in Moscow said Tuesday afternoon that there had been a series of similar burglaries in Latah County last fall. "These guys (the thieves) can get into the machines and strip it in less than a minute," Blewett said. He added that if anyone sees something suspicious around a machine they should call the 911 number and report it.

Elmer L. Baumgardner, 73, Retired Woods Worker, Passes February 4

Elmer Lee Baumgardner, a retired logger and woods worker, died of natural causes at his home in Juliaetta Tuesday, February 4, 1992. He was 73 years of age and had been in poor health for some time.

He was born December 28, 1918 at Trade, Tennessee, the son of Roscoe C. and Nora F. Potter Baumgardner.

The family moved to Zionville, North Carolina when Elmer was two years old. He left home at the age of 17 and went to work in a service station in Lenore, North Carolina. He later returned to Zionville where he hauled produce for the family farm. In the fall of 1927 he moved to Orofino, Idaho to work in the cookhouse at Olson's Mill. In 1928 he moved to Richmond, Oregon to work on a sheep ranch and it was in Richmond that he met Charlotte May Williams, whom he was to marry in Lewiston, Idaho on April 27, 1940. He worked for a time felling timber with a crosscut saw in Hardman, Oregon. After his marriage, he and Charlotte moved to Heppner, Oregon where he built their first home. In the fall of 1941 they returned to North Carolina and he began hauling freight up and down the east coast. In 1944 the family moved to Cleveland, Ohio where he worked as a master machinist. In 1945 they returned to North Carolina where Elmer hauled freight and produce. In July of 1948 the family moved to Mable, North Carolina to build and operate a sawmill. In 1950 they returned to Fossil, Oregon where he was active in the timber industry and moved to Heppner, Oregon in 1951 where he continued working in timber.

In 1952 they moved to Cavendish to begin building a sawmill operation and then moved to Southwick in 1956. In 1967 the family moved to Headquarters where Elmer entered into contract logging for Potlatch. He retired in 1978 and moved to Juliaetta.

He was an active Shriner until 1980. He enjoyed hunting, fishing and camping very much.

Survivors include his wife at the family home in Juliaetta; two sons, Jerry E. Baumgardner and Larry "Boone" Baumgardner, both of Juliaetta; two daughters, Charline R. Strohm, Genesee, and Betty S. Lettenmaier of Southwick; three brothers, Ferris D. Baumgardner, Earl E. Baumgardner, and Fred M. Baumgardner, all of Zionville, North Carolina; four granddaughters and two great-granddaughters. A brother and a son, Tommy L. Baumgardner preceded him in death.

Services were held at Mountain View Funeral Home, Friday, Feb. 7, with Rev. J. Stanley Lyman officiating. Burial was at Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens in Lewiston.

Honorary bearers were Darrell (Pete) Hamilton, Lloyd Mork, Lloyd Farrington, Asa Cook, Jr., Robert White, Mike Hedler, Lloyd Davis, and John Tackett.

The family suggests memorial, if desired, be sent to Calam Temple, Lewiston, Idaho.

Grange Urges Reinstatement of Juliaetta Grant

After hearing a report from Nellie Heimgartner concerning efforts to have Juliaetta's \$400,000 grant reinstated by the Idaho Department of Commerce, Kendrick Grange at its last meeting on February 4 directed Master Frank Jacobson to write a letter in support of such action.

Following is the letter sent to James Hawkins, Director of the Department of Commerce, with copies to Governor Andrus, Speaker of the House Boyd and Representative Deanna Vickers:

Dear Mr. Hawkins:
Kendrick Grange No. 413 has been involved in the Gem Community program in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area since its beginning. The Grange assisted in the community assessment process and has continued to take an active interest in and to promote the all volunteer work of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association in its successful effort to achieve Gem Community status.

We have learned that getting things done with volunteers takes time, far more than would be required if paid professionals represented the community's interest. And we have also seen fresh, new community leadership arise during this period. The latter is perhaps the most important product to have emerged thus far.

We also know from long experience that the concept of time in a rural community is not the same as that in an urban or metropolitan area. In fact, that differing concept of time, allowing for neighborliness and carefully studied examination of issues and proposals, partly explains our community's success thus far.

For these reasons, and because Juliaetta is an integral part of our community, we were saddened to see the \$400,000 grant for the water treatment plant withdrawn by your department. At the same time, we understood the reasons as advanced by your representatives at the public meeting held by the Juliaetta council. Fortunately, the spirit of the group gathered there was positive, and the hope for reinstatement of the grant helped lessen the tension.

One comment made by one of your staff lingers, however: "In the competition for grant money, sophistication rises to the top."

While the Grange cannot disagree with this perception, we would remind the Department of Commerce that sophistication has to be learned through experience, which in a rural setting may take a little longer. Sophistication also takes nurturing, patience, timely guidance. We wonder if your department did all it could to guarantee Juliaetta's success as a rural grant applicant.

The continuing news that reinstatement of the grant is a viable hope is good news indeed for all rural communities in Idaho—and particularly for those Gem Communities who have grown in sophistication thanks to the patient and interested guidance provided by the Department of Commerce. And we applaud the City of Juliaetta's will to do whatever is necessary to assure the reinstatement.

In view of the foregoing comments Kendrick Grange No. 413 wishes to go on record urging that the grant be reinstated—and that we move forward as partners with the Department of Commerce to improve community and the economy in rural Idaho.
